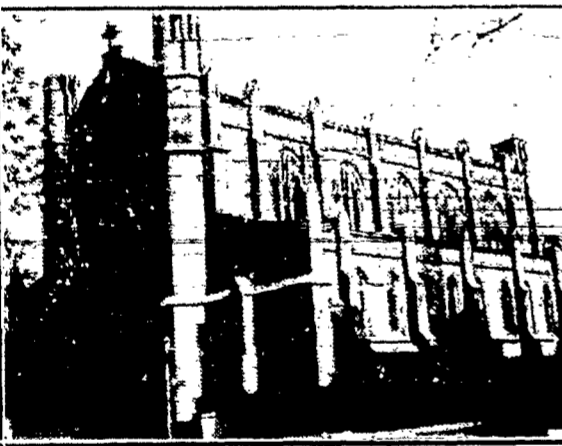

J. C. Cunningham, A Good Citizen

Prominent Contractor and Builder Succumbs to Long Illness—His Funeral on Monday Was Largely Attended.

Elmira, Aug. 29.—John C. Cunningham, aged 76, good citizen, prominent contractor and successful business man, died at his home, 103 South Avenue, last Friday after an extended illness.

Mr. Cunningham was a splendid example of what can be done in this county by a young man of energy, ambition and integrity. Beginning life as an ordinary carpenter, he developed and built up one of the most progressive and successful contracting organizations in this part of the State.

Mr. Cunningham was active in politics. He served the Democratic Party as committeeman in the district over a long period of years. He was an alderman representing the Eleventh Ward in 1904, 1905 and 1906.

For nearly 25 years Mr. Cunningham served as city assessor, and in all this time he won and held the respect of all citizens, regardless of political affiliations.

He is survived by two sons, William and Robert, and a daughter, Mrs. Mary J. Cunningham. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus and of the Elks Club.

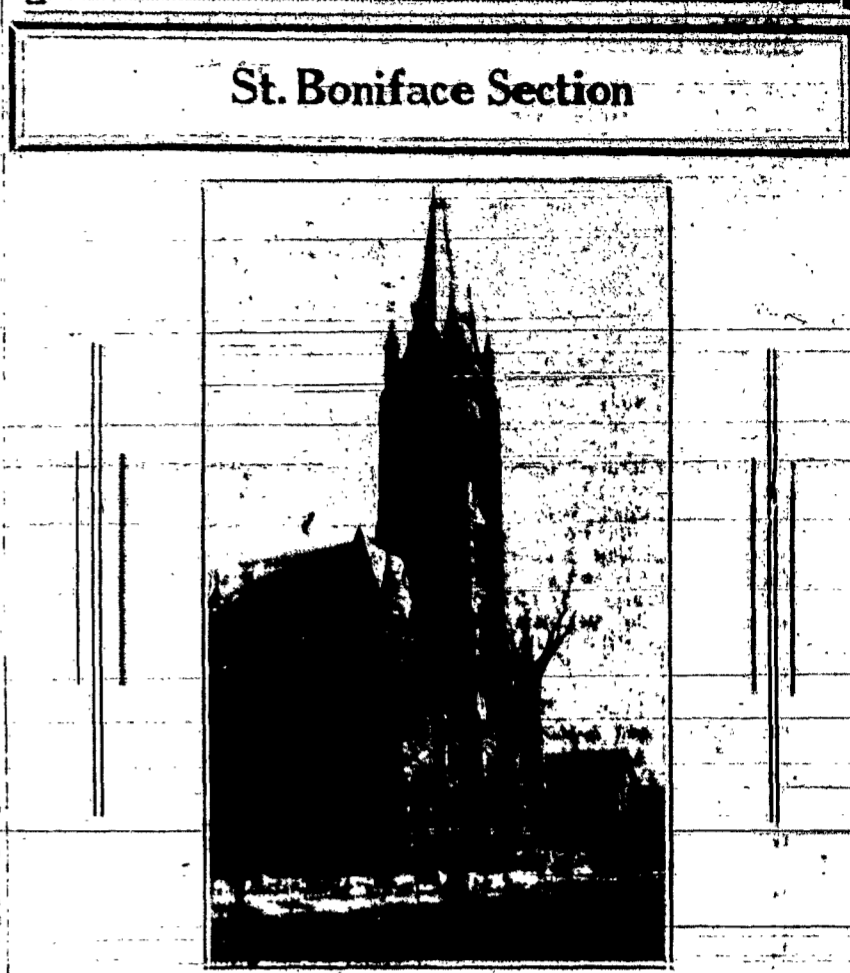
Church Picnic Was A Great Success
