From Hanyang, Hupeh, China, there comes a thrilling story sacking and burning, robbing and killing, vividly told by the Rev. Edward J. Galvin, Bishop of Hanyang, in a recent letter a personal friend, the Rev. John L. Maxwell, assistant priest at oly Cross Church, Ovid, N. Y. How the Bishop, four priests nd five Sisters were captured by Communists, two priests cared away, and how the others escaped almost by a miracle, is old in the following letter to Father Maxwell:

You probably have read in the pers of the attack by Communist indits on one of our largest mission ations here in my Vicariate, which s brought upon us a very heavy The press accounts are not mplete and some that have already I wish .account_of whole incident as I myself ex ienced it. I feel that this is due my friends whose fears for my rsonal safety it will allay, while I confident, too, that it will enlist e help of their prayers for the re ase of my two devoted priests who

were captured in the outrage and whose lives are in great danger

"We are living through a time of the greatest anxiety, comparable only to the reign of terror set up by the persecution of three years ago. During the past half year Communists and bandits have hordes_throughout They have been sacking our churche and residences, putting our priests to flight for their lives. making it extremely hazardous to carry on work. The people too, have been suffering intensely, for killing, burning, and robbing, in the most merci
