Bishop of Omaha Invites Catholic Laity of America To Eucharistic Congress

The Rt. Rev. Joseph F. Rummel, D. D., Urges All Who Possibly Can Attend the Congress to Come to Omaha September 23, 24 and 25—Railroad Rates will be Reduced.

Omaha, Neb., Aug. 22.—The Rt. Rev. Joseph Francis Rummel, D.D., Bishop of Omaha, has just issued a cordial invitation to the Catholic laity of America to attend the Sixth National Eucharistic Congress in Omaha, to be held in Omaha on September 23, 24 and 25. Many thousands of the laity, and hundreds of priests and bishops will be present, including the Apostolic Delegate, the Most Rev. Pietro Pomasini Biondi, Cardinal Mundelein of Chicago, and more than a score of bishops and archbishops. Reduced rates will be granted on all railroads.

Bishop Rummel's Letter
 "To the Catholic Laity of America: Recently we joined the Rt. Rev. Joseph Schrembs, D.D., Bishop of Cleveland and Protector of the Priests' Eucharistic League in extending to our brethren of the Clergy a cordial invitation to attend the Sixth National Eucharistic Congress, to be held under the auspices of the Priests' Eucharistic League, in the City of Omaha, September 23rd, 24th and 25th, 1930.
 "By gracious leave of the Hierarchy, it is now our further privilege to extend a similar invitation, in the name of the League and in behalf of our entire Diocese, to the Catholic Laity of America to participate in this event and to unite with Hierarchy and Clergy in rendering public homage to the Central Mystery of our Holy Faith.
 "What the Congress is
 "A Eucharistic Congress is essentially a public profession of our faith in the Real Presence of Jesus Christ in the Most Holy Eucharist. It affords an opportunity for giving expression to those sentiments of love and gratitude, which the devout Catholic heart experiences, when it recalls the many graces and blessings which flow from this Sacrament, and prompts us to make solemn reparation for the many injuries, inflicted by believer and unbeliever, upon the Majesty of God especially in the Most Holy Eucharist.
 "The Congress program, in which impressive exercises will alternate with inspiring discourses, will unfold a demonstration of Catholic faith and zeal, which will not only stir our own hearts but also edify our fellow Americans, irrespective of creed or church affiliation.
 "A Powerful Influence
 "When we recall the powerful influence upon the religious life of the National Congress of Chicago in 1926,

America, exerted by the International Congress, the ardent desire and hope that a similar effect may result from this concentration of our thoughts and affections upon the great Sacrament of life and love. Surely America, daily growing colder and more formal in its spirituality, constantly more remote and indifferent in its religious life, needs nothing so urgently as the light and warmth, which emanate from the Sacred Heart of the Saviour. Who is really, truly and substantially present in the Most Holy Eucharist!
 "Therefore, we deem it a sacred privilege to invite you, our dear American Catholic men and women, to come and co-operate with us in making the Congress of Omaha a noble profession of Catholic Faith, an edifying manifestation of Catholic piety, a proof to all America that religion still dominates the minds and hearts of men and gives them power to make their lives sublime. It is our firm conviction that this solemn act of public homage will bring an abundant benediction from the Tabernacle of Jesus Christ into our souls, into our homes and into our beloved country.

Supreme Director Swift, speaking of the new League said:

 "Slander and libel to the seventh generation has prevented eminent men from becoming public leaders.
 "The Mammoth Installation
 The greatest ceremony ever held in the history of the Knights of Columbus filled Boston Garden to capacity Monday night when the joint installation of officers of the Massachusetts councils took place before a gathering of between 20,000 and 25,000 members of the order. Approximately 2,000 officers of the 155 Massachusetts councils were installed in a magnificent ritualistic ceremony that marked a high point in Knights of Columbus ceremonies and brought to a climax the first three days of the 48th annual supreme convention of the Order.
 The Garden gathering was acknowledged by supreme officers to be the greatest meeting the order has ever held since the day nine Catholic men in the city of New Haven took the first steps to found an order that has since grown to include some 700,000 members and 2200 councils. It was conducted under the Knights of Columbus ritual, a symbolic pageantry of beauty and grace, and provided a picturesque spectacle for the thousands of members from all parts of the country.

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
