Dr. E. V. O'Hara Is Named Bishop Great Falls, Mont.

Director of Rural Life Bureau of National Catholic Welfare Conference Will Succeed the Rt. Rev. M. C. Lenihan.

Great Falls, Aug. 15.—The Rev. Dr. Edwin V. O'Hara, Director of the Rural Life Bureau of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, has been named Bishop of Great Falls, Montana.

Dr. O'Hara will succeed the Rt. Rev. Matthias C. Lenihan, whose resignation, tendered because of his advanced age and consequent physical handicap, was accepted by the Holy See in February of this year. Bishop Lenihan was raised to the rank of Archbishop and named to the titular See of Prevalava.

Dr. O'Hara was born on a farm near Lanesboro, Minnesota, and received his elementary education in a one-room country school, and attended high school at Lanesboro. Upon his graduation from St. Thomas College, St. Paul, Minn., June, 1900, he entered St. Paul's Seminary. Following his ordination, Dr. O'Hara was assigned as Assistant Pastor at St. Mary's Cathedral, Portland, Ore., where he subsequently became pastor in 1912, occupying that position until June, 1920, with the exception of the year of 1918, spent in France as a chaplain of the A. E. F.

He also served as diocesan superintendent of schools for the archdiocese. He has served on numerous public commissions rendering valuable public services. He is now engaged in a survey of the Catholic apologetic movement in the United States.

Great Falls Diocese has a Catholic population of 32,425. There are 68 priests and 133 churches and missions in the diocese.
Dr. O'Hara's work in connection with the Catholic Rural Life movement has been outstanding.
