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Summer School Pays Good Honor To Joyce Kilmer

Memorial Exercises Held, and Beautifully Engraved Scroll is Placed Upon a Tree at Cliff Haven, N. Y.

Thursday noon memorial exercises in honor of Joyce Kilmer were held in front of the Autumn Harvest Cottage. Tradition has it that Kilmer received his inspiration to write his well known poem, "Trees," here at Cliff Haven. A beautifully inscribed and embossed scroll, suitably framed, was placed on one of the trees in front of the cottage. The art work was done by Martin J. Jennings, who teaches art at Boys' High School, Brooklyn, N. Y., and in the Fordham center here at Cliff Haven. It contains a short statement referring to the tradition, together with the poem, and one in honor of "The Poet of Trees" written by Rev. John B. Kelly, director of the Catholic Writer's Guild. Father Kelly read his poem, and Rev. Vincent C. Donovan, O. P., sang Kilmer's poem.

Yale Professor Praises Catholics for Believing in the Divinity of Christ

Noyes, Stella Kaye-Smith, all brought up elsewhere, have joined the Catholic Church. "The last thing I wish to suggest is social snobbery; I do not care a rap for any one's social position, unless there are brains and character behind it. What I wish to emphasize as a fact of deepest significance is the enormous elevation in social and intellectual distinction which I have seen in the Catholic Church. Holds Firmly to Faith "If this had been accomplished according to the wish of Thomas Hardy, that is, if in order to secure recruits from persons of intellectual and social prestige, the Catholic Church had revised its creed, or had made compromises with the world, (that would have helped to prove something other than it has proved. But the Catholic Church has made no deductions from its faith; it has made no compromises; it does not take any converts on their terms. It takes them all, poor and rich, cultivated and ignorant, on its terms. Many Protestant ministers, and many professors in Protestant seminaries, regard faith in the divinity of Christ, in a personal God, and in the future life as unimportant; if they think so, then they are correct in not believing in any of these. But as it is intelligent to continue in their profession as ministers and teachers of future matters? For the real difficulty with Protestantism today is not in the press but in the pulpit. The hungry sheep look up and are not fed. The chief reason, I think, why so many persons are added to the Catholic Church is not because of the ritual, beautiful and impressive as that is, it is because the Catholics live out their faith. It is refreshing to enter a Catholic Church and breathe the atmosphere of faith. Christianity Founded on Christ. 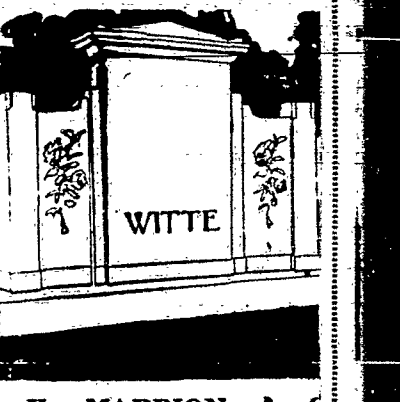
