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Not Bad Conduct To Get Divorce, Court Decides

Divorced Son of Wealthy Catholic Wins Right to Legacy, Despite the Objections of His Sisters.

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 17. — A man is not necessarily guilty of "bad behaviour" if he divorces his wife for good cause, Federal Judge C. B. Faris decided here recently, in directing that Vincent Kerens, son of the late Richard C. Kerens, former ambassador to Austria-Hungary, should receive at once his share of his father's estate, the share amounting to \$1,900,000. The young man's father left him this legacy on condition that he should live "a life of sobriety and good behaviour" for five consecutive years. Two of his sisters objected to him receiving the legacy on the ground that he had divorced his wife thus violating the rules of the Catholic Church, which prohibits divorce, and of good behaviour.

Her Sisters Objected

The two sisters, Mrs. Madeline Kern of New York and Mrs. Gladys Collier of Philadelphia, contended that their father was a devout member of the Catholic Church, that he was opposed to divorce, and that the son, by divorcing his wife, was guilty of behaviour his father would not approve were he alive.

Judge Faris ruled that the St. Louis Trust Co., which had charge of the fund, was authority as to the "good behaviour" of the young man, and that inasmuch as the company had made a favorable report in the case, Vincent should be given his legacy without delay.

Divorce Not Bad Behaviour

"The term 'good behaviour' as used in the will," Judge Faris ruled, "is construed in the common ordinary sense as defined in standard dictionaries. It commands him to be a lawful citizen and to adhere to human standards of decent morality in living and actions."

"Nor did the term forbid him from resorting to a court, in common with other citizens, to dissolve the bonds of matrimony for good cause to be shown to the court."

Vincent Kerens has been receiving \$1,000 a month from the income of the trust fund. His former wife, Mrs. Jane Henry Kerens, has asked provision for herself and daughter.

Priest Praises Heroic Firemen In Metropolis

Memorial Exercises Held, with More Than One Thousand Uniformed Firemen Taking Part in New York.

New York, Oct. 17.—The Rev. Patrick P. O'Connor, departmental Chaplain of the New York City Fire Department, presided at memorial exercises held here Sunday at the base of the monument at Riverside Drive and 10th Street, erected in 1913 in honor of those members of the organization who died in the performance of duty. A parade led by Commissioner John J. Dorman preceded the exercises. More than 1,000 uniformed firemen took part in the parade.

Father O'Connor praised the heroic firemen who had given their lives in the cause of duty. The program commenced with the playing of the national anthem.

Commissioner Dorman spoke. "Undoubtedly the city would have been wiped out many times if it were not for the work of its army of fire fighters, and it is to do honor to the fallen heroes of this army that we are assembled here today," the commissioner said. "No words of mine will add to their glory. They need no mouthpiece to broadcast their heroic deeds. The records of their splendid accomplishments are written indelibly on the tablets of our memories. Their glorious names are enshrined in our hearts. In all humility, we bow our heads in acknowledgment of their greatness."
