## NAPLES

### Mrs. Fred'k Reisinger Buried Tuesday

Naples, Sept. 12.—Mrs. Rose Reisinger, wife of Frederick Reisinger, who underwent an operation for cancer last Friday in the Canandaigua Hospital, died Saturday morning. Her funeral was held Tuesday morning in St. Januarius Church. The Requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Ferdinand Schell, pastor of St. Januarius Church, Rochester. The following priests were present: Rev. Joseph Giffell of Holy Family, Rochester; Rev. William Frank of St. John, Cohocton; Rev. Cornelius Honan of St. Andrew's Seminary, and Rev. George Doud of Naples. The burial took place in the cemetery of St. Januarius Church and a member of the Ladies' Sodality for many years.

### John Kimmel Buried Saturday

Wayland, Sept. 5.—John Kimmel, aged 63, one of the best known residents of this community, died at his home on West Naples Street Wednesday last week and was buried at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from St. Joseph's Church. He founded the Kimmel Hardware Co., 30 years ago, and the Wayland Light & Power Co. at the same time. In 1900 he organized the Wayland Canine Co., and in 1906 the Collecting Canine Co., which companies were sold 11 years ago to the Steuben Products Co. and are now owned by the Steuben Packing Co. In 1920 he organized the Lake Odessa Canine Company at Lake Odessa, Mich., which he sold a few years later. In 1919 he purchased the Silver Creek Electric Company at Silver Creek. Both the Wayland Light & Power Company and the Silver Creek Electric Company were sold about two years ago to the Associated Gas & Electric Company. Mr. Kimmel was a staunch Democrat and he had served as Postmaster, supervisor, town clerk and member of the Board of Education. He is survived by his wife, two sons, Victor of Wayland and Leo of Pittsburgh; one daughter, Dolores of Rochester; two brothers, Martin and Frank of Wayland; seven sisters, Mrs. Margaret Yohon, Mrs. Marian Yohon, Mrs. William Saubier, Mrs. Fred Schmitz, Mrs. Charles J. Rauber, and Helen Kimmel of this village, and Mrs. Edward Kitz of Rochester.

## Mexican Govt. Plans to Seize M. E. Churches

### Petition is Filed to Nationalize All Property of Methodists in Mexico—Same Fate Awaits Other Religions.

Mexico City, Sept. 12.—News dispatches state that the Mexican Government has filed a petition in the Sixth District Court to nationalize all property of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Mexico. The dispatches state that 14 buildings in Mexico City alone owned by the Methodist Church will become national property if the government's petition is granted.

The petition was filed by orders of the attorney general, it was said, and the Christian Science and other Protestant churches will face similar action as soon as this case is disposed of.

All Catholic Church property in Mexico is classed as belonging to the government, and the priests in charge have registered in compliance with official requirements, this point being upheld by the church-state agreement reached in June of last year.

Protestant churches, which are in a minority, have been operating under special privileges.

Property worth \$50,000,000.—By invoking the Constitution for the nationalization of Protestant-owned property in Mexico, the government will take over churches, missions and schools worth \$50,000,000. The property affected is principally in the States of Coahuila, Nuevo Leon, Tamaulipas and Puebla.

Among the Protestants, the Methodists lead all sects in the quantity and value of their property. Their most valuable piece in Mexico City is the Sara L. Keen School in the Calle de la Industria, estimated to cost \$1,000,000. The largest building in Mexico City formerly belonged to the Franciscan Order and was seized under Juarez and Ven-

Even synagogues are expected soon to be under control of the Department of National Property, a dependency of the Ministry of Finance.

What Constitution Says.—The provision of the Constitution of 1917, under which the government will proceed to nationalize church property still held by organizations or individuals, is as follows: "Religious societies known as churches of any belief whatsoever may under no circumstances acquire possession of or administrative control of property, nor indicate on same; those which they now have either in their own names or in that of a third party will pass to the ownership of the nation, and it will be the duty of every person to denounce to the government any properties known to belong to churches."

Temples destined for public worship are the property of the nation represented by the federal government, which will designate whether they shall continue to be set aside for the purpose mentioned, or not. Bishops, curacies, seminaries, asylums, schools kept up by religious societies, convents or any other building which may have been constructed or intended for the administration or propagation or carrying on of any religion will immediately pass by inherent right to the public service of the nation, to be destined exclusively for the public service of the nation or of the states under their respective jurisdictions. Temples of public worship erected in the future shall be the property of the nation.
