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Bishop O'Hern 56 Years Old On Last Sunday

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, was 56 years old last Sunday. He was a priest of God for 29 years. He was born in Olean, June 8, 1874, and ordained in Rome, Italy, February 17, 1901. The Bishop's birthday was a solemn one. He officiated at the bi-centennial Mass in Our Mother of Sorrows Church, Mt. Read Boulevard, at 10:30 o'clock, and delivered an interesting and inspiring talk, dealing chiefly with the history of this century-old church and the heroic work of its devoted pioneers. Immediately afterwards he gave a second address, at the civic celebration of the church anniversary on the grounds around the church—a vigorous, broad-minded, patriotic talk that won hearty praise from all who heard it on the grounds and from many thousands of radio listeners.

Shortly after this he was an outstanding figure at a civic banquet of Our Mother of Sorrows Church, in Town Hall, Greece, and helped keep the capacity audience in great good humor by his timely announcements and apt stories.

From the banquet hall he hastened to St. Patrick's Cathedral, where he confirmed an exceptionally large class of children, and gave a talk that was a joy to every person present.

From the Cathedral, Bishop O'Hern went to the rectory of St. Monica's Church, where he was a guest of honor and principal speaker at a dinner in celebration of the 35th ordination of the Rev. John P. Brophy, rector of St. Monica's Church, and the Rev. P. A. Neville, rector of St. Bridget's Church, East Bloomfield.

There were other numerous matters that occupied his time and attention during the day. But Bishop O'Hern met them all with a smile, cared for them with dispatch, and when the day was done—a perfect day, the Bishop called it—he went home happy and contented, glad of the companionship of so many hundreds of people, and hopeful for God's best blessing upon all his diocesan, and upon all other residents of the city and Diocese.

Many hundreds of people saw nomination and re-election of Mr. Roosevelt. Alfred E. Smith's Tribute "I was one of those," said Mr. Smith, smiling at his successor, sitting next to him, "who against his better judgment, persuaded Mr. Roosevelt to be Governor. I know what the position is. There is no rest in it. It is a night and day job. Unquestionably he was asked to do more than might have been expected from him. For that one thing he had to be taken away for a while from Warm Springs. "It is a satisfaction for the now to come here to say that the citizens should heartily support this foundation on his own merits and also to tribute to the Governor who laid aside his personal and business interests to administer the State in the remarkable way that he has carried for it during his first term. I feel he is not going to get a chance to get away from his office. He is going to be made to stay there. He is going to be re-nominated and re-elected."

Waiting for Coney Island Although he had had to take Governor Roosevelt away from Warm Springs, the former Governor pointed out that he had provided a swimming pool for his successor in what was formerly the hot house behind the Executive Mansion in Albany. "I went back there, visiting," Mr. Smith continued, "but when I found out that the temperature of the pool was 89 degrees I said that was no place for a Fulton market swimmer. I'll wait until Coney Island opens."

A PICTURESQUE RETREAT AT ANCIENT SOLEURE

In the year 272 A. D. when the Allemsans threatened the Romans, a fortification was erected on the River Are, on the site now occupied by Soleure, which, next to Treves, is the oldest city north of the Alps. Many tragic events took place in those days and we are informed that Ursus and Victor, two of the early Christians who had fled in the year 303 to this settlement from Agnum, the present Saint Maurice in the Rhone Valley, had been tortured and put to death in Soleure by the Romans on account of their faith. The Cathedral of St. Ursus, considered to be the finest specimen of late Italian Renaissance in Switzerland, is dedicated to these martyrs and their sufferings are immortalized by three reliefs on the facade. Two fountains, bearing statues of Moses and Gideon, stand at each side of the broad marble stairs which lead in three tiers to the entrance. Eleven marble altars, individual masterpieces of as many artists, add to the beauty of the interior, which has been conceived in the shape of a Latin cross. Valuable manuscripts, miniatures of the Ninth to Sixteenth centuries, goldsmith's work, including a late Renaissance silver-gilt bust of St. Ursus, ancient vestments and different relics from part of the remarkable church treasury. While a modern commercial atmosphere enlivens today this city of medieval gates, towers and fountains

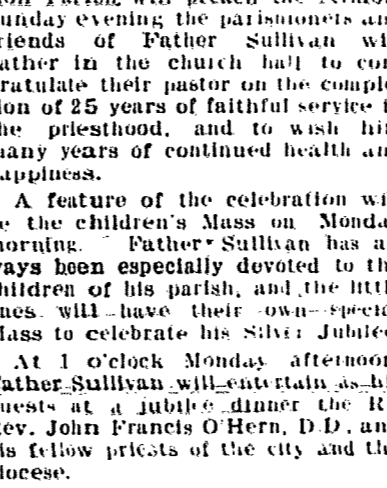
