

Pope Pius Canonizes Eight American Saints In St. Peter's Sunday

tion of high church dignitaries, including a double row of cardinals in scarlet robes and white ermine capes.

Grouped around the Pope were his ecclesiastical, civil and military courtiers in medieval costumes, including every color of the rainbow. Behind him came a group of Swiss guards in steel breastplates and helmets with heavy spearheads resting on their shoulders.

The Pope's Appearance

The Pope wore a magnificent cope of cream colored silk, decorated with gold and silver, which enveloped him from shoulders to feet. On his head was a golden mitre, while his triple crown was carried on a red plush cushion by an attendant at his side. With his left hand he grasped a golden shepherd's crook, while with his right he imparted his blessing to the kneeling crowd.

His eyes often rested on the standards depicting typical scenes from the lives of the new saints which were carried in the procession in front of him. On reaching the high altar, the Pope seated himself on the throne prepared for him there. The Cardinal Postulator of canonization then advanced to the foot of the throne and asked the Pontiff to inscribe the names of the 10 blessed martyrs among the saints. The secretary in charge of briefs to the Pope replied for the Pope that the merits and virtues of the blessed ones were well known, but that before declaring them saints he asked every one present to pray to God for guidance.

Elevated to Sanctity

The Pope, followed by every one else, knelt and recited prayers to the saints. The Cardinal Postulator of Canonization then repeated his request, but received the same reply. A third time he repeated his request and this time the Pope replied with a Latin formula declaring that the blessed ones had been elevated to sanctity.

In a Latin homily delivered after pronouncing the decrees of canonization, Pope Pius recalled the fact that the day was the feast of St. Peter and St. Paul and said their virtues were perpetuated in the Church, as was exemplified by the sanctification of so many servants of God.

400 Church Bells Ring

Immediately Vatican notaries drew up a record of the event, while the silver trumpets blared joyously and the big bells of St. Peter's boomed their message of gladness, their refrain being taken up by all the bells in Rome's 400 churches. Applause broke out in the Basilica, being answered by cheers

of many thousands waiting in the piazza outside.

The ceremony ended with a Mass sung by the Pope in a firm, clear voice. Then after the Cardinals present had bowed their heads over the golden cross embroidered on the Pontiff's slipper the Pope received symbolic gifts consisting of candles, bread, two casks of wine and a dove, and assigned Sept. 26 as the feast day of the North American martyrs, Sept. 16 for St. Bellarmine and May 19 for St. Theophilus Da Corte.

After imparting the apostolic benediction the Pontiff again mounted the sedia gestatoria and was carried back to his apartments, followed by the water-carriers and applause of the assembled thousands.

Thousands Fill St. Peter's

The ceremony was watched by scores of thousands of faithful who, despite the intense heat, filled every corner of the immense basilica from the earliest hours of the morning to well after 1 o'clock in the afternoon when the canonization ceremony was ended. Among them were many pilgrims who had traveled thousands of miles to be present. Especially numerous were pilgrims from Canada, the United States and France. Many representatives of these countries also had gathered in Rome.

In a special box were the Jesuit Father de Bagnan, descendant of the family from which Father Isaac Jogues came, and the Vicar General of Orleans, a descendant of the De Broseuf family.

Litany Decorations

St. Peter's Basilica had been lavishly decorated for the canonization. Purple hangings with gold fringes hung from each pillar. Thick carpets were placed on the floor along the route of the papal procession.

The whole church was aglow with thousands of candles while the new electric lighting system, inaugurated for the first time, spread a soft glow. At the sides of the main altar hand-painted standards depicted the new saints in heaven. The bronze statue of St. Peter was draped for the occasion in rich robes. Brilliant streamers in through the ample windows and imparted a particularly festive air.

Pope Closely Watched

Rumors that the Pontiff was not well caused his appearance to be scrutinized more carefully than usual. It was remarked that he had lost his ruddy complexion and appeared somewhat pale. He raised his arm to impart the benediction with a rather weary gesture. Other-wise he appeared quite well. It was noticed especially that his eyes had lost none of their customary keenness.

He bore the fatigue of the five hours' ceremony in stilling heat, covered with heavy robes, quite well and though obviously tired when he retired to his apartments there was

nothing to suggest the strain had been too much for him or that he was near a breakdown.

North American Pilgrims

Many Canadians were present at the canonization services including W. T. Kernahan, representing the Knights of Columbus of Canada and New Foundland, and Mrs. Kernahan, representing the Catholic Women's League. With them were their two daughters, Katherine and Mary. Among the Jesuit priests at the ceremonies were Fathers Edmund Walsh, president of the Catholic Near East Relief Association, Edward Coffey, representing Georgetown University, John J. Wynne, historian of the North American Martyrs and compiler of the Catholic Encyclopedia, Thomas White of the Jesuit House at Shadowbrook, Mass., and Francis Xavier Talbot, library editor of America.

Bishop Thomas J. Conroy of Newark, N. J., and Archbishop Edward Mooney, an American, who is Apostolic Delegate to India, also represented the United States in the ceremonies.

The Canadians included 250 pilgrims, who had an audience with Pope Pius Saturday, and 150 Canadian priests studying in the seminaries here or engaged by other duties in Rome at Vatican City.

Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Haegens of Detroit was also in the procession as a representative of the American episcopacy. Among the papal private chamberlains on duty was Supreme Court Justice Dowling of New York.

Three New York State Saints

The New York State Saints are the Rev. Isaac Jogues, and the two lay brothers, Rene Goupil and John delalande. All three were killed at Aurieuville, N. Y., now a shrine to these Jesuit martyrs, and soon to have a splendid new church erected in their honor.

Rene Goupil, the first of these three to die, was tomahawked by the Iroquois Indians on September 29, 1642. He had suffered dreadful tortures previous to his death. Father Jogues, then a captive, was cruelly tortured, and doomed to die, but was rescued by some Dutch traders. He returned to Europe, maimed and disfigured, and was given a world of honors by every body. He returned to America in 1644, and in 1646 went back to the Iroquois and to the martyrdom that awaited him. There he was murdered, and on the following day his faithful companion, John de la Lande, received the martyr's crown.

Many thousands of pilgrims visit Aurieuville each year. The Jesuit Order maintains a church there, and Masses are said every Sunday for the pilgrims who come. In Wernersville, Pa., is a beautiful Jesuit novitiate, built by the late Nicholas F. Brady and his wife, and named in honor of Father Jogues—the St. Isaac Jogues Novitiate. Another name had been agreed upon for this novitiate, but a short time before his death when Mr. Brady learned that Father Jogues was to be canonized on June 29 he and Mrs. Brady changed the name to St. Isaac Jogues.

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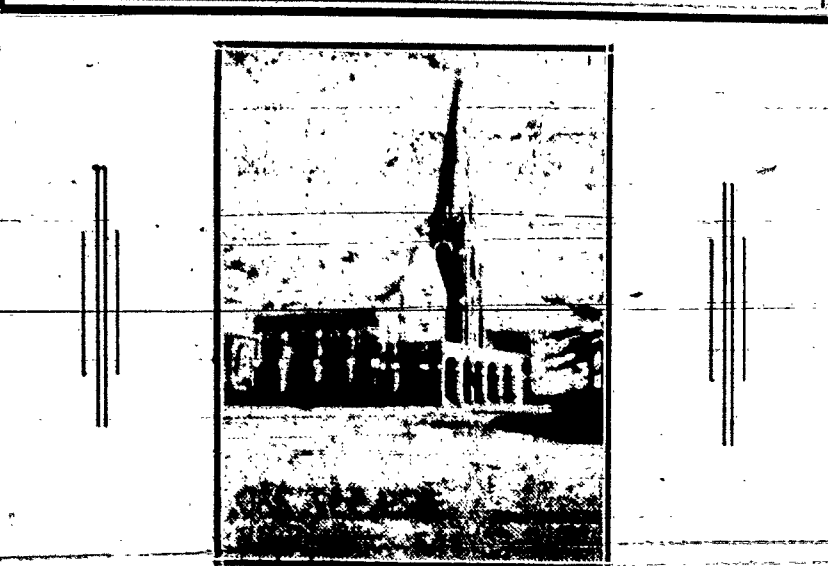
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
