Catholic Club Exempt from Tax, Court Directs

Supreme Court Justice Gillette Orders Vacation of Assessment of \$25,200 on Catholic Women's Club.

The Catholic Women's Club, 215 Alexander Street, will not have to pay any taxes hereafter, Supreme Court Justice Willis K. Gillette, in a decision just handed down, orders an assessment of \$25,200 vacated, and directs that the club be placed on the exempt property list of the city tax roll.

Action was brought against Assessor George S. Taylor, the Board of Assessment Review and the City of Rochester by the club through certiorari proceedings. Representatives of the club maintained it should be exempt from city taxes in that its activities are religious, educational and charitable.

Church to the Forefront

New Standards Welcomed

"Hence, it is not too much to say that today the nurse comes to her work with as high an ambition, with as good an educational background, with as keen a realization of her responsibilities, with as acute determination to succeed in the work, with as sacred a consecration to the ideal of her life as the average girl entering any other profession. Moreover, everywhere in our Catholic hospitals the newer standards of nursing are being most enthusiastically received, and the Catholic hospital welcomes every suggestion for a progressive program along these lines."

Catholic Hospitals and Nurses

"According to the most recent established statistics of the American Medical Association, there are in the United States at the present time 2,173 schools of nursing. Of this number 1,000 are Catholic hospitals and nurses."


