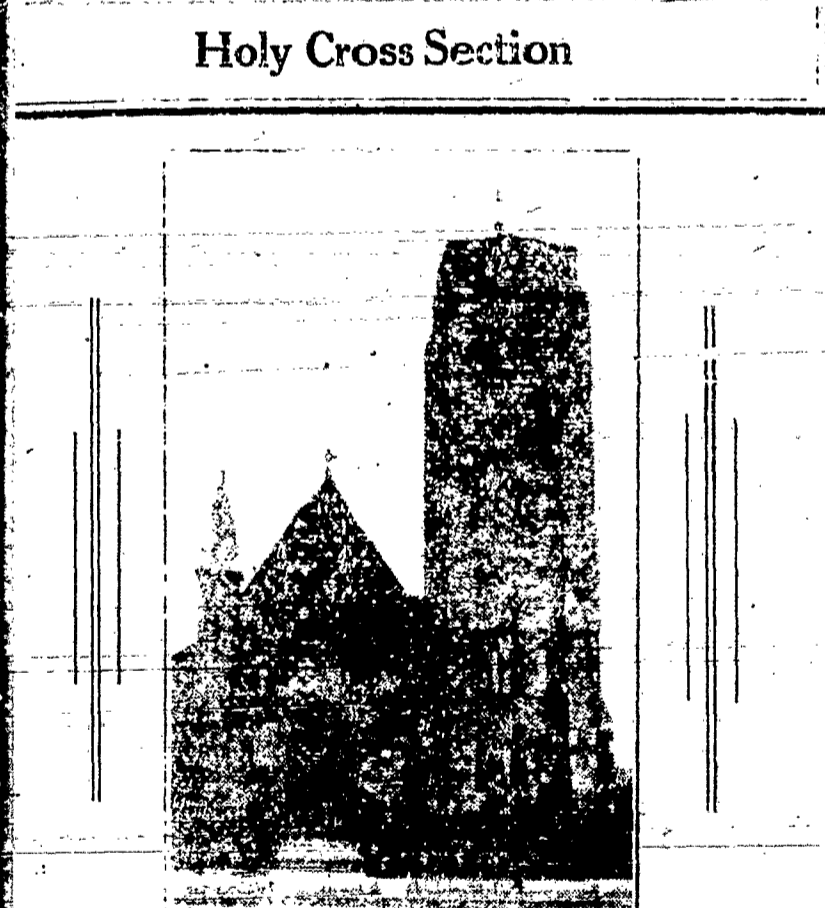

**Stage Reeking with Filth,
Cardinal Hayes Tells Judges
And Lawyers at Their Mass**

Prelate Pleads With Judges and Lawyers to Give Thought to Spiritual Matters and Show That Law is Based on Christianity

New York, Oct. 10.—The metropolitan stage is reeking with filth, and there seems to be no power to stop it, His Eminence Cardinal Hayes told some 700 lawyers, judges and Supreme Court Justices at the third annual red Mass celebrated in St. Andrew's Church in New York city on Thursday morning last week. This utterance, following the strong attack made on the immorality of the stage by the Catholic Theater Movement several weeks ago, is considered most significant.

A Notable Gathering
There was a notable gathering of distinguished lawyers and judges at the Mass. The celebrant was the Rev. John J. DeLacy, secretary to the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Walsh, D.D., Bishop of Newark. A brief greeting was given to the lawyers by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William E. Cashin, rector of the church. The sermon of the day was preached by the Rev. John J. Cloonan, president of St. John's Law School, Brooklyn, and the Mass was under the auspices of the Guild of Catholic Lawyers. Previous to the Mass the Cardinal and priests marched from St. Casimir's home to the church, led by members of the faculty of the Fordham University Law School and St. John's Law School. Cardinal Hayes spoke after Father Cloonan had given his sermon.

A Moral Depression
"We only have jails for those who cannot control themselves and those who are not just to their fellow-men, but we have no jails for those who are not just toward God," said Cardinal Hayes. "We only have jails for those who seem to take life and property things that we see and touch and are under our eye. And today in the economic system that has brought on depression, financial depression, we are very sensitive to it. Oh, would that we were equally sensitive to the moral depression at times. To the low standards of morality. We have a stage that is reeking, reeking with filth, and there seems to be no power in the City of New York to stop it. It is an awful shock to ordinary common decency that you wouldn't find even among the non-civilized tribes."

Drifting Away from God
"We are not all sensitive either to the religious depression of our times—a decided drifting away from God—and from God. And how can we be, when we are living in a civilization that is so simple, depending on material wealth?"

A Right Concept of Law
"So it seems to me that your body of lawyers coming here today, heard of the men who were the great lawyers of old, and how they were the source of all wisdom and knowledge of the law, and how they were the source of all wisdom and knowledge of the law, and how they were the source of all wisdom and knowledge of the law."

A Spiritual Force
"My gentlemen, this morning this city appears a small gathering in a big city. It may pass unnoticed by the public press and very little importance. And yet today you have gathered a spiritual power and a spiritual force in this community that will find its appeal rising to God himself to bring down upon you blessing upon blessing, not only on yourselves, but on this city that we love."

Welded Steel Structures
Have Great Strength
"Noiseless buildings" are now commercially practicable. The United States bureau of standards has said so. After an exhaustive test of electrically welded steel building frame joints, made last year, the bureau announced that the weld was as strong as the steel members. Such welds are taking the place of noisy riveting as a means of erecting structural steel. A number of electrically welded buildings are now in process of construction. The welding process is much swifter than riveting, and judging by experience of contractors in Canton, Ohio, the cost is less.

**M. E. Bishop Tells
Why He Admires
Catholic Church**

Bishop Joseph F. Berry of Binghamton, Formerly of Philadelphia, Lists Some Admirable Features.

Binghamton, Oct. 10.—The Binghamton Sun, a daily secular newspaper, in its issue of September 27th, carries the following article written by the St. Rev. Joseph F. Berry, retired Methodist Episcopal Bishop of this city, formerly of Philadelphia, in which he enumerates 10 reasons why he admires the Catholic Church.

- 1—Its remarkable esprit de corps.
- 2—The vigilant care it gives to the religious training of its children.
- 3—The extraordinary loyalty of its membership to the church, and its respect for constituted authority.
- 4—Its democracy. There are no lines in the church differentiating the rich and the poor, the learned and the unlearned as, of course, there should not be.
- 5—The wise insistence of its leaders that every member shall share in the financial support of the church, and the almost universal response of the people to demand.
- 6—The wisdom shown in handling, within its own precincts, cases of wrong-doing. Misconduct of priests and people is subject to discipline and punishment. But it seldom becomes public property, and is not allowed to be a subject of newspaper sensation.
- 7—The property interests of the church are centered in the bishop. He is trained to deal with financial problems, and his word is law. Hence the business affairs of the church are usually managed with consummate skill. In the matter of church locations the Roman Catholic Church has heavily discounted every Protestant communion.
- 8—The organized charities of the church. Her hospitals, orphanages, homes for the aged and other beneficent institutions stand out prominently in every considerable community.
- 9—The parish system. The membership of the church is zoned, and every one is required to support the church nearest his residence, even though he does not really attend it. This secures unity of action and provides for the adequate support of the weaker churches.
- 10—Loyalty to the historic doctrine of the Roman Catholic Church. Its bishops and priests are men of broad culture, and that culture is used to propagate the tenets of the scriptures as they interpret them, rather than to raise in the minds of the people misgivings concerning their authority, and value. It has been charged that the Roman Catholic Church is wholly traditional, that it allows no intellectual liberty, and that it takes no forward step. But would you not prefer to be regarded as a bit conservative rather than to consent that the gospel message shall be emasculated by the vague speculations of present-day modernism?

**Mexican Prelate
Issues Warning
To Church Critics**

Archbishop Ruiz Says Religious Settlement Is No Longer Debatable Issue, and Obedience Is Expected.

Mexico City, Oct. 10.—The terms of the religious settlement in Mexico are no longer debatable, and obedience is expected of the Catholic people, is the gist of a statement just issued here by Archbishop Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, the Apostolic Delegate here.

"Once the Pope sanctioned the terms of reconciliation," he said, "within the limits of the Catholic conscience it is not right for any Catholic to rebel and constitute himself a judge of the supreme authority of his Church, for obedience to the Church is not limited to dogmas but extends to the fullest extent to administrative discipline."

"The door is open for sending to the Holy Father whatever accusations and complaints there may be," the Archbishop said, "but in no manner can there be suffered the scandalous and disorganizing efforts which have lately been made, a year and a half after the Church and State crisis settlement has been reached. I cannot permit discussions by people holding such views, for it is not the time to discuss but to obey, and I cannot recognize any right to demand of me an account of my official actions. I have superiors to whom I give my account."

**Walls Hide Important
Part of the Plumbing**

A very important part of the plumbing of a house is hidden in the walls and under the floors, and for this reason the man who expects to build should deal only with plumbing contractors who can submit a list of homes in which they have installed plumbing that has given lasting satisfaction to the owners.

The usual specifications drawn up by an architect cover the fixtures very definitely, but are quite general with reference to the pipes, valves, and fittings—the essential yet concealed part of the plumbing system. It is in this part of the plumbing system that the owner must depend on the plumbing contractor.

It is in the concealed part of the plumbing system that quality is of the highest importance. Any breakdown in this part of the system necessitates the cutting of walls and subjects the family to a great deal of expense and inconvenience.

Therefore, to the man who is building this spring, this suggestion is offered: Deal with a responsible contractor so that first cost will be last cost in your plumbing system.

The reputable plumbing contractor will use pipes, valves, and fittings of good quality for his "roughing in" materials. He will not try to save money and thus come out even on a low bid by substituting inferior materials where they will not be seen.

Workmen employed by good contractors have been taught the mechanical installation of a plumbing system that will not be noisy in operation. For instance, the soil pipe which runs from the basement up to the roof of the house can be made sound proof with a one-inch thickness of half felt.

The use of felt has another advantage in that it will absorb condensation and thus prevent unsightly spots on the walls of the house.

For this reason it is advisable to wrap the downspouts with felt if they are placed in the walls of the building.

A good contractor knows how to install a system that will be free from the noisy water hammer. He will so install his pipes that there will be perfect circulation of hot water. Furthermore, a good master plumber will insulate the hot-water pipes in the walls and under the floors, thus saving approximately 25 per cent in fuel in a circulating system. Usually specifications call for insulation of pipes in the basement only.

The good contractor will see to it that his workmen ream all cuts of pipes to remove burrs before these pipes are threaded. Good contractors will also see to it that all pipes are laid to such a grade that the water will drain out of them when the plugs are opened. This is essential in case the house is to stand unoccupied. An adequate number of cleanouts in waste pipes will always be installed by dependable workmen.

Most of these points which are so essential to the efficient and trouble-free operation of a plumbing system are not mentioned in specifications but must be left to the judgment of the contractor.

**Termites Menace to
American Buildings**

The wise American home-builder of today will expend a few extra dollars to make his house termite-proof if he really wants it to last. If he doesn't, he may awake some day to the realization that a perfectly sound looking joist or section of flooring has been eaten away inside by these tiny white ants which have invaded the country in armies of billions in the past 30 years.

This warning is offered in the American Architect Magazine which points out that all of the United States, with the exception of the northernmost states and the area between Lake Superior and the Rockies, has already felt the effect of the termite invasion.

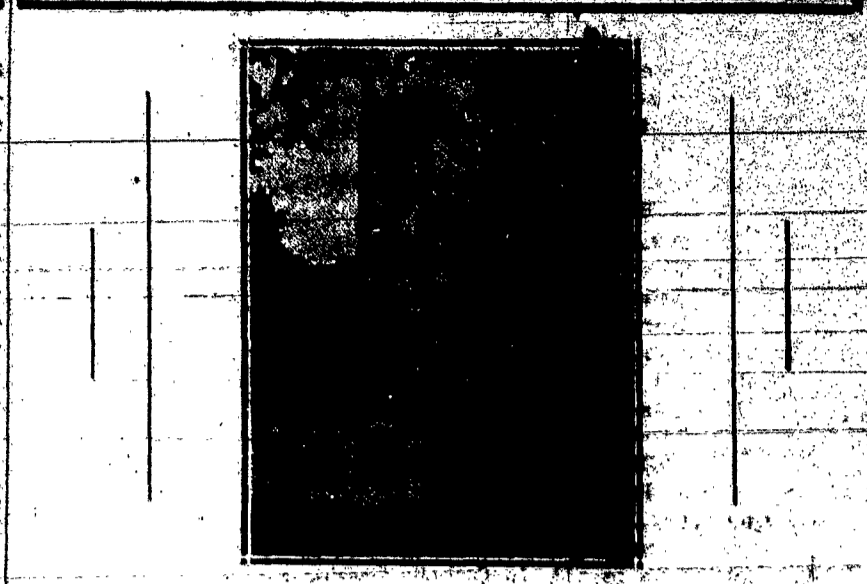
The tiny insects have always been a menace to furniture as well as buildings in Africa and other tropical and sub-tropical countries, but only in recent years have they, for some unaccounted reason, become important in the temperate zone.

Living in underground nests of millions, situated just below the frost line, they bore their way up and into any wooden structure which is connected with the ground. They rarely eat their way through the wood but continue to bore inside. Instances have been found where huge joists, comparatively new and apparently as strong as ever have been found to be mere shells filled with fine sawdust as a result of the termite's activities.

The only known way of checking the pests, says the American Architect article, is to interpose metal sheaths and concrete, through which they cannot bore, between their underground nests and the wood of the building.

In warm, damp climates the termites have been known to literally devour furniture from the inside. The only means of eradicating them in these cases is to place the furniture in a room made air-tight and filled with a hot, dry heat until the pests are killed.
