The Rt. Rev. Edward J. Galvin, Bishop of Hanyang, China, Writes Thrilling Story of Capture and Escape to Priest in Rochester Diocese—Two of His Priests Carried Away by Bandits.

ALMOST THE WHOLE OF HIS VICARIATE PROSTRATE, BLEEDING UNDER RED HAND

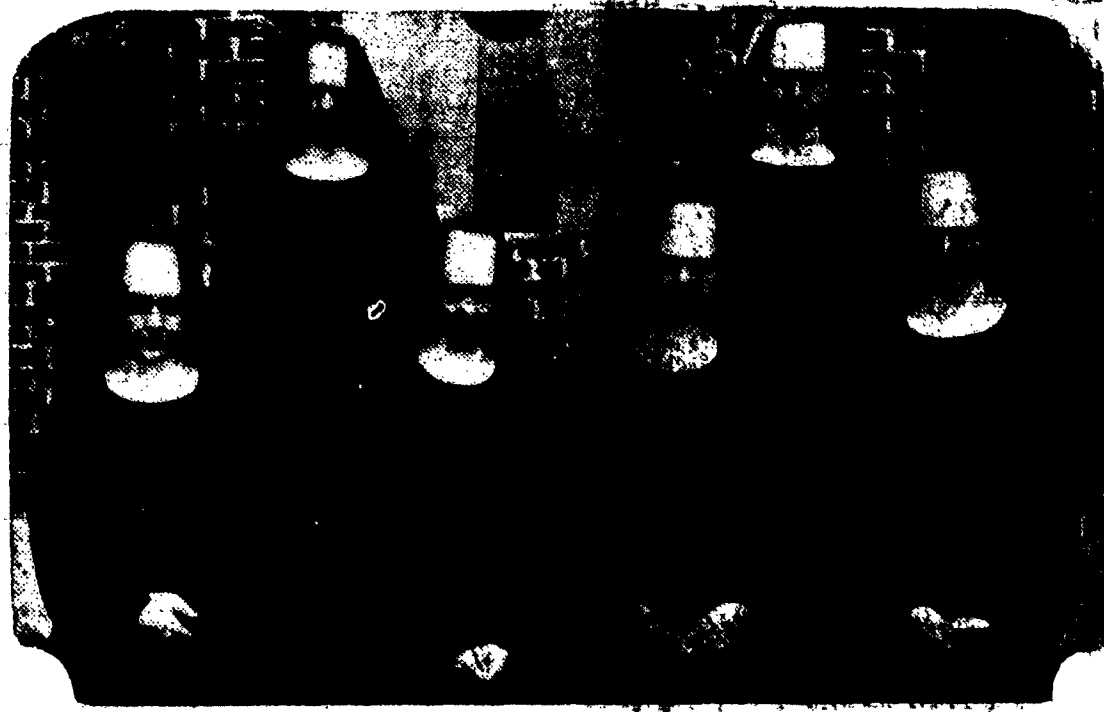
From Hanyang, Hupeh, China, there comes a thrilling story of sacking and burning, robbing and killing, vividly told by the Rt. Rev. Edward J. Galvin, Bishop of Hanyang, in a recent letter to a personal friend, the Rev. John L. Maxwell, assistant priest at Holy Cross Church, Ovid, N. Y. How the Bishop, four priests and five Sisters were captured by Communists, two priests carried away, and how the others escaped almost by a miracle, is told in the following letter to Father Maxwell:

My Dear Friend:  
"You probably have read in the papers of the attack by Communist bands on one of our largest missions here in my vicariate, which is brought upon us a very heavy trial. The press accounts are not complete and some that have already reached me are erroneous. I wish, therefore, to give a simple account of the whole incident as I myself experienced it. I feel that this is due my friends who have fears for my personal safety it will allow, while in confidence, too, that it will enable the help of their prayers for the release of my two devoted priests who

were captured in the outrage and whose lives are in great danger. "We are living through a time of the greatest anxiety, comparable only to the reign of terror set up by the persecution of three years ago. During the past half year Communists and bandits have appeared in armed hordes throughout our district. They have been sacking our churches and residences, putting our priests to flight for their lives and making it extremely hazardous to carry on our work. The people too, have been suffering intensely, for killing, burning, and robbing, in the most mer-

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### Will Found School For Girls in China



Six Benedictine nuns, from St. Benedict's College, St. Joseph, Minn., will sail the latter part of August for the Orient to join the staff of the Catholic University of Peking, where they will found a school for women which will be located in a palace opposite the university. All of the nuns have degrees and have had much experience as teachers. Sister Francesca, O.S.B., head of the economics department at St. Benedict's and a graduate of the University of Minnesota, will be superiors of the new community.

The nuns who will accompany her are: Sister Rosavne, O.S.B., teacher of English in the St. Cloud Cathedral high school; Sister Rachel, O.S.B., Latin teacher at Watpeton; Sister Wiberla, O.S.B., science teacher of Old Spring; Sister Donalda, O.S.B., romance language teacher at St. Benedict's; and Sister Regina, O.S.B., who will be in charge of the living quarters. The new foundation by the sisters has been arranged by the Rev. Francis Clougherty, O.S.B., superior priest

of the Poi Wen academy, Kailong, and provincial examiner for students to the United States, and by the Rt. Rev. Joseph F. Busch, D.D., Bishop of St. Cloud. Ten Benedictine and a few secular priests will also leave the United States at the same time to fill positions at the university. The priests are all graduates, with doctor's degrees, from secular and Roman institutions. They will teach in the four schools of the university—arts, sciences, fine arts and the seminary.

### Pope Warns United States To Beware of Bolshevism During Depression Here

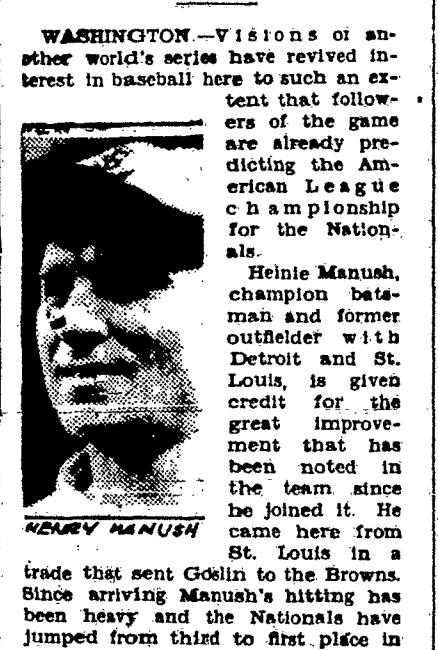
Says Financial Depression and Unemployment Make Fertile Field For Agents of Trouble and Discontent Warning Is Given Monsignor Ryan.

PARISH FOUNDED IN OCTOBER, 1928, HAS PROGRESSED IN A REMARKABLE MANNER

The cornerstone of the new Parochial School of the Good Counsel Church, on Brooks Avenue at Geneva, will be laid at 8:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, July 20th. The Rt. Rev. "These good women are known as the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity, and they came to Rochester on June 16th after a site of twelve and one-half acres of ground had been secured for them in this very desirable location in the Laurelton or Ironside-Quail district. There are five cloistered sisters, and one out-sister who will wait on the public. The strict rules of the cloister will not be maintained until after the inspection and until the necessary enclosure can be provided for their new convent."

"On last Wednesday morning, the new Mother Superior, Mary of St. Agnes, was solemnly installed by the Bishop in accordance with the rules of the Order. She will be assisted by Sister Mary of St. Anne, commonly known as Mother St. Anne."

Nature of Their Work  
"They will at the earliest possible moment undertake the special work of their Order, viz. to receive girls who may be entrusted to them for protection and character building, and who need their mothering on account of improper surroundings."
