

Catholic High School in Elmira, The First Ever Conducted in City, Opens With Twenty-Five Pupils

Only First-Year Subjects Will Be Taught This Year—Curriculum Will Be Increased Until Fall Course is Taught.

Elmira, Sept. 5.—The new Catholic High School, to be conducted in the SS. Peter & Paul parochial school, was opened on Tuesday this week, with a registration of 25 students. This is the first time a Catholic High School has been conducted in Elmira, and the project is meeting with ready favor throughout the city.

The high school is not limited to the children of SS. Peter & Paul's parish, but is open to all boys and girls of the city.

Twelve of the pupils registered were members of the 1930 graduating class of SS. Peter & Paul's elementary school. The remainder of the class were graduated last June from other parochial schools in the city.

The class will be instructed by Sister Eleanor, who came here from Rochester to take charge of the high school work.

Large Attendance Marks Opening of Catholic Schools

The school bell sounded Tuesday for boys and girls of all the Catholic schools of Rochester. Seventy of the elementary and eight high schools threw open their doors Tuesday.

Our Lady of Good Counsel School in Brookside Avenue will be added to the system Monday. Registration for far are 330 and no more are being taken. St. Margaret Mary School in Rogers Parkway also is a new school and was opened Tuesday for the first time.

The new schools will be in charge of the Sisters of St. Francis O.T.M., who also are taking over the teaching in St. George's School in Hudson Avenue.

The Aquinas Institute opened with a registration of 350 boys. This was approximately the same number as that of last year.

Nazareth Academy last year had 1,030 pupils. So far more than 1,000 are registered and it is expected the same number as that of last year will be registered.

Our Lady of Mercy High School for Girls will have a registration of about 200. This school now has three years—towards its full high school course. Nazareth College for Women will open September 16th.

The demolition of the first Church of the Blessed Sacrament, erected in 1817, was completed last week. The Rev. Francis J. Holly, assistant to the Rev. John J. Lee, pastor of SS. Peter and Paul's Church, will have charge of the high school work.

On the day of the laying of the cornerstone of the old church an amusing incident occurred. The Rev. Bernard J. McQuinn officiated and a boy's congregation was present.

Just as the collection was about to be taken the Rev. McQuinn, who officiated in the old church, was called to the altar by the pastor of the old church.

There were 500 persons in the church on the day of the laying of the cornerstone. There are more than 1,000 now.

ON REARING CHILDREN FROM CRIB TO COLLEGE. Compiled by the Editors of THE PARENTS' MAGAZINE.

The child whose ears have been filled with poetry and song, whose heart has responded to the great stories of adventure and of human sacrifice, stonings of the crude exploitation of sentimentalism, he does not enjoy it. He has established standards; he contrasts his feelings. It has been truly said that "the bleals of conduct conditioned or pictured in the growing brain will have much to do with the roads that will be open or closed to the adult brain."

The baby must learn to take care of himself. Before he can know how to avoid needless pain and injury he must have some knowledge of the things which cause pain. It is not wise for the parent to shield the baby from everything that is unpleasant.

In furnishing your living room, choose only the necessary pieces of large furniture and supplement them with lamps, small tables, cushions and smoking accessories deftly placed so that they are ready at hand wherever a guest may be seated. This gives an impression of simple luxury and real comfort. The over-furnished room merely engenders a feeling of oppression, and its cluttered appearance arouses an uneasy sense of confusion which destroys tranquility.

Sea fish are rich in iron as well as in iodine. Investigations made at the University of Wisconsin show that salt water fish contain more iron than do fresh water fish. In another analysis cysters were found to be rich in copper, the mineral substance that helps iron to enhance the blood stream. And, incidentally, most sea foods combine well with milk. They are palatable in soups and to scalloped and creamed fishes. This makes them of especial value to mothers who have difficulty in getting their children to eat their full quota of milk daily.

Hoover Poor Economist And Not a Great Leader, Rev. John A. Ryan Declares

Millions of Americans Are Disillusioned as to His Greatness, Dr. Ryan Writes—His Efforts to Relieve Depression a Failure

New York, Sept. 5.—President Hoover is neither a great economist, nor a courageous or effective leader, nor a master of fundamental principle, and millions of Americans are becoming disillusioned as to his greatness, the Rev. Dr. John A. Ryan, professor of Moral Theology and Industrial Ethics at the Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C., writes in an article on "Mr. Hoover and the Depression," in the latest issue of The Commonwealth, published in this city.

Not Blamed for Stock Market. President Hoover is not to blame for the collapse of the stock market, Dr. Ryan says, of the financial depression. He has been successful in his efforts to relieve the depression, but he has not been successful in his efforts to relieve the depression.

Lacks Superior Quality. "The things that Hoover has done since last November have shown that Hoover does not possess the superior qualities which were attributed to him during the Presidential campaign, and for some years previously," Father Ryan writes. He adds that a host of Americans have observed since then that Mr. Hoover is neither a great economist, nor a courageous or effective leader, nor a master of fundamental principle.

A Poor Economist. "An economist who knew human nature would not have expected a central fulfillment of the promise to maintain existing wage rates," Father Ryan writes. "An economist who was fully acquainted with the facts would have realized that industry unable to utilize all their present capacity would not and dare not expand their plants."

Father Ryan says on to show that in apparent conflict with his own program, Mr. Hoover advocated a \$10,000,000,000 Federal personal income tax, thus "detracting funds that should have been applied to the public works program to relieve unemployment. He also points out that Mr. Hoover partly rejected a recommendation from the National Unemployment League that he ask Congress to authorize a very large expenditure for road building.

"His decision may be good policy, but it is poor economics," Father Ryan finds. "Mr. Hoover's course with regard to tax reduction and the decrease of governmental expenses is the authentic because of the humane statesman nor the competent economist. In the meantime the depression is still with us and \$200,000,000,000 of Federal profits are being lost."

573 Jesuits Are Sent Forth From India Novitiate

(Eilat Service) Patna, India, Sept. 5. From the Jesuit novitiate and seminary of the Sacred Heart at Shambasant, southern India, 573 Jesuits have been sent forth to the novitiate. Founded in 1877 by the French province, it now serves as the Jesuit novitiate of the country and its enrollment is strongly international over its candidates being represented among the candidates.
