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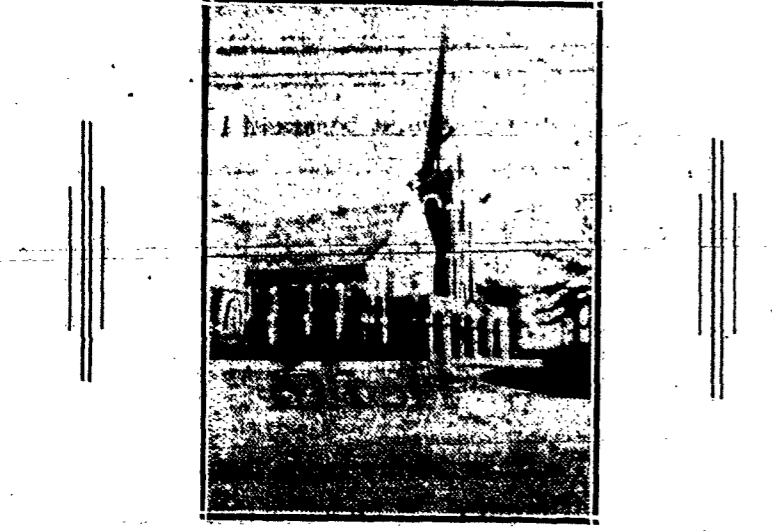

**Catholic Club Choral Society Resumes Work**

**Lived In Auburn And Canandaigua Some Years Ago**

Mrs. Mary Mulheron-Coyne, Sister of Former Auburn Pastor, Dies in Windsor Locks, Conn.

As the Autumn evening sunset of Oct. 13th, 1930, had faded from the horizon, the angel of death paid a visit to 16 Church Street, Windsor Locks, Conn., the home of Mrs. Mary Mulheron-Coyne, and claimed her for her heavenly journey. It found her prepared after years of patient suffering. Her great manner, happy smile and Christian piety was manifested to the end. Mrs. Coyne was dearly beloved by all who knew her. Those in distress and need found in her a friend always. Today, as she lies at rest, one sees evidence of appreciation of those who knew her in life.

Mrs. Coyne was born in Leary, County Donegal, Ireland, July 12, 1853. Coming to this country at the age of five years, with her mother and family, she first resided in Canandaigua, N. Y. Her early education was received in schools of that city, later she attended the Villa Maria Academy at Montreal, Canada. Upon the completion of her studies, she took up her home with her brother, the late Rev. William Mulheron, then pastor of Saint Mary's Church, Auburn, N. Y.

On Jan. 14th, 1880, she was joined in marriage with William J. Coyne, M. D. of Watertown, Conn., at St. Mary's Church, Auburn, N. Y., the ceremony being performed by the late Rev. William Mulheron. With her late husband, she took up her residence in Windsor Locks, Conn., in May, 1885, where her husband practiced medicine until the time of his death.

Mrs. Coyne leaves five children: Rev. William E. Coyne of Genesee, Pa.; Miss Mary M. Coyne, Dr. Anna E. Coyne and Dr. Bruce J. Coyne of Windsor Locks, Conn.; and Mrs. Michael McGrath of South Windsor, Conn.; also five grandchildren.

Her funeral was held from St. Mary's Church, Windsor Locks, Conn., on Thursday morning, Oct. 16th at 10 o'clock, and was largely attended. The children, from the upper grades of St. Mary's School gave honor to the memory of the deceased by attending the funeral in a body. The Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated by the son of the deceased, Rev. William E. Coyne, with the Rev. Douais E. Gleason, D.D., of Stamford, Deacon: Rev. J. W. Barry of Hartford, Conn., sub-deacon; the Rev. H. E. Flanagan of Windsor Locks, Ct. master of ceremonies.

Seated in the sanctuary were the following clergy: Rev. J. A. Conlan, Pastor; Rev. G. M. Grady of Wethersfield, Conn.; Rev. T. A. Byrne of Naugatuck, Ct.; Rev. J. P. Quinn of Windsor, and Rev. E. J. Plunkett of Poquonock, Conn. The burial was made in the family plot in Saint Mary's cemetery. Committal prayers at the grave were conducted by Rev. G. M. Grady, assisted by the clergy. During the Offertory of the Mass, Miss May Willie Sablin of Waterbury, Conn., sang "The Jesu".

**Catholic Women's Club Plans Membership Canvass, Beginning October 29, Ending November 10**

With Mrs. Frank E. Deavenport, One Hundred and Fifty Women Will Solicit New Members and Renew Former Memberships

A group of women from each of the Catholic churches of the city will begin next Wednesday evening at the Catholic Women's Club an open Membership Canvass. A recent survey of the work of the Club showed 42 different activities, over 50 per cent of which is in service to others, helping to create better living conditions and spreading the spirit of friendship, the balance of the activities are of a recreational, educational, cultural and social character. With a limited paid staff, most of the work of the Club is carried on by volunteers and it is maintained in part by the sustaining and active members of the Club. Sustaining Membership is \$12 and active Membership \$2 per year.

The ever growing interest of Catholic women in the work of the Club has prompted the Board of Directors and Membership Committee to set aside ten days for the reception of new members and the renewal of old memberships. This work will be undertaken by 150 women, under the direction of Mrs. Frank E. Deavenport, chairman of the Membership Committee. Invitation to join is especially extended to the large circle of unknown friends of the work of the Club who have "never been asked." A canvasser will call or a membership card will be forwarded if the name of any prospect is sent to the Club at 215 Alexander Street.

The canvass will close on Monday evening, November 10th, with a supper meeting at the Columbus Civic Center, when final reports will be made by the chairman of each parish. The supper meeting is in charge of the recently organized Business Women's Group of the Club, with Miss Anna L. Ireen acting as chairman. Rev. Charles Francis Shay of the Cathedral will be the speaker.

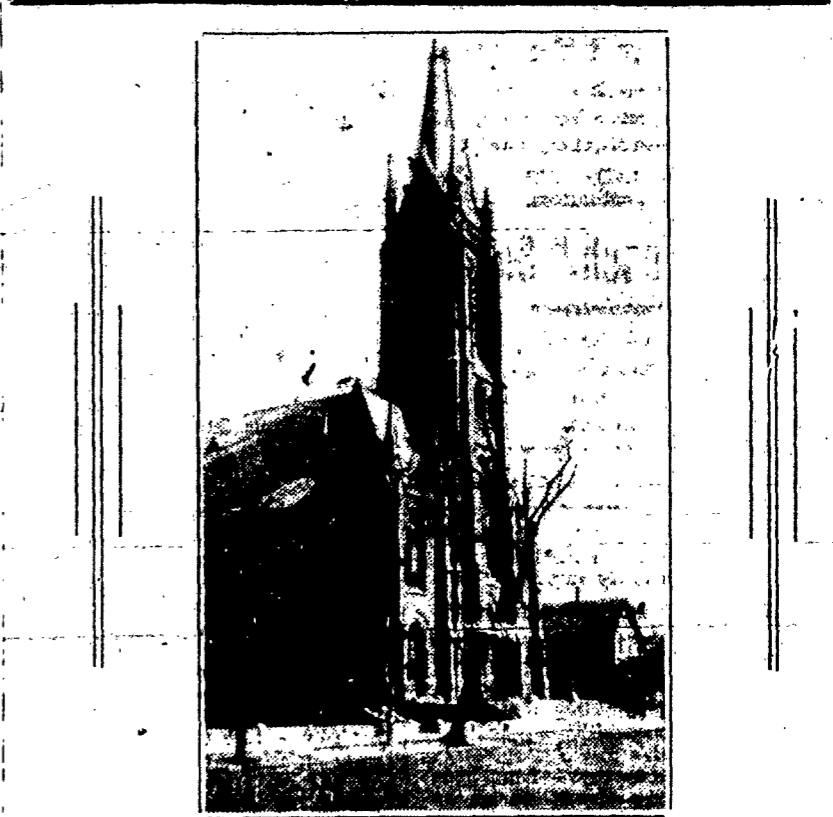
