

Local Church Obtains Relics! Of Three Saints

The Rev. Thomas F. Connors, rector of the Blessed Sacrament Church, has obtained relics of three of the recently canonized Saints—St. Jean de Brebeuf, St. Gabriel Lalemant and St. Charles Garnier.

The relics are small fragments of the bones of the Saints, and they were exposed Sunday in a gold reliquary for the veneration of the people. A permanent resting place will be made for these relics in the church.

The Saints were canonized last Sunday by Pope Pius XI, in St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, together with five other Jesuit martyrs of the Faith. They were victims of the savage fury of the Iroquois Indians. St. Jean de Brebeuf has been called "the Ajax of the Missions," so indomitable was his heroism, so fearless his leadership, and so glorious his death.

Bishop Lays Cornerstone Of Buffalo Church

Last Sunday the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, laid the cornerstone of a new St. Bartholomew's Church in Buffalo, the church of which his brother, the Rev. Thomas O'Hern, is pastor. There was a large congregation present at the service, which was carried out with ritualistic solemnity.

The address at the ceremony was given by the Rt. Rev. Emmett M. Walsh, D. D., Bishop of Charleston, S. C. It was a splendid discourse, and was heard with appreciation by everybody.

The new church will cost approximately \$100,000, and it is planned to have it completed by November 1st next.

Capuchin Finds Ancient Relics Of Abyssinians

Vatican City, July 3.—Father Bernardino Asali, a Capuchin missionary, has discovered the 14 tombs of the Mindjos dynasty of the Kings of Kaffa, in southwest Abyssinia. He has also found traces of cities and churches, with 52 sacred stones, which go back to the 16th century.

Alaskan Missionary Is Presented Plane For Mission Flights

Crimont sprinkled the plane with holy water and the ceremony ended with the singing, in which 2,000 voices joined of "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name."

League Paid for It
The plane was flown from the Bellanca Field at Newcastle, Del., by George MacDonald of the Bellanca Company. It was officially accepted for the Marquette League by Victor Ritter, who presented a certified check to MacDonald.

The plane, has a Packard Diesel motor, skis and floats for use in addition to its wheel landing gear, the present equipment.

Following the dedication and presentation to Brother Feltes several of those taking part were flown over the field by the missionary pilot.

Monday Brother Feltes, with George Pickenpack as co-pilot, started for Alaska. They made stops at Buffalo, Detroit, Chicago, Dubuque, Wichita, Phoenix and Albuquerque on their way to the coast, and then will fly it northward from Los Angeles.

A Tremendous Field
Bishop Crimont has a tremendous field under his supervision—586,400 square miles. The missions and mission stations are widely scattered, and heretofore many of them have had to be visited by dog sleds. With the airplane, Bishop Crimont and his co-workers can cover more ground in a few hours than they could in many weeks.

The plane is equipped with all kinds of instruments for use in the Arctic field, and Brother Feltes is an expert aviator.

Divorced Wife May Be Obstacle To His Fortune

New York, July 3.—A divorced wife may be the obstacle to possession of a fortune by Vincent Kerens of this city, son of the late Richard C. Kerens of St. Louis, Mo., millionaire railroad magnate and former ambassador to Austria-Hungary. When Mr. Kerens, Sr., died it was found that his will provided that the son must live a sober and respectable life for five years, or otherwise be cut off entirely from sharing in the estate of his father.

Some year ago Vincent Kerens tried to obtain his share of the estate, estimated at \$1,900,000. But his two

sisters, Mrs. Mademo Kerens-Kenna of this city and Mrs. Hamilton Colket of Philadelphia, objected on the ground that he had divorced his wife and married again—an act that was decidedly at variance with his father's ideas of good living, for the father was a devout Catholic.

But Federal Judge Paris in St. Louis held that the getting of a divorce was "good behavior" even though it might be contrary to the tenet of any established religion. This view was sharply objected to by the sisters, who fought the distribution of the property to him on

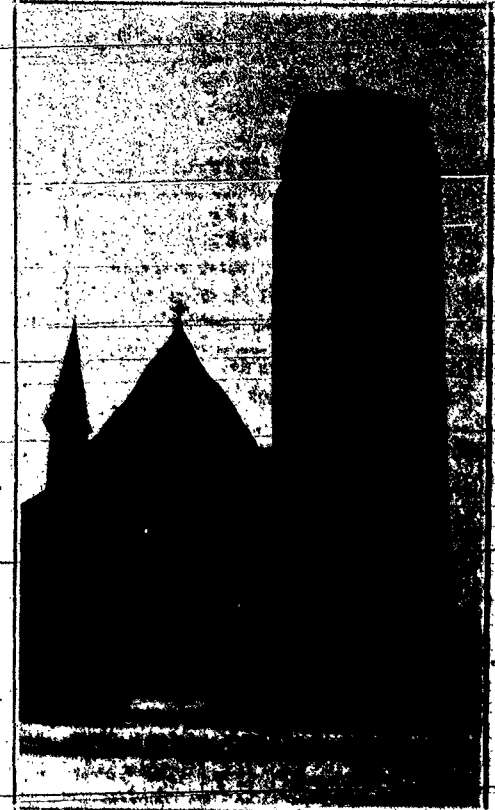
