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Bishop Cannon To Sue Buffalo Catholic Paper

Washington, June 20. Bishop James Cannon, of the Southern Methodist Church, just three days after his victory over the Senate Lobby Committee, Monday, opened a letter to the publisher of the west and Catholic press for alleged libel of himself, and to get the Senate to pass the Hoover-Wickersham dry-law program before its impending adjournment.

As president of the Methodist Board of Temperance and Social Services, the bishop in a statement called for action by the Senate on the juryless trial bills and other measures already adopted by the House.

As an individual, in a separate statement, he announced his lawyers had already "reached a decision" in regard to one Buffalo Catholic paper, which published "clearly libelous matter," and it was his purpose to meet future and past publications "with the processes of the law."

Buffalo Editor Writing

Buffalo, June 20.—The Buffalo paper eligible for a libel suit, according to the announcement of Bishop Cannon, is the Catholic Union and Times, the official newspaper of the Buffalo Diocese. It is edited by the Rev. Edward J. Fergar, who has had several years' experience at his work. This paper recently carried a "blistering" editorial on the bishop and his doings.

Informed of the threatened institution of court action against the Catholic Union and Times, Father Fergar issued the following statement: "There is nothing libelous in the Cannon articles in the Catholic Union and Times. Bishop Cannon, on previous occasions, has issued editorial statements made in our paper and has merited the rebuke he has received because of the unfair and unnecessary methods he has employed to win his point. If the bishop believes that any article or statement has done him injury he ought to find redress in the courts of his country. We believe that he will be unable to ride roughshod through a legal action in the same manner that he has overridden the supreme legislative body of the United States."

Episcopalian Minister Joins Catholic Church and Will Study For the Priesthood in Rome Soon

New York, June 20.—The Rev. Dr. Seiden P. Delany, rector of the Protestant Episcopal Church. This latest and most prominent Episcopalian minister in the Protestant Episcopal Church in the City of New York, has resigned his rectorship and will join the Catholic Church and study for the priesthood in Rome.

The Rev. Dr. Delany is internationally known as a former editor of the American Church Monthly. It is understood he will spend the next two years in Rome studying for the priesthood of the Roman Catholic Church. He is unmarried. Dr. Delany was reared a Presbyterian. While a student at Harvard University he became a Protestant Episcopalian.

Surprise was expressed in Protestant Episcopal circles yesterday when news of Dr. Delany's intention was learned. A few days ago it became known, he sent a letter to Bishop William T. Manning stating that his convictions would not permit him longer to remain in the Protestant Episcopal ministry. It is reported that he will be received into the Catholic Church July 1, and that he was to sail for Europe shortly thereafter.

In his resignation Dr. Delany said he offered to devote himself "to travel and study." He did not mention that he intended to enter the Catholic Church. The trustees were informed of that fact from other sources.

Dr. Delany preached last in the Church of St. Mary the Virgin on Sunday, May 29. It was understood that he was going to Europe for his summer vacation.

Dr. Delany succeeded the Rev. Dr. Joseph G. H. Barry, who retired a few years ago as rector of St. Mary the Virgin.

He was born in Pond du Lac, Wis., June 24, 1874. He was graduated from Harvard in 1896 and from the Western Theological Seminary, Chicago, in 1899. Among his charges were curate at St. Paul's Cathedral, Pond du Lac; rector at St. John's Church, Roxbury, Boston; vicar at St. Stephen's Church, Menasha, Wis.; rector Grace Church, Appleton, Wis.; and rector All Saints' Cathedral, Milwaukee.

Bishop Manning, head of the Protestant Episcopal Church, when asked for a statement, said: "I have nothing to say."

The statue, which was given in homage to the Holy Father, Pope Pius XI, stands in the Hall of India and is one of the first things to strike the eye of a visitor.—(Files.)

Pontiff's Title Now Is Sovereign Of Vatican City

Vatican City, June 20.—The official Vatican directory for the current year, just published, contains an important change in the Pope's titles.

They formerly included "Sovereign of the Temporal Domains of the Holy Roman Church" as a formal affirmation of the Pope's claim to territories of which he had been deprived by the Italian Government. Now that title is "Sovereign of the State of Vatican City." The Pontiff's spiritual titles remain unaltered. They are:

"Vicar of Christ, Successor of St. Peter, Bishop of Rome, Archbishop and Metropolitan of the Roman Province, Primate of Italy, Patriarch of the West, Supreme Pontiff of the Universal Church."

A Former Leper

Cawaci, Fiji Islands, June 20.—A former leper has entered the Catholic Training School for Catechists at Cawaci, Fiji Islands, Oceania. Sent to the Leper Asylum on the island of Makogai 17 years ago, he was discharged as cured after seven years. Showing no signs of the recurrence of the disease, he has been admitted to the school. Upon graduation he will enter the Catholic Faith to his fellow-Fidjians, under the guidance of the Marist Fathers who are charge of the islands.
