Knute Rockne Tells Notre Dame Men That Good Example Influenced Him to Join the Catholic Church

Famous Football Coach Tells of His Conversion at Close of Recent Laymen's Retreat—Piety and Devotion of Prayers Impressed Him

Notre Dame, Sept. 5.—The story of Knute Rockne's conversion to the Catholic Church was told by Mr. Rockne himself, at the close of the recent Laymen's Retreat at Notre Dame University. The great football coach told more than 1,000 men that the good example of the players on Notre Dame's football team in their attendance at Mass and their reception of Holy Communion made a profound impression upon him, and that he felt it was a peculiar situation to have his boys flocking to church while he went to a hotel to take his case.

Notre Dame Boys Faithful Long ago the Notre Dame football boys made a profound impression upon the world at large by their fidelity in attending Mass every Sunday, and by their frequent reception of Holy Communion. They traveled all over the country during the football season, year after year, and as nearly all of their games were played on Saturday, they invariably went to Mass the following Sunday morning in a body in whatever town or city they happened to be playing in. No matter how sore or stiff they were out after a game, it was a settled fact that no Notre Dame boy missed Mass. This loyalty to the obligations of their Faith has impressed thousands of people. How he impressed Knute Rockne, a non-Catholic, and their coach, is told by himself, according to an article published recently in The Pittsburgh Catholic.

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"Red" Religious Laws of The Soviets Are Published By the British Government

(Continued from Page One) ishable with compulsory labor for a period not exceeding one year. Article 123.—The commission of acts of desertion or of encouraging separatism among the masses of the population and with a view to deriving profit of any kind therefrom, is punishable with compulsory labor for a period not exceeding one year, with partial confiscation of property or a fine not exceeding 500 rubles. (Nominally \$250.)

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"Red" Vatican Established

Then last April, at exactly the same time that the British conservative and popular press reached its greatest activity in its campaign against the anti-religious attitude of the Moscow Government, based on the stories of religious persecution alleged to be going on in Russia, the Communist International voted that the Soviet Union should by decrees and laws establish an "international religion with liberty-equality-fraternity as the Red Trinity and the Communist headquarters in Moscow as the Red Vatican" and that "this Red Vatican would draft the articles of the new faith and prepare priests for foreign service."

Ireland Will Welcome Ireland will welcome her thousands of guests in the summer of 1932 and every effort will be made to ensure that they are well cared for in the country and leave it satisfied. Not all of them will be accommodated in the immediate vicinity of the city, but the roads in Ireland are good and there will be no lack of cars to carry the Congressists to and from the Congress gatherings. We are amongst the foremost peoples in Europe as far as our proportion of cars to population is concerned and given the expected wholehearted cooperation of all the people there should be no transit difficulties. For those visitors who prefer it extra-accommodation will be provided in hostels within the city and suburbs. Pilgrimage from Spain "Dublin in 1932" has become a watchword in Spain within the past few weeks. Already a notable enthusiasm has risen spontaneously amongst all sections, which will shortly be directed through the proper channels towards the organization of a Spanish National Pilgrimage to Ireland. The Bishop of Madrid, Right Rev. Leopoldo Elio Garza, has written in the following terms to a well-known Irish priest at present resident in Spain: "It is unnecessary to tell you that the Junta Nacional de Peregrinaciones will labour enthusiastically in order that Spain may have a strong representation at the Eucharistic Congress of Dublin in 1932. Your representative ought to help by sending to the Junta all the data he may think interesting, as well as by communicating with the Spanish International Eucharistic Congress Council. I greatly and sincerely wish immense success to those efforts and desires."
