

Appointments and Assignments Of Priests Announced By Bishop ; Msgr. Nolan Director of Holy Name

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, announced last Friday the following appointments and assignments of priests for the Diocese:

The Rt. Rev. Monsignor Michael J. Nolan, chancellor of the Diocese, to be diocesan director of Holy Name societies.

The Rev. Walter A. Foery, Ph.D., pastor of St. Carmel Church, to be diocesan director of Catholic charities.

The Rev. George C. Voet, assistant at Holy Family Church, to be professor at St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary.

The Rev. John Baksys, an alumnus of St. Bernard's Seminary, has been appointed pastor of St. George's Lithuanian Church on Hudson Avenue to take the place of the late Rev. Joseph Kasakaitis. Father Baksys is making plans to open a school at St. George's Church to be in charge of Lithuanian Sisters.

The priests who were ordained this month were assigned as follows:

The Rev. William Davis, to be professor at Aquinas Institute.

The Rev. Francis Waterstraat to be assistant at Holy Family Church, succeeding Father Voet, transferred to St. Andrew's Seminary.

The Rev. Hubert Bisk, to be as-

stant at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church, Rochester.

The Rev. Lawrence Casey, to be assistant at St. Mary's Church, Rochester.

The Rev. Martin Feeney to be assistant at St. Francis Xavier Church, Rochester.

The Rev. Joseph McDonnell to be assistant at Holy Rosary Church, Rochester.

The Holy Name Director

The appointment of Msgr. Nolan to the position of Diocesan Director of Holy Name Societies gives him an important work to perform. The Diocese has 125 churches with resident priests and 33 missions. Rochester alone has upwards of 40 parishes, and, as there is a strong Holy Name Society in virtually every parish in the Diocese, numbering more than 100,000 members, Monsignor Nolan enters on duties of large responsibility and administration. He resigned as president of St. Andrew's a year ago, a post he held more than 30 years, to become spiritual director of the student body.

He is chaplain of Sacred Heart Convent in Prince Street, and spiritual advisor to the religious communities of women in the Diocese. He was born June 2, 1870, in Ithaca, and on completion of his preparatory studies in St. Andrew's Seminary, he entered the American College, Rome, Italy, and was ordained to the priesthood, July 21, 1895. He was appointed chancellor of the Diocese in 1904.

Nazareth Class Of 173 Students Given Diplomas

The 54th annual commencement of Nazareth Academy was held on Monday evening, with an attendance that taxed the capacity of the school auditorium.

The class of graduates in the classical, academic, commercial and music courses numbered one hundred seventy-three, and was one of the largest classes to be graduated from the school. Rev. John W. Keefe presented the class, and the diplomas and academic honors were awarded by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester.

Miss Estelle L. Mehan was the salutatorian, and Miss Harriet M. Floeck, valedictorian. Choral and instrumental numbers by students of the Nazareth School of Music added much to the charm and beauty of the program. Miss Monica C. Sheehan conducted the choral group.

The graduates, dressed in white, carried American beauty roses, and they presented an unforgettable spectacle of loveliness. The stage was decorated in ever-hunt keeping with the occasion, and the program throughout was one that brought gladness and joy to the hearts of the spectators.

Director of Charities

The new Diocesan Director of Catholic Charities, Rev. Walter A. Foery, is well known in Rochester, where he was born July 13, 1890. He was baptized in St. Bridget's Church, the son of William Foery and Agnes O'Brien. He studied at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries and was ordained to the priesthood in Rochester, June 10, 1916, and assigned as assistant to St. Carmel Church two weeks later. He was made pastor of St. Carmel, Feb. 8, 1922. His entire ministry has been devoted to the parish. For years he has been actively engaged in welfare work, and has been consulted by agencies and has lectured frequently on charitable service.

Father Foery will assume his new office immediately and will also remain as pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel parish, in which a beautiful new church was dedicated a month ago. His work will consist in the supervision of all the social agencies, institutions and social welfare work throughout the Diocese.

Monthly Meeting Of The Nocturnal Society Saturday

The regular monthly hours of adoration for members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society will fall on Saturday night this week. Beginning at 7 o'clock, and continuing until 6 o'clock, the members of the various groups will go to Lady Chapel, St. Patrick's Cathedral, each group remaining for one hour in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament.

This society is open to all Catholic men. It is a Diocesan Society, and members of all parishes are privileged to join it. On one night each month, the members go to the Cathedral, and then each group spends one hour in adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, which is exposed on the altar. William G. Wynn, 22 Columbia Avenue, is secretary of the society, and will be glad to receive applications for membership at any time.

Chinese Troops Rescue Priests Held by Bandits

Hankow, China, June 27.—Government troops rescued two Catholic priests last Friday who had been kidnapped from the mission at Sinsang chow.

The two, Fathers King and Kal, were being held by bandits, presumably for ransom. Cavalry, learning of the priests' whereabouts, made a sudden and successful attack on the kidnapers and carried the priests away.

First High Mass In St. Boniface Sunday Morning

The Rev. Eugene A. Gisel, S. J., son of Mrs. Katherine Gisel of 359 Linden Street, will celebrate his first solemn high mass in St. Boniface's Church Sunday morning, June 29th. He was ordained last Sunday at the Jesuit Seminary in Woodstock, Md., by the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, Archbishop of Baltimore.

Father Gisel is a graduate of St. Boniface's School. He also studied at the Cathedral High, and in St. Andrew's Seminary, and in 1917 entered the Jesuit novitiate at Yonkers, where he spent two years. Later he spent two years at St. Andrew-on-the-Hudson, Poughkeepsie, and a year studying philosophy at Gonzaga University, Spokane, Wash.

In 1924 he sailed for the Philippine Islands to teach in the Jesuit College. After three years, he returned to the United States and spent the last three years studying theology at Woodstock. He will spend two more years in study.

The priests assisting Father Gisel at his solemn High Mass Sunday will be: Assistant priest, the Rev. John F. Boppel, deacon, the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, sub-deacon, the Rev. Earl Ritz. The sermon will be delivered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. J. Nolan, D. D., chancellor.

Trinitarian Sisters Will Have Charge During Vacation Of Genesee Institute School

Beginning next Friday, the Genesee Institute Summer School for boys and girls will be conducted for five weeks, afternoons and evenings, at the Institute, corner Central Park and North Union Street. The Trinitarian Sisters will be in charge. Heretofore the school has been taught by volunteers, chiefly girls from Nazareth College and Academy. These volunteers always did excellent work, but it has interfered seriously with their vacations and with their home work.

The sessions of the school will be conducted five days a week, Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays. The forenoons will be for girls, the afternoons for boys. A variety of classes will be taught, including home-cooking and embroidery for the girls.

On two days a week, Thursdays and Fridays, classes will be conducted in the girls' branch of the institute, 270 Merrimac Street. Miss Anna Dolan will be in charge here.

Donations are needed

Donations of clothing for boys and girls, and for women, are badly needed by the Genesee Institute, which is conducted under the auspices of the Rochester Diocese. A telephone call to Stone 4839 will bring an automobile to any home for such donations.

Toys are also badly needed for children, and magazines, books and dishes. It is hoped that generous and kindly interest will be taken in the splendid welfare work that is being done at the institute under the supervision of the capable director, Frank J. Lyons.

Purse of Gold Given to Pastor On Anniversary

Dansville, June 27.—Wednesday evening the Christian Mothers' Society of St. Mary's Church held their final meeting before vacation days. In conference the Spiritual Director, the Rev. Leo G. Hofschneider, spoke on the Law of the Church as contained in the second commandment. Immediately after the business meeting there was a surprise entertainment in honor of the 32d anniversary of the ordination of the Rev. Leo G. Hofschneider. The musical program included vocal solos by Mrs. Joseph Kaut, with Master Sheldon Eschrich at the piano. The Boys' Orchestra furnished music during the service of the banquet. A pink and white color scheme was elaborately carried out in the room decorations, flowers, favors and candles.

Rev. Charles Klefer of Perkinsville, on behalf of the Christian Mothers, presented Father Hofschneider with a purse of gold. In his gracious speech of acceptance, the Rev. Pastor interlarded his remarks with appreciative words of the society's work and their hearty cooperation during the 21 years he had been in Dansville.

Priest Dies After Saving Girls in River

Montreal, June 27.—The Rev. Raymond Cloran, S. J., aged 46 years, lost his life in the St. Lawrence River at Verdennes, near here Sunday, after having saved two young girls from drowning. He saw the girls struggling in the water, and leaped into the river and swam to their assistance. Two other girls followed with a row boat. Father Cloran reached the girl who was in the greatest danger. He supported her until the boat reached them and he managed to get her into it. He then helped the other girl, who had been able to swim a little, who had boat, but was too exhausted to save himself. The girls were unable to aid him and by the time further assistance reached the scene, Father Cloran had sunk.

Father Cloran was born and educated in Montreal. He was ordained in 1912. He was prefect of discipline at Loyola College here. His father was the late Senator H. G. Cloran.

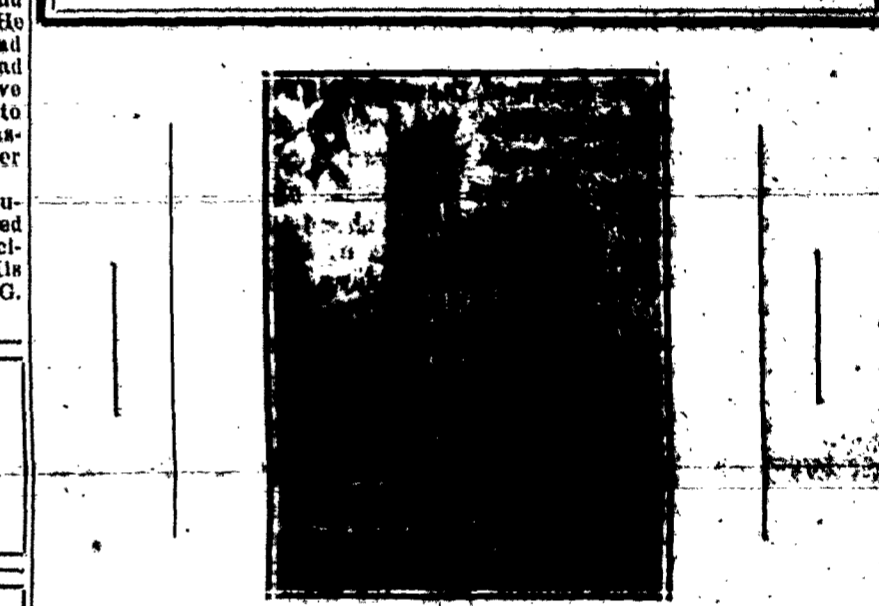
