RETREAT FOR NURSES

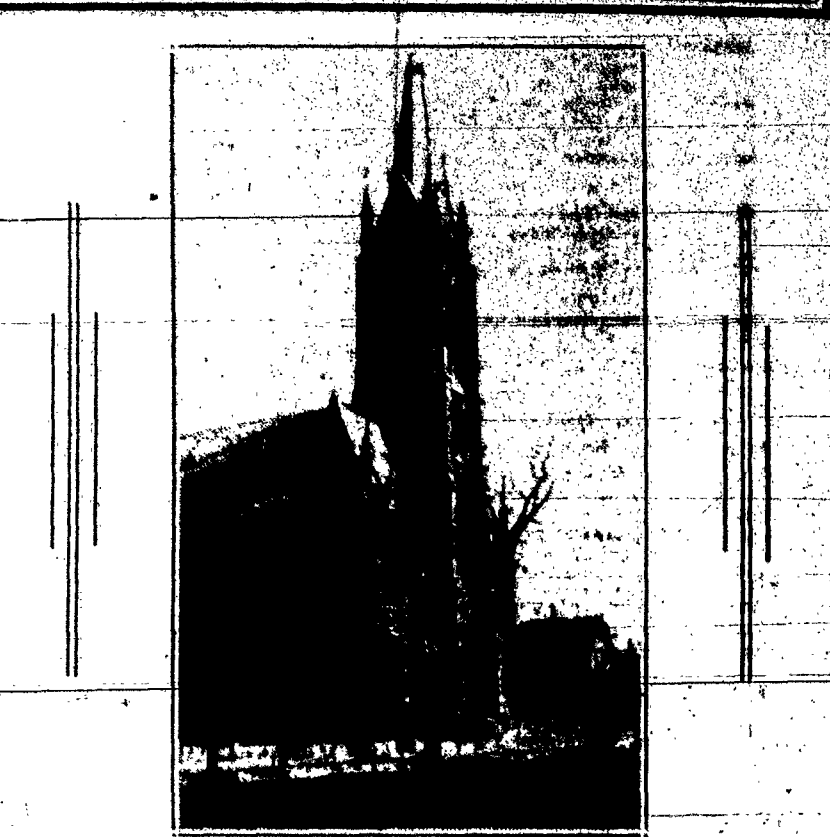
