



children enrolled in the Catholic elementary schools of the City of Rochester and for 2110 children in high schools, was that \$2,365,387.49 are saved in public taxation this year by the Church educating these children. Assuming that this cost obtains approximately throughout the Diocese of Rochester (the Catholic schools of the Diocese gave the taxpayers each year the following sums: A total of \$2,008,736.52 for the children in the elementary schools, and a total of \$481,589.35 for the students in the high schools, and a grand total each year of \$3,393,325.87.)

Why Catholic Schools?
"We believe the attention of all taxpayers should be called to the enormous saving made for them by the Catholic Schools, all of which are built, equipped, maintained and operated exclusively by the generosity of the Catholic people themselves and without one cent of expense to the taxpayers of the community. This tremendous work is done not because the Catholic Church desires to have her children kept apart from other children, but because the Church wishes to have her children taught the truths of God, morality and virtue in common with a knowledge of the secular things of life. In other words, the Church wants her children taught Religion—the love and service of God, and the love and service of their country and their fellowmen.

There are in the City of Rochester 35 parish or elementary schools, seven private elementary schools, four high schools, and two commercial schools. Outside of the city there are 37 parish or elementary schools and five high schools. In the parish schools there are 12,732 pupils, of whom 572 are Religious and 83 are lay teachers.

The attendance of pupils is subdivided as follows: In parish or elementary schools, 27,182; in private schools, 736; in high schools, 2,132; total, 30,049. There are 656 teaching orders of the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Sisters of Mercy, the School Sisters of Notre Dame, the Madames of the Sacred Heart, and the Sisters of St. Francis.

Main Purpose of Our Schools
"It is fitting here to outline the main purpose of the Catholic schools, and at the same time to comment upon the excellent work that is being done in secular subjects. It is an inspiring sight to see this great army of pupils at work in the different schools, and to observe their demeanor and deportment. It is a truth to say that no schools are more exacting in teaching the accepted subjects, which form the basis of a modern and well-rounded education. Every subject is taught with particular care in each school, with the result that our pupils are qualified to compete with the graduates of any and every school in the land.

But if the Church recognized only secular subjects as the essential elements of a complete education, there were no need at all of Catholic schools—for all of these subjects are likewise taught in an excellent and acceptable manner in our public schools, and it would be folly for the Church to ask her people to build, equip, and maintain a separate and tremendously costly system of religious schools. But the Church does not consider secular knowledge the end of education. The Church places on a pedestal, high above all secular subjects, a system of education that makes every Catholic school in the land a nursery of religion and of morality. Its schools teach positive religious truths—truths that have been revealed by God, the knowledge of which is the light and guiding principles of Christian life, and compared to which all other knowledge is secondary.

"It has been inspiring to find that all of our parish schools give the proper emphasis to the development of good citizenship. The American flag has a place of honor in every parish school, and the children are taught to salute the flag, to respect

Five Classes To Be Confirmed On This Sunday

It and to love it. Thus, with the moral training given to our children, our Catholic schools give a solidity and security to the life of the Nation which it is impossible to estimate.

"All thinking people recognize that knowledge, unless safeguarded by that restraint which comes from religious and moral training, is likely to prove a dangerous thing. In a recent report of the New York City public schools—the most comprehensive document of its kind ever issued—Mr. Charles W. Lyons, associate superintendent, pointed out that: "We are over-stressing the factor of intelligence in our educational policy, both as to the selection of our teachers and the general training of our pupils." Mr. Lyons calls for a "spiritualization of the school system" by first getting spiritually qualified teachers to do the instructing.

Right here is where our Catholic schools are supreme. Our devoted Sisterhoods, with talented and capable women concerning their lives and life's work to God, are spiritually qualified in a degree that no secular schools can ever hope to equal or imitate. All their thoughts, hopes and ideals are centered on love and service—love and service to the many thousands of children entrusted to their care, and love and service to Almighty God. They see in every child a not only a human being, but a companion of God in the immortal life which awaits us all, and they seek to train that child, first of all to love and serve God, then to love and serve country and humanity for love of God. It is this which makes our Catholic schools complete and supreme. It is this which gives distinctive class, character, and influence to Catholic education, and which gives our Catholic children the strength and the courage to fight temptation, to shun evil and avoid wrong-doing in life. And it is fitting to say here that every boy and girl properly trained to love and serve God is bound to become a good citizen, law-abiding, loyal and devoted to our country, obedient and respectful to her laws, and obedient and respectful to her rulers.

Sisters Study Constantly
"It is good to report that all of our Catholic schools are putting forth every possible effort to improve and perfect their work and their curriculum. Our teaching Sisters study constantly. Many of them take special courses in vacation time and during the school year. They have a splendid normal school, recognized by the State, in which they are trained in the best modern methods of teaching. Their institute during the summer was attended by a great number of teaching Sisters in the Diocese, and it accomplished an unusual amount of good.

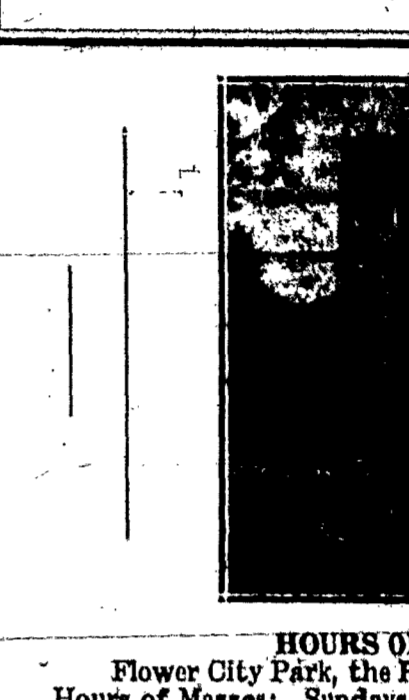
Two new parochial schools were opened in Rochester this year—Our Lady of Good Counsel, with 260 pupils registered, and St. Margaret Mary's School, with 140 pupils registered. The Sisters of St. Francis are in charge of both these schools. Another fine new school will soon replace one well-worn by the year—Holy Cross School, now being erected by the Rev. Alexander McCabe. The boys and girls of Geneva are enjoying their first year in a splendid new high school, the De Sales Institute, which provides additional facilities for a school that has grown rapidly in numbers and in excellence, and which now has 241 students. The Rev. Edward K. Ball, principal, and staff are deserving of special mention for the excellent work they are accomplishing.
