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New Mercy Hospital in Auburn Ground Will Be Broken Tuesday And Work Started Immediately

Bishop O'Hern Will Officiate at Ceremony, Which Will Be Made a Civic Event—Splendid Modern Institution Will Be Erected at Once

Auburn, July 11.—Ground for the new Mercy Hospital in this city will be broken next Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock, by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, and another splendid work launched in the two-million dollar building plan of the Diocese of Rochester.

The breaking of ground will be in the nature of an important civic ceremony. It is expected that a number of city officials will be present, and a large number of physicians, nurses, priests, sisters and laymen.

Actual work will be commenced on the hospital at once, and it will be pushed rapidly to completion. The hospital will be a splendid modern institution, and it will be conducted by the Sisters of the Third Franciscan Order who have been in charge of the old Mercy Hospital since its foundation.

Funds for the new hospital were provided by a community-wide campaign in June last year. The quota for this campaign was set at \$350,000, and it reached \$351,445 on the closing night, with other donations

afterwards—a great success from every point of view. More than 700 workers took part in the campaign, and nothing in Auburn was ever put across with more enthusiasm and civic spirit. More than 10,300 persons subscribed to the fund.

Bless Graves In Coldwater Sunday, 4 P.M.

The ceremony of the blessing of the graves in Holy Ghost Cemetery, Cold Water, will take place on Sunday, July 12th, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, daylight saving time.

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will officiate, and he will be assisted by the Rev. P. A. Erras, rector of the Church of the Holy Ghost at Cold Water, and a number of other priests. The ceremony will begin with the chanting of the Vespers of the Dead.

All parishioners and their friends are cordially invited to be present at this impressive and appealing ceremony.

St. Pius Society To Celebrate Its Golden Jubilee

With a half century of fraternity and Catholic brotherhood as a record of achievement, the St. Pius Society of Holy Family Church, will celebrate its Golden Jubilee on Sunday, July 12th, at 10 o'clock. All members of the society will receive Holy Communion in a body at the 7:30 o'clock Mass at Holy Family Church. After the Mass they will adjourn to the school hall where a Communion breakfast will be served and a short meeting will take place.

At the 10:30 o'clock Mass at Holy Family, the society will have the honor of having as one of its guests the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, who will speak briefly to the members, who again will attend the High Mass in a body.

The Uniform Rank of Holy Family Commandery No. 197, of Holy Family Church will turn out in a body to act as an escort to the Bishop, and bring him from the pastor's house to the church.

The day will be one of happiness for all members, especially the older ones who have seen the society grow from a few members to a real active and flourishing organization. To span a half century of progress in Catholic enterprise and fraternity, is indeed a feat that ought to receive commendation. During all these years the paths of the pioneers were not always strewn with roses, but hardships were many, and with the help of Almighty God, they have successfully withstood the test of time.

Joseph Reichart, who was the first president of the society, is the oldest charter member. It has been stated that in the years of its existence the organization has paid out over \$43,000 in sick benefits. The membership today stands at 157. Present officers are as follows: President, Joseph Knebel; recording secretary, Max Demmert; treasurer, Matthias Jacobs.

We hope many of them will come to the church that they may see, hear and understand the nature of the services conducted in the church.

Bishop O'Hern cautioned his people against saying any unkind word against their neighbors, the Protestant and Hebrew, saying that charity is the greatest of all Christian virtues.

Catholics Good Patriots
Recalling the singing of "America" and the pledge made to the American flag by the school children at the opening of the services, Bishop O'Hern declared there was nothing in the Catholic religion that prohibited a good Catholic from being a true American. To the contrary, he declared that the teaching the children receive in the Catholic schools inspires them to be not only good Catholics, but good citizens.

He paid a high tribute to the heroes of the past, the pioneers who laid the foundation for the present St. Alphonsus Church and who are now resting in St. Joseph's Cemetery. He also expressed the hope that the new St. Alphonsus Church will not tend to draw parishioners away from the other Catholic churches. "Be true to your mother church," was his advice to the people.

Father Straub spoke briefly at the conclusion of the Bishop's address and thanked the Bishop and the priests of the diocese for coming here for the cornerstone laying. He also thanked the people for their large attendance and said that he was more than happy because the occasion marked his sixtieth anniversary as pastor of the church.

After Father Straub had finished Bishop O'Hern gave his Episcopal blessing to the church and the parishioners, thus happily rounding out a day that will live long in the memories of many people.

Plans for the picnic are in the hands of a capable committee of ladies, with Mrs. Edward J. Rooney as general chairman.

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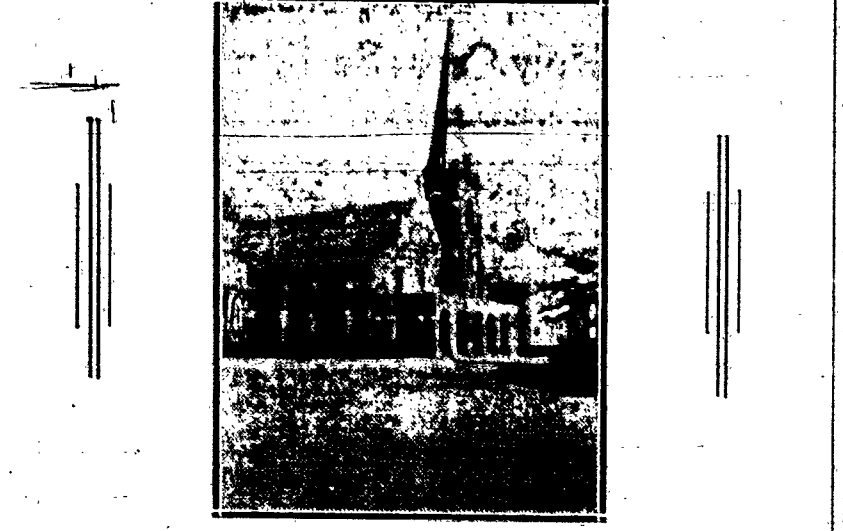
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
