"In giving these children the pledge," said Bishop O'Hern, "I feel that the Catholic Church contributes a tremendous force to temperance, sobriety and good citizenship for the future."

Bishop O'Hern has given a similar pledge to many thousands of children in the past year.

The Archbishop's address to the sisters and students on the work of the Sisters of Mercy he said in part: "The work of Mercy goes back to the Middle Ages, where well-to-do men who left their homes and went into exile, offering their lives, if necessary, for the redemption of others. In our own time, the 'exile' that has just gone, the heart of a woman has been filled with love for God and seeing the misery of the poor, she has stood, not a galaxy of women in order that they might look up the little ones of the streets and teach them the way of God. God has blessed that work, and from the rising to the setting of the sun this noble work of mercy is carried on. You find these consecrated spouses of Jesus Christ in hospitals, among the poor, and wherever God's work of mercy is to be performed."

"In blessing today, we pray that the Sisters of Mercy may be blessed not only with increased numbers, but that the spirit of mercy may grow in their hearts, that they may more fully imitate Christ, in His characteristic work of Mercy."

**Public Speaking Course Will Be Started on October First In The Columbus Civic Center**

**Charles A. Tucker, B.A., Graduate of Boston College, Will Give Unusually Excellent Course For Men and Women For Sixteen Weeks.**

On Wednesday evening, Oct. 1st, a public speaking course in the Columbus Civic Center will be inaugurated, and will be continued every Wednesday night for 16 weeks. The course will be conducted by Charles A. Tucker, B.A., of the advertising staff of the Hickey-Freeman Co. of this city.

This course will be a forerunner in adult educational opportunities to be offered by the Columbus Civic Center. Any resident of Rochester and vicinity, man or woman, over the age of 18, and of good character, is entitled to register for the course. A minimum of 20 has been set and a maximum of 40 by instructor Charles A. Tucker. The course will start at 7:30 and continue until 9:30 P. M. each Wednesday.

The course will be an elementary course in public speaking, derived from text books of authority and coupled with notes supplied by the instructor, oral and written. Ample practice time will be allowed at each meeting, the instructor will act as critic and the members will be asked to criticize one another.

The price of the course to the individual student will be \$27 for a 16-week course. This fee will be payable \$2 at time of registration, \$10 on the opening night of the course and \$5 every two weeks for the next six weeks. A discount of \$2 will be allowed if the course is paid in full on the opening night or second night.

Mr. Tucker is qualified to conduct such a course, because of wide and varied training. He had eight years of education in education, debating and public speaking at Boston College High School and Boston College, conducted by the Jesuits. For six years he took part in prize debates, elocution contests and inter-collegiate debates and was a member of lecture teams. Two years were spent on Knights of Columbus lecture team touring the principal cities of New England and addressing Knights of Columbus Councils and other civic organizations on matters of national legislation or educational problems.

For one and one-half years, Mr. Tucker was instructor in English and Civics at Aquinas Institute and for one year he taught advertising and salesmanship in Madison Junior Evening School. He broadcasted weekly over WHAM for three successive months during 1929. He has addressed business organizations, such as the Lions Club, Rotary organizations, Monarch Clubs, and has appeared before the Catholic Women's Club. For one year he was President of the Columbus Lunch Club.
