Talk about Western beef! We don't have to go West, young man. Look at Colgate. Five backs and eight linemen, candidates for this year's football team, average 193 pounds per man. The line, from tackle to tackle, averages 200 pounds while from end to end it is 195 pounds. Five candidates for the backfield average 188 pounds.

Fordham stood out on the field Saturday when it beat the University of Baltimore team 73 to 0, at the new Fordham stadium. A crowd of 9,000 saw the massacre. Fordham was not defeated last season, and its initial case this season shows that Coach Kavanaugh has a mighty fine team.

Several teams made larger scores than Fordham Saturday, notably Carnegie Tech 76 vs. Buffalo 22; Dartmouth 73 vs. Norwich 0; Grove City 90 vs. Morris Harvey 0; Washington and Jefferson 74 vs. Bethany 0; Tulane 88 vs. S. W. Louisiana Institute 0.

Central and Western New York State teams had varying fortunes Rochester got a jolt from Williams, 20 to 0. Niagara put up a great fight against Penn State—formidable opponent, and lost 14 to 31. Buffalo got an awful trouncing from Carnegie Tech, 75 to 2. Colgate handed St. Lawrence a 38 to 0 wallop. Cornell hit Clarkson Tech 56 to 0. Hamilton and Alfred played to a zero tie. St. Bonaventure was at the short end of a 30 to 0 score with Holy Cross. Hobart was in the same boat with a 0 to 35 score with New York University.

Notre Dame has a 24-year old head coach, Joe McKenney, one of the youngest men in America. In that capacity he has a splendid team and some hard games on his schedule. Football, October 11th Georgetown, November 8th; Holy Cross, November 20th. Other games include Quantico Marines, Villanova, Dayton, Marquette, Loyola and Boston University. Boston beat the Catholic League 14 to 7 Saturday, but the Catholic League has never been so stout in its football muscles.

All eyes will be turned on Notre Dame next Saturday, when it plays the first game of its "suicide schedule" with Southern Methodist, one of the last year's unbeaten teams. A week later Notre Dame will tackle the Navy, and on the following Saturday Carnegie Tech. All three of these games will be played at South Bend.

Captain Jack Law of last year's Notre Dame team, now head coach at Manhattan, lost his first game Saturday. Rider beat Manhattan 14 to 7.

Georgetown defeated St. Mary's 11 to 6 Saturday, and Villanova developed Lebanon Valley 19 to 0.

Catholic colleges have some interesting games booked for this Saturday. Fordham plays Buffalo at Fordham. Niagara plays Cornell at Chappaqua. Holy Cross plays Providence at Worcester, Mass. Villanova plays Gettysburg at Villanova. Other games of local interest on this Saturday are: Syracuse vs. Hobart, at Syracuse; Colgate vs. Bethany at Hamilton, N. Blames the Pope For The Failure Of Prohibition

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., Home to Answer Charges Filed by His Own Churchmen. Criticizes "Romanism."

New York, Oct. 3.—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and his battle of three months, arrived here Monday. The Bishop returned from Brazil to answer charges filed against him by four of his own churchmen who are seeking to have him removed from his episcopal office.

Mrs. Cannon was in a highly nervous condition as she leaned against a produce truck at the Hoboken pier and denounced the newspapers as "wolves." She was taken off the boat, via the baggage boat, and placed in a taxi cab with closed blinds. Half a dozen pier officials hung to the side of the cab to clear a way.

The Bishop would not comment on the charges that have been preferred against him by four sides of his church. Criticized the Pope. But he was willing to discuss one of his favorite subjects—"Romanism" and the Pope. He denounced Tammany and "Romanism," declaring that the "archbishops, the cardinals and the Pope" are against the dry law and that "Romanism as a body hates prohibition."

The Bishop pressed his indictment for Dwight W. Morrow because of his frank declaration that he favored repeal of the Prohibition Amendment, but pointed out that Mr. Morrow, the Republican candidate for the United States Senate from New Jersey, was not generally recognized. She appears to be almost half the Bishop's age. She wore brown and her face was pale. An officer later reported she came to him in a "hysterical condition" and demanded that she be pig led, from annoyance.

Named Referee Of Compensation In State Bureau

Arthur H. Gagnon, Holy Cross Graduate, Has Been Appointed by State Industrial Commissioner.

New York, Oct. 3.—The appointment of Arthur H. Gagnon, A. B., I. L. B., as referee of the Bureau of Workmen's Compensation of the State Department of Labor, is announced by Miss Frances Perkins, Industrial Commissioner.

Mr. Gagnon is a member of the New York bar, has been trial counsel for the Commercial Casualty Insurance Company, and attorney of record and claims manager for the Independence Indemnity Company. He is a native of Crystal, Maine, and is 35 years old. He is a cum laude graduate of Holy Cross College, Worcester, Mass., and was valedictorian of the class of 1921 of Kaufman Law School.

Mr. Gagnon is a veteran of the World War and a member of the Greenwich Village Post of the American Legion. He is president of the Holy Cross College Alumni Association in the City of New York, former secretary of the Catholic Club of the City of New York, past grand knight and former district deputy of the Knights of Columbus in New York City and a member of the Board of Directors of the Catholic Boys' Clubs of the Archdiocese of New York, an organization in this city for underprivileged boys, regardless of race, creed or color.

G. K. Chesterton To Be At Canisius On November 19th

Buffalo, Oct. 3.—During the fall and early winter season the Canisius College Alumni Association will sponsor a series of five lectures which will be given in this city under the auspices of the college. The first of these will be the appearance of Gilbert K. Chesterton, celebrated English writer and humorist, who will speak at the Elmwood Music hall on the evening of November 19th.

A group of four more lectures will be given shortly after the new year, in one of which Rev. Michael J. Ahern, S. J., former president of Canisius College, will speak.

REV. E. F. MCGOLDRICK. Flushing, Oct. 3.—The Rev. Edward F. McGoldrick, 60 years old, for fifteen years pastor of St. Andrew of Avellino Roman Catholic Church at Northern Boulevard and 158th Street, Flushing, Queens, died Tuesday in St. Vincent's Hospital, Manhattan. He was born in Donegal, Ireland, was ordained 27 years ago in the Black Rock Seminary, and is survived by two brothers and two sisters in Ireland.

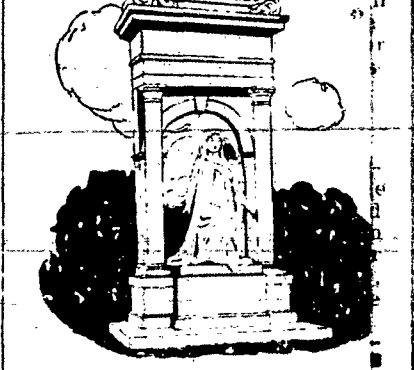
