

**Cardinal Vannutelli,
Dean of Sacred College,
Dies in 94th Year**

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Queen Catherine of Aragon. There was an announcement for his Eminence abruptly closed the proceedings and left the court.

Dean For Many Years

Vincenzo Cardinal Vannutelli was dean of the Sacred College for a longer period than any other Cardinal in modern times. He became dean on the death of Luigi Cardinal Gregorio di Santa Stefano, Dec. 6, 1913, who had officiated since the death of Cardinal Monaco in 1898.

In 1880, after the title of archbishop had been conferred upon him, he was deputed to Constantinople as papal envoy. His latter missions to the church carried him into many countries. He represented the sovereign Pontiff at the coronation of Alexander III of Russia and then was named nunzio to Lisbon.

A Delightful Personality

Cardinal Vannutelli had a delightful personality, and he was always a striking figure. He was six feet and five inches tall, probably the tallest Cardinal in all history. He was for many years well known in social and diplomatic circles in Europe. He was a virtuoso in art, a charming conversationalist, spoke several languages and was extremely approachable by high and low.

He had also been a great traveler, particularly in the Near East, and wrote several monographs of his journeys there. The best known is on Montenegro. He knew the late King Nicholas as Prince, and visited him at Cetinje, where the subject of conversation was invariably the possibility of the Greek Orthodox Church coming under the rule of the Pope. He was always optimistic regarding the settlement of the Roman question.

Loved Books and Pictures

He collected books and pictures, and for the last forty years he had resided in the famous Palazzo della Dataria, in the Via della Dataria, Rome. Here, as long as they lived, his elder brother, Serafino, also a Cardinal, and their sister, the Countess Kanizer, dwelt with him. Two years separated the brothers' ages, as they did their elevation to the purple. From this residence he took the title of "Datarius," and was supposed to be the Cardinal in "The Roman Mystery" of Richard Bagot, who was frequently his guest. For the last few years, however, Cardinal Kanizer had done little interesting, principally confining himself to his duties as dean, which included the address of loyalty to the Pontiff the day before Christmas, and to dedicating museums and re-established ecclesiastical edifices, the opening of playgrounds and the receiving of pilgrims.

was this Cardinal. He was always persona grata, not only where he went in his official capacity, but also at Vienna and Madrid, while in Berlin he had a warm friendship with the last German Kaiser until the last days of Pius X.

A Skilled Diplomat

For many years Cardinal Vannutelli was the principal diplomatic representative of the Vatican and because of his peculiar fitness for the role is said to have attended as representative of the Pope more important and royal and imperial ceremonies than any other member of the Sacred College.

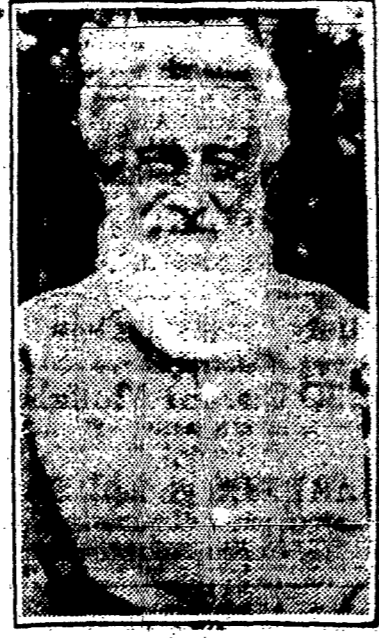
The bride and groom left on a trip to the Adirondacks and will be at home after July 19th at 13 North Elmwood, Albany.

The world knew very little about lepers, and Father Damien's life came as a startling revelation of heroic self-sacrifice. He is acknowledged the Apostle of the lepers, and whatever others may do in the same field will help to perpetuate his fame and his honour."

But the prayers and tears of hundreds of lepers are with Brother Joseph here, resting at last in preparation for a long, long journey, to join his friend and his ideal—Father Damien.
