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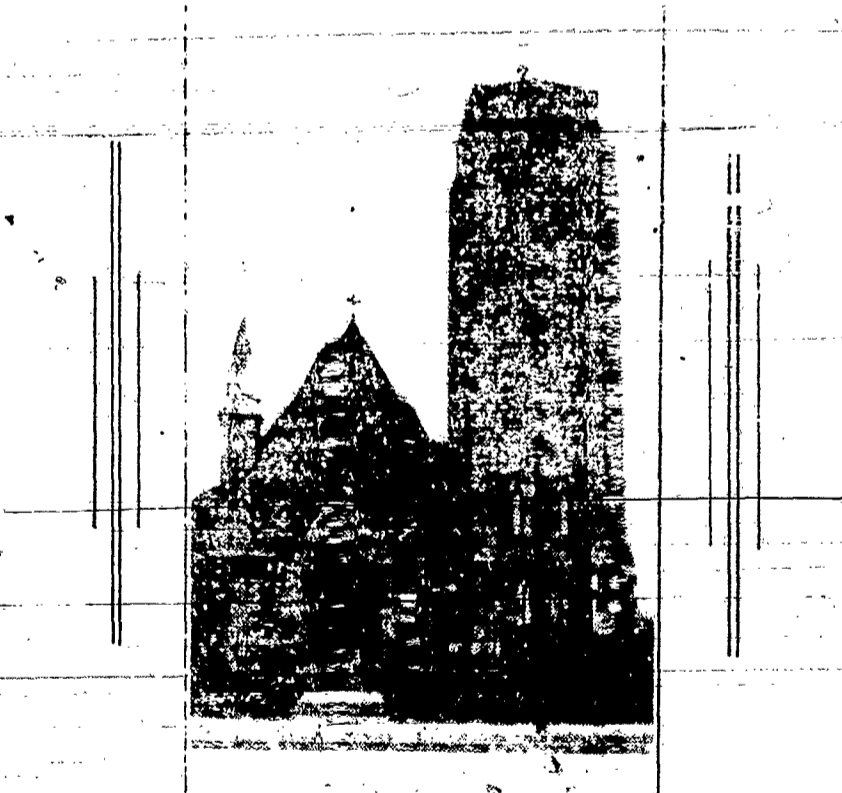

Rochester To Be Represented At Catholic Charities Meeting In Washington, Sept. 28 to Oct. 1

Rev. Walter A. Foery, Diocesan Director of Charities, and William T. Nolan, Secretary, Will Attend Conference.

The 16th annual meeting of the National Conference of Catholic Charities will be held in Washington, D. C., September 28 to October 2d. Rochester will be represented at this conference by the Rev. Walter A. Foery, Diocesan Director of Catholic Charities, and by William T. Nolan, secretary of the Rochester Catholic Charities. Several other persons interested in charitable work in the city and Diocese will undoubtedly attend. Father Foery is listed on the official program for a talk.

A Large Attendance
There will be a large attendance at the conference, delegates and visitors coming from all parts of the United States.

It is more than 25 years since the National Conference of Catholic Charities was first organized in Washington. It was the first national organization of its kind in the United States.

Each of the five topic committees will emphasize work for children in their respective programs. The Committee on Families will include in its program a paper on "General Trends in Catholic Relief," based on a factual study in both the private Catholic and non-Catholic public fields, and taking into account the four approaches which may throw light on the increased relief giving, namely: better supervision, adequate relief, increased resources and community reform.

Some of the topics to be treated under the Committee on Health are "Mental Hygiene from the Standpoint of Catholic Social Work" and "The Functions and Means of Financial and Social Service Departments."

The Committee on Protective Care will offer further information through more intensive study on standards in the Brother and Sister work.

The Sacraments and Sacramentals administered in a word, and the ministrations of the Holy Eucharist, the Providence of the Holy Spirit, the Eternal Priesthood of Jesus Christ which is shared by every valid and ordained Priest in the Catholic Church.

Faithful Always Generous
"Remembering all that the Blessed Sacrament has done for us, and that we have received from it, let us be zealous to give in return, to enable the Priest to study the required training for your service in his own diocese."

St. Bernard's Theological Seminary, 17 years of service, has sent into the Priesthood about one thousand young men, and its alumni are found not only in the Diocese of Rochester, but also in other dioceses in all parts of our country, and in other possessions.

Patrons Asked to Help
It is to make an appeal for the support of these two seminaries that the Rev. Father O'Hern, rector of St. Andrew's Seminary, will be in the city on Saturday, September 14, and on Sunday, September 15, 1930. Special envelopes have been mailed to the Pastors, who will distribute them to the people of their congregations on Sunday, September 21. The envelopes will be placed in the collection boxes on the morning of September 28 with the contribution of the individual enclosed. Seminary Sunday will be observed throughout the diocese on the date, September 28, and we are quite unwilling that any other paralytic work of activity of a financial character should interfere with the collection for the seminaries on this appointed day.

The St. Andrew House
Priests and people will recall the opening, one year ago of the new St. Andrew House for students at St. Andrew's Seminary for outside the city of Rochester. Thirty-three students were cared for during this first year. The furnishings and equipment involved an expenditure of seminary funds through the Chancery office to the amount of \$6,592.06.

Current operating expenses and overhead brought the total expenses for the first year to \$12,373.62. Donations from generous friends in various parts of the diocese to the amount of \$2,688.60 helped to pay the bills for furnishings and equipment. Every provision for the care and comfort of the students has been made, and a splendid boarding-home atmosphere has been maintained.

During the past year also the diocese was called upon to expend \$23,450 for the running, maintenance and improvement of St. Andrew's Seminary proper on Plymouth Avenue North. This item, besides salaries for the entire professional staff, included repairs and equipment necessary to put the school in a first-class condition and to furnish the necessary "season" hours with the proper facilities for their work.

Recently, the seminary proper and the St. Andrew House, there was a grand total of \$35,145.12 for expenses to be met by the Diocese.

Estimating the per capita cost for each of the students in the St. Andrew House as revealed by the above figures, we find that the Chancery office paid about \$100 for the education of each student at the St. Andrew House for the year, and that the actual cost for rent, heat, light, food, maintenance, etc., for each student registered there was \$7.50 a week.

St. Andrew House Annex
The registration for the present year for the St. Andrew House has grown to 51 boys with the result that the present quarters had to be provided in annex quarters in the St. Andrew House. Estimating the cost for the coming year for maintaining these boys at the St. Andrew House at the rate of \$7.50 per week per capita, there will be a total expense of \$13,180.00 for the care of those boys outside the city of Rochester while studying at St. Andrew's Seminary. Inasmuch as the Chancery office paid one-third of the cost of running the house last year, reckoning at the same rate for the coming year, it will cost the Chancery something over \$4,000 for this special work.

The cost will go in the form of donations from citizens, parishes and individuals as just as generous as they were a year ago when the house was first opened.

"For the coming year then we estimate that the running of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary and of the St. Andrew House will cost the diocese about \$25,000. The reason is because we have been obliged during the past summer to utilize one of the seminary buildings for a complete Biology and Physics Laboratory for the Science Department, and also to enlarge the school library. These items will cost in the neighborhood of \$6,000.

St. Andrew's Growth
"Again we have added two professors to the teaching staff, namely, Rev. Walter Kohl, for the past nine years a most successful professor of Science in the Aquinas Institute, who will now become head of the Department of Science at St. Andrew's; and the Rev. George Vogt, former assistant at Holy Family Church, as professor of Latin. The wisdom of appointing these young priests last June and appointing them to the St. Andrew staff has been more than justified by the fact of the increase of

"When St. Andrew's opened on Monday, September 8th, there was a total registration of 202 students, an increase of 47 students over the registration of a year ago. This large number of young men, starting on their career to study for the priesthood in our preparatory seminary has never at any time previous been equaled or approached as to numbers. It may be of interest to note that the Seminary graduated 19 young men this June. These students entered St. Bernard's Seminary this September.

About the Faculty
These two young professor positions will be welcomed by the already splendid faculty of our preparatory seminary consisting of seven learned and zealous priests working under the Rev. Francis W. Luddy, the new president of St. Andrew's. Three priests of the faculty have been pursuing special courses in summer session work during the past two months in order to equip themselves the better for the day program of the future.

"To me and all on this occasion the Bishop wishes to express in behalf of the priests and people of the diocese their appreciation for their splendid services as members of the St. Andrew Faculty and we ask God to bless them with health and strength for the coming year.

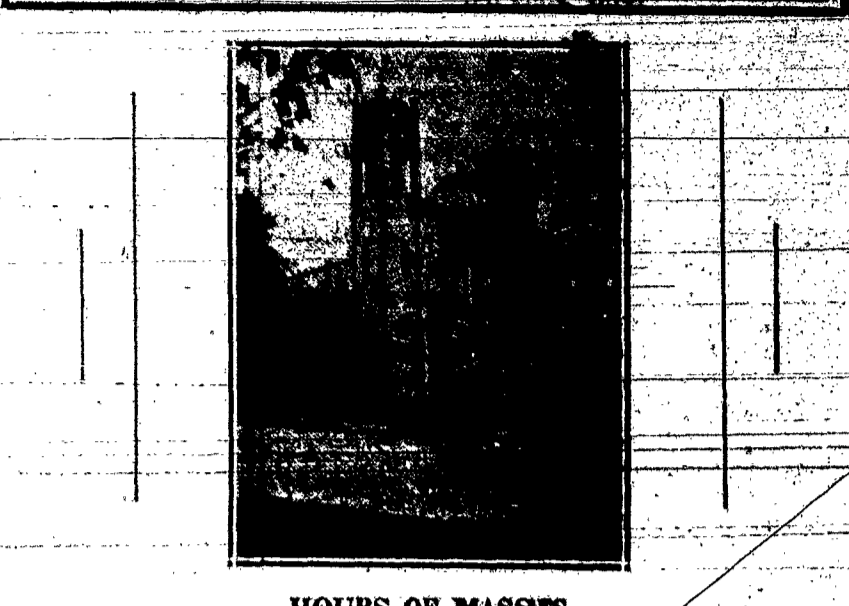
Lastly, in years gone by the students of St. Andrew's Seminary were required to pursue a course of classical studies for four years for the High School Course, which later on was lengthened to five years. On going to St. Bernard's they spent six years in philosophical and theological studies. In the new program which we are now planning in order to conform with the Law of the Church and with the advanced standards in the educational world, we are about to extend the classical course at St. Andrew's to six years as required by the Baltimore Council on Higher Education in all seminaries for young men, which are called preparatory seminaries, the course of study shall be no less than six years."

The New Program
"In this manner we shall meet all requirements for the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts Degrees as required by general educational laws. The new program will furnish a four year classical course of studies for the High School Department and a two year course of college work at St. Andrew's. On completion of the course of studies for six years at St. Andrew's, our student body will be ready to continue their work for advanced degrees at St. Bernard's Seminary. These coveted degrees which are absolutely necessary in the teaching profession will be awarded to the young priests at St. Bernard's Seminary upon the completion of all work prescribed for the degrees. Knowing the value and necessity of degrees for teachers in all the States of the country today, we feel that not only our own priests and people, but also the Bishops of the many dioceses of the country who are now patronizing St. Bernard's, will welcome this change in the most wide-hearted manner.

"We are glad to announce that during the past year five gifts were received in the way of bequests and donations for St. Andrew's Seminary, viz: \$2,000 in the will of Rev. Thomas Rossiter; \$1,000 as a gift of Very Rev. John J. McGrath, V.P., of St. Mary's Church, Albany, N. Y.; \$100 each from Rev. James Griffith, L.L.D., St. Mary's Church, Corning, and Very Rev. Walter J. Lee, L.L.D., St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva."
