Juvenile Delinquency, Care of Dependent Children, Hospital Charity and Catholic Action Among Spanish and Mexican People, On the Program.

Washington, Aug. 22.—Methods in the prevention and treatment of juvenile delinquency, "chaplains" as a life in penal institutions, relations between Catholic agencies and community chests, and Catholic action among Spanish and Mexican people in the United States, are among the subjects of major interest to be discussed at the annual meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities which will be held here September 28th to October 2nd.

King Ferry, Aug. 22. Plans are being completed for the first big church picnic of the season in Southern Cayuga County. On Labor Day, Our Lady of the Lake Church will have its outing on the church grounds in the Village of King Ferry.

The event will be the first under the direction of the Rev. George Kalb, who has recently assumed the pastorate. He is receiving the loyal support of the parishioners in the big undertaking. Rev. S. Woywood Appointed Head Of New College

St. Bonaventure Professor, International Authority on Canon Law, Heads Holy Name College.

St. Bonaventure, Aug. 22.—The Rev. Stanislaus Woywood, O.P.M., I.L.D., internationally recognized authority on Canon Law, will be the first superior of Holy Name College at Washington, D. C. The new house of studies, now approaching completion, will be opened on October 4th as a theological institution.

The announcement of the appointment came following the Provincial Chapter of Holy Name Province, Order of Friars Minor, held last week, and presided over by the Very Rev. Bonaventura Ryan, O.P.M., Provincial. Father Stanislaus has been making his home at St. Bonaventure's Seminary since 1925, during which time he has taught canon law and pastoral theology. His original research work has, however, necessitated his frequent absences from the institution. He was absent when the great fire of last May destroyed most of the buildings of the seminary and college. Probably Father Stanislaus suffered the greatest loss of all the revered friars. During many years, this Franciscan had picked up in the out-of-the-way libraries of Europe and America many books and manuscripts that could not be replaced, and these were all destroyed by the fire. In addition, manuscripts upon which Father Stanislaus had spent years of work were also destroyed.

First Jesuit to Die in Japan Since Great Persecution Checked Growth of Faith in 16th Century

The Rev. Joseph Dalhmann, S.J., One of Founders of Catholic University of Tokyo, Accomplished Great Work in the Land.

Tokyo, (Flides Service) Aug. 22. The recent death of the Rev. Joseph Dalhmann, S.J., one of the founders of the Catholic University of Tokyo, Japan, recalls the fact that he was the first Jesuit to die in modern Japan. As is well known, toward the end of the sixteenth century the Catholic Church flourished in Japan, counting a million members, and among the missionary forces the Jesuits were very prominent.

The great persecution broke forth during which many were put to death while others were made to depart with the result that by the middle of the seventeenth century no foreign priests remained and the faith, except in the remarkable seacoast colony of Nagasaki, was stamped out. Though the right to again teach Christianity was granted in Japan in the second half of the nineteenth century Jesuits were not counted among the missionaries until 1908 when Father Dalhmann was one of three who entered the country for the establishment of the Catholic University of Tokyo. His never again left Japan, rendering very valuable services as a scholar to both Japan and to the Church.

Irish Leaders Honored Sunday In Dublin City

Commemoration Services for Michael Collins, Arthur Griffith and Kevin O'Higgins Held by Government Officials

Dublin, Aug. 22. Large crowds gathered Sunday on the lawn of the government buildings to honor the memory of the dead Free State leaders, Arthur Griffith, first President of the Free State Government, Michael Collins and Kevin O'Higgins, at the annual commemoration ceremonies.

A cenotaph bearing plaques for the three leaders was the center of the proceedings. President William Cosgrave and the Free State Cabinet ministers sat on the right of it, and Governor General James McNeill and the diplomatic corps on the left. The widow of President Griffith and the widow and children of Mr. O'Higgins were present. A wreath inscribed in Irish "From the people of Ireland" was laid at the foot of the cenotaph by President Cosgrave. Then busts were sounded and three volleys were fired. "Last post" was then blown and troops and civic guards marched past.

Says Communists Are Real Menace To Civilization

Maryknoll Mission Priest, Ten Years in China, Says If "Reds" Win in China The World Will Face Big Problem.

Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 22.—Rev. Francis J. Caffrey, M.M., member of the Maryknoll Mission Society of priests, home here after 10 years as a missionary in China, spoke Sunday on the dangers of the spread of Communism in China. If the "Reds" win in China, Father Caffrey declared, "there will then exist a real menace to civilization itself."

"In China today," Father Caffrey said, "the people are, in many instances, fighting for their very existence, but those who are fighting the government are fighting mostly under the standard handed them by the 'Red' hosts of Russia, who, having impregnated these people with the virus of revolt against all authority, are now standing on the sidelines watching for the ultimate abandonment of China to a Bolshevik regime." And if such a regime triumphs in China, with its teeming millions of population and its resources, the rest of the world will have a gigantic task on its hands to prevent that regime from spreading throughout the world, Father Caffrey declared.

Urban College Has Many Races Among Students Twenty-Seven Nationalities Are Represented Among Its Students—Priests Go Forth to Many Lands.

Vatican City, Aug. 22.—Graduates of the Urban College of Propaganda, Rome, will serve as priests in nine different countries and will be replaced by students of more than 11 countries, keeping up the international character of this 300-year-old mission training institution which today counts 27 nationalities among its scholars. The graduates include four Chinese, two Japanese, two Dutch for mission work in Norway, one Rumanian, three Australians, one Irish, one Scot, one Venezuelan, and one American. Next year's entrants include 15 Chinese, three Japanese, 5 Indians, three Annamites, six Australians, two New Zealanders, one Turk, two from Smyrna, three South Africans, and several from England, America, and sections of Europe.

The Urban College of Propaganda was created and approved by Pope Urban VIII in 1627 as a college "designed to gather, educate and prepare for the priesthood and the Christian apostolate young men of every nation and then to send them forth to propagate and defend the faith throughout the world." Last year the ancient building which had housed the institution for 300 years was given over to the offices of the Pontifical Mission Societies and the students transferred to the new buildings under construction near the Vatican. Two stories of the new seminary will be used during the coming year.
