### Te Deum Marks Anniversary Of Belgian Liberty

Belgian Royal Family Attends Solemn Service in Cathedral in Brussels—London Ceremony, Too.

Brussels, July 25.—The Belgian royal family Monday attended a solemn Te Deum, sung in the cathedral of St. Gudule in celebration of Belgium's independence centenary. After the service King Albert laid wreaths on the tomb of martyrs of the Revolution of 1830 and the Unknown Warrior of the World War. More than 2,000 Burgomasters were entertained at luncheon at Chateau de Balnear, which the royal family attended.

London, July 25.—Cardinal Bourne presided at a service Monday in Westminster Cathedral, commemorating the 100th anniversary of Belgian independence. Ambassador Charles G. Dawes and other foreign diplomats attended the ceremony.

### Pope Not To Use Castle Gondolfo For His Vacation

Vatican City, July 25.—Pope Pius will not spend his vacation at the summer palace Castle Gondolfo, according to a semi-official announcement. But he may visit the grounds here entirely unannounced to see what needs to be done toward the restoration of the property.

The Pope has not yet approved any plan for the restoration or transformation of the pontifical villa. Work has therefore been in a state of suspense at the castle.

There is really only one habitable modern apartment in the palace which is suitable enough for the Pope. It is the section known as Villa Barberini. There are no appropriate accommodations for the members of the Pope's suite, who would have to accompany him.

It is considered out of the question now for him to go either to the Benedictine Abbey of Monte Cassino, he scene of his last retreat before becoming Archbishop of Milan in 1921, or to the Valley Aosta, reported for a time to be under consideration.

Mgr. Anacleto Dominioni, the Pope's chamberlain, who would certainly accompany His Holiness, were he to go, and who would be charged with making the detailed arrangements, already has left on his vacation, and is not expected to return before the middle of August.

The fact that other important members of the Papal Court have also started on their vacations is taken to mean that the Pope told them he had no intention of going outside the Vatican and that hence they were free to go.

### Two New Saints, Noble Heroines, Faithful to God

St. Catherine Thomas a Cloistered Nun—St. Lucia Filippini Founded Congregation of Teachers

Vatican City, July 25.—Father Clifford Kings, S.V.D., founder of the Catholic "Students' Mission" Circle U.S.A., has been captured by Chinese bandits. It is announced in a telegram received from Shanghai, China, under date of June 9th. Grave fears are felt for the two Spanish Jesuits, Father Avila and Hidalgo, whose capture was announced by recent information received at the Jesuit headquarters, while denouncing infidelity in a warning regarding the two Irish priests of St. Columban's Foreign Mission Society.

Father Clifford Kings is stationed at Los-Angeles in the Perfectus Apostolate of Sinyanclow, Honan, China. His capture reveals the sad fate of the present Prefet Apostolic of Sinyanclow, Monsignor Praevius, S.V.D., 64 years old, who last year spent 15 days in a filthy, win-dowless, vermin-infested hut.

The prefecture of Sinyanclow was erected December 15, 1927, by a division of the Vicariate of Nanyang in Southern Honan. The Fathers of the Divine Word are in charge, with 14 foreign priests and one Chinese, five brothers and 13 sisters.

Fathers Avila and Hidalgo, Spanish Jesuits of the Vicariate of Wuhu, disappeared when the Town of Huchang, Anhwei, was captured, and no news of their fate was obtainable until recently. It is now established that they escaped to the mountains and hid in the house of a Christian. The bandits ferreted them out and carried them off, demanding ransom.

### Arpb. E. J. Hanna Is Coming Here To Marry Niece

San Francisco Prelate Will Officiate at Wedding of Miss Eleanor Hanna Bassett and J. Frank Trainor on July 29th.

The Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, D.D., Archbishop of San Francisco, will come to Rochester to officiate on Tuesday, July 29th, at the marriage of his niece, Miss Eleanor Hanna Bassett, daughter of Mrs. William T. Bassett of Prince Street, to J. Frank Trainor, of the University Club, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin L. Trainor of Plattsburg, N. Y. The ceremony will take place in Corpus Christi Church at 10:30 A. M.

Invitations have been issued for the wedding, and the event will be one of the notable weddings of the season. Miss Ann Bassett, sister of the bride, will be maid of honor, and Alben Trainor, brother of the bridegroom, will be best man. Others are to be Norman Crowley, Walter Hisey, Austin Donovan, Henry Decher, Dr. J. J. Pluzan and Edward H. Bassett, brother of the bride, and Martin Trainor, brother of the bridegroom.

### Chicken Thief, Robbing a Coop, Shot by Priest

Louisville, Ky., July 25.—Arthur Hunt, 46 years old, was shot and seriously wounded Sunday by Rev. Justin Smith, aged 49, of St. Agnes' Church, who told the police he caught the man robbing the church chicken coop. Hunt recently completed a prison sentence for chicken stealing.

The priest said the church sold eggs, and that about \$100 worth of fowls had been stolen recently. No charge was placed against him.

### Mixed Bathing Is Prohibited By Irish Council

Galway Passes Ordinance and Receives the Hearty Thanks of the Bishop of the Diocese.

Dublin, July 25.—An ordinance was passed recently by the Galway Municipal Council prohibiting mixed bathing and the presence of men in the promenade vicinity of women's bathing pools. In the course of the discussion which related to the ways and means that should be adopted for the enforcement of the law, one councillor cited an instance where a "gentleman" drove men away from the vicinity of a women's bathing pool.

The Rt. Rev. Thomas O'Doherty, Bishop of the United Dioceses of Galway and Kilmacduagh and Apostolic Administrator of Kiltenera, in the course of a sermon declared that he himself was the "gentleman" referred to by the councillor and he complimented the municipality for enacting such a law and concerning itself with its enforcement. The Bishop added that the men concerned were not natives of Galway where, he said, public feeling against mixed bathing runs high.

The municipality of Youghal also prohibits mixed bathing.

### Annual Service At The Grave Of John P. Mitchel

Flowers and Prayers by Friends, and Brief Memorial Service by Priest for Former Mayor of New York.

New York, July 25.—The twelfth anniversary of the death of John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor of New York from 1913 to 1917, was observed last Saturday by the annual pilgrimage of the Mitchel commissioners and friends to his grave in Woodlawn Cemetery, and by a brief memorial service, conducted by the Very Rev. A. N. Archibald, rector of the Church of Notre Dame, at Morningside Heights. The American flag was held aloft, and the American Legion colors dipped in salute while Father Archibald read appropriate prayers above the grave. A bugler of the sixteenth Infantry, Fort Jay, ended the ceremony with "Taps."

Mayor Mitchel was killed in a fall while in the army aviation service in July, 1918, at Lake Charles, La., July 13th marked, the 51st anniversary of Mr. Mitchel's birth.

Former Magistrate W. Bruce Cobb, who presided at the ceremony declared that Mayor Mitchel's accomplishments for the city and the country are their own best memorial. Commander Henry Varay of the John Purroy Mitchel Post of the American Legion said the members of the post endeavored "to follow his footsteps in his military career and to emulate his heroic and self-sacrificing spirit, understood while he was in power."

Wreaths were laid at the grave on behalf of the Mitchel commissioners, the Legion post and the class of '09 of Columbia University, with which Mayor Mitchel was graduated.

### Crippled Children's Hospital Has \$250,000 Annex Dedicated At Port Jefferson, L. I., Sunday

Greater Need For Interest in Catholic Institutions is Felt, Priest Says at Dedication Ceremony A Splendid Work.

Port Jefferson, L. I., July 25.—There is greater need for more interest and generosity towards Catholic charitable institutions on the part of wealthy Catholics, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Francis J. O'Hara, supervisor of charities for the diocese of Brooklyn, told 1,000 persons at the dedication of the new \$250,000 Wharton Memorial Institute at this place Sunday afternoon. Our wealthy Catholic people seem to fall behind those of non-Catholic and Jewish faith, he said, in their generosity to Catholic institutions, and he cited the fact that Yale University received \$23,000,000 in legacies during the past year.

For Crippled Children  
The Wharton Institute is a new addition to the St. Charles Hospital, conducted here by the Daughters of Wisdom for blind, crippled and defective children, and which cared for nearly 1,500 children last year. The Institute will enable the Sisters to enlarge and broaden their work. It was made possible through a bequest of \$250,000 by William J. Wharton, a resident of the Bay Ridge section of Brooklyn and a parishioner of the Church of Our Lady of Angels.

The Rt. Rev. Thomas E. Molloy, D.D., Bishop of Brooklyn, officiated at the dedication ceremonies. Bishop Molloy said in his address:

"The Daughters of Wisdom deserve great praise in providing for the care and treatment of handicapped children. The benefactor, Mr. Wharton, has given practical evidence of this belief. He was a true follower of the divine Saviour and has indeed given a magnificent expression of the divine belief in giving this building, which will take care of the more mentally defective children, also promoting physical, spiritual and mental welfare."

**Mrs. Brady Says She Has Not Given Home for Convent**  
Baden, Baden, July 25.—Mrs. Nicholas Brady of New York, now in Europe, says there is no truth in the report that she intends to give her Manhattan estate to the Church for a convent. She intends to live there when she returns in September, she says.

Mrs. Brady, the former Genevieve Garvan, is the widow of Nicholas F. Brady, the first layman in the United States to receive the title of Papal Chamberlain. He died on March 27th, leaving his entire estate, estimated at upward of \$500,000 to his widow.

The estate at Manhattan is one of the largest on the North Shore, covering 60 acres. It is valued at more than \$2,000,000. It is beautifully landscaped and has an 18-hole golf course. On the estate is a private chapel containing a shrine in which, by special dispensation of the Pope, Mass is said on religious holidays and Sundays.
