Gross Point Village, Mich., July 18.—Police Commissioner Leo O. Teetaert arrived home from a trip to New York City recently to find his house full of wreaths and other floral pieces, his wife in tears and members of Gabriel Richard Council, No. 2463, Knights of Columbus, gathered to sympathize with Mrs. Teetaert. When he entered the house his wife fainted, his friends exclaimed, "Is it really you?" and an undertaker reached for a Murad. Teetaert learned that he "was killed in an automobile accident in Newark, New Jersey." He denied it.

Police Guards Leave the Grave Of Father Power

Malden, Mass., July 18.—Because so few visitors came now to the grave of Father Patrick Power, in Holy Cross Cemetery here, the state police patrol at the grave has been abandoned. The troopers came here to act as guards at the grave nine months ago.

From a guard of 10 men, made necessary by the influx of thousands of pilgrims daily at the time that Cardinal O'Connell ordered the cemetery barred to the public, the force on duty had dwindled until only two were left. Now these have gone.

Radio Soloist

Miss Hazel C. Arth, the Washington "contralto," who is singing this summer with Father Finn's Medico-avallists in the Sunday evening Catholic Hour broadcast under the auspices of the National Council of Catholic Men, came into musical prominence in 1928 as winner of the Second National Radio Audition, sponsored by the Atwater Kent Foundation of Philadelphia.



Miss Arth won the Foundation award of \$5,000 and two years' instruction to prepare her for a professional musical career. She will be heard with the Medico-avallists every Sunday evening during the Catholic Hour, a county-wide presentation of the National Broadcasting Company. Miss Arth is a Washingtonian by birth and is a daughter of the late John W. Arth, for thirty years a member of the famous United States Marine Band. She is a graduate of the Immaculate Conception Academy in Washington where she obtained her first musical training.

Miss Arth, at present, is studying in New York with Frank LaForge. On July 31 Mr. LaForge will present her in a private recital in New York.

During the July Catholic Hour programs Miss Arth will sing the following solo parts, in addition to her singing with the ensemble: July 13th, "Oh Divine Redeemer," July 30th, "The Lord Is Mindful of His Own."

Bishop of "Mission of Blood" Takes Leave of Ppe for China, And Goes Back With Firm Faith

(Pipes Service)

Rome, July 18.—With the blessing of the Father of Christendom on him and his peripatetic, His Lordship Bishop Noel Gubbeli, O.F.M., has left Rome for his field, the Vicariate Apostolic of Ichang, a thousand miles from the coast in interior China. This territory has the dolorous record of having witnessed seven persecutions in the last 24 years which have cost the lives of two Bishops Theophile Verhaegen and Trudon Jans—seven priests and 14 Chinese Christians, and thus has earned the title of "mission of blood."

Bishop Gubbeli was named by the Holy See March 25, 1929, as successor to Bishop Jans who with two priests was killed September 9, 1929. He was consecrated in Rome on May 11 by Cardinal Van Rossum. After 18 years of missionary life in China Bishop Gubbeli was called to Rome in 1921 as Secretary General for Missions at the Franciscan Generalate and while in the Eternal City took care of several important commissions for the Holy See. It has been widely remarked that this prelate of 56 years is gifted with an intelligence, a capacity for initiative, and an apostolic ardor beyond the ordinary. His gracious personality makes him a very attractive figure.

Sons Celebrate The Funeral Mass For Their Mother

Rev. Lewis Edelman and Rev. Adolph Edelman Are Celebrant and Sub-Deacon for Lewis Edelman.

The Rev. Lewis Edelman of Pittsford was celebrant, and the Rev. Adolph Edelman of Rochester was sub-deacon of the solemn high requiem Mass for their father, Lewis Edelman, in St. Bridget's Church on Thursday morning last week. Mr. Edelman died on Monday, aged 85 years. The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, was present at the funeral, and there were many priests and a large congregation of relatives and friends. Rev. J. B. Sullivan was deacon of the Mass, and Rev. Arthur A. Hughes was assistant. The Canon, other officiators of the Mass were: Rev. Michael Krieg and Rev. John Smith, deacons of honor; Rev. Eugene Spilling, master of ceremonies; Rev. Francis Hofer, book-bearer, and Rev. Walter Foery, candle-bearer. Among those present in the sanctuary were: Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, D.D., vicar general; Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. J. Nolan, chancellor, and Rev. Charles Reynolds, assistant chancellor. Sixty other priests of the diocese occupied pews with Rev. J. J. Bresnahan, pastor of the church.

The following members of Rochester Council Knights of Columbus acted as honorary escort: Valentine Knapp, Joseph Nagle, George Garney, John Wollensack, the active bearers were Judge William Allen, John Meagher, Charles Saunders, Francis Madigan, Harry Crowley, and James Hanna. The final blessing at the grave was given by Rev. Lewis Edelman. Interment was in the family plot at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Mr. Edelman was a highly respected business man, and he had many friends. He is survived by four sons, Edward C. of Rochester, the Rev. Louis W., Pittsford; George L. Rochester, and the Rev. Adolph F., Rochester; two daughters, Sister Anne Joseph of Rochester, and Sister M. Angela of Toledo, and seven grandchildren.

American Niece, In Connecticut, Mourns Cardinal

New London, Conn., July 18.—A warm and happy relationship which time and distance failed to affect was terminated between Vincenzo Cardinal Vannutelli, Dean of the Sacred College, and his niece, Mrs. Emma Crocchia, of this city, with the prelate's death in Vatican City.

Before coming to America from Italy thirty years ago, Mrs. Crocchia, then Miss Emma Vannutelli, was married to Dr. Crocchia by Cardinal Vannutelli. Ten years later she returned to Italy to visit her uncle. In 1910 she and uncle came to the United States after attending the Eucharistic Congress at Montreal as a representative of the Pope.

Mrs. Crocchia, whose father, the late Enrico Vannutelli was a brother of the prelate maintained a regular correspondence with Cardinal Vannutelli. She received her last letter from him six months ago.

New Treasurer Appointed For Creighton Univ.

Omaha, Neb., July 18.—Rev. Thomas Murphy, S.J., formerly of Cleveland, O., has just been appointed to succeed Rev. Francis J. Esterman, S.J., as treasurer of Creighton University.

Father Esterman has gone to Chicago, where he will become treasurer of the Chicago province of the Society of Jesus. He has been treasurer at Creighton for the past six years.

Kansas Priest, Former Resident, Visited In City

Rev. William L. Rice, in West Many Years, But Remains Chaplain of St. Boniface Commandery.

During the past week Rochester was favored with a visit from one of her former sons—Rev. William L. Rice, Rector of St. Mary's Church, Port Scott, Kansas. He came here from Dayton, Ohio, where he attended the national convention of the Knights of St. John. Although he has been in the West over a quarter of a century, Father Rice is still chaplain of St. Boniface Commandery, No. 25, Knights of St. John, and he never misses one of their bi-annual get-togethers.

This year, in spite of the fact that in Dayton the thermometer registered 94 in the shade, and the payments actually radiated heat, he marched at the head of his "boys" as he calls the members of No. 25, and only fell out of line when the order came for all to disband.

Father Rice went West years ago for his health, where he has been instrumental in the rapid growth of the several parishes that have been under his guiding hand. He has given no thought to himself in the furtherance of his work, and there is no one in the Wichita diocese, in which Father Rice's parish is located, who has the welfare of his fellow-men more at heart, or who would do more for his neighbor.

This genial priest has now left for his Kansas home, but the imprint of his kindly and gentle personality, brilliant brain and loyal and generous heart on all with whom he came in contact will not soon be erased.

New University in China

Peking, China, July 18.—The new building of the Catholic University of Peking, China, is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy in September. The size of the new edifice, 400 by 260 feet, is attracting attention in the ancient Chinese capital. The present roster of the University totals 370, many of whom are pagans.
