Will of Priest Leaves Bequests To Institutions

St. George's Church is bequeathed a mortgage on Hudson Avenue property valued at \$2,100, together with some real estate on Weeser Street. The proceeds of the mortgage are to be used for a memorial window above the altar in the proposed new St. George's Church, which Father Kasakaitis had been planning to erect for some time, and which will be built in the near future.

Other bequests are as follows: Aquinas Institute, St. Bernard's Seminary, Marian Hill College of Chicago, Society for the Propagation of the Faith in New York State, and the Lithuanian Sisters of St. Francis of Pittsburgh, \$500 each; Rt. Rev. Anthony Karosas, Bishop of Vilka-viska, Lithuania, \$300 for the use of the diocesan seminary; two sisters, Helen Kasakaitis and Isabelle Stanulonis of Lithuania, \$4,000 each; Adela Bernataviciute, his housekeeper, and Katherine Dubysa, former housekeeper, \$1,000 each; Casimir Bzys, organist of the church, \$100.

The residue was left to his cousin, Rev. John Kasakaitis, executor of the estate.
