BISCUITS—Hot or Cold

Biscuits, hot or cold, if properly made, may be depended upon to please the family or guests. Here is a recipe for one of our stand-bys—the tea biscuit—and one for a novel cheese biscuit that is particularly delicious:

- Tea Biscuits**
2 cups special cake flour, sifted
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup butter or other shortening
2/3 cup milk (about)
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually until soft dough is formed. Turn on floured board, knead lightly, roll 3/8-inch thick, and cut with floured biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven (450 F) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes 24 biscuits.
- Cheese Biscuits**
2 cups special cake flour, sifted
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup butter or other shortening
1/2 cup grated cheese
1/2 cup milk and water, equal parts
Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening and cheese. Add liquid gradually until soft dough is formed. Roll 1/2-inch thick, and cut with slightly floured board. Cut with floured biscuit cutter. Bake in hot oven (450 F) 15 minutes. Makes 12 biscuits.

- Grape-Nut Dessert**
1 package lemon junket
1 pint milk
4 tablespoons grape-nuts
4 tablespoon seedless raisins
Mix the grape-nuts and seedless raisins and divide among 4 dessert glasses. Prepare junket according to directions on package. Pour it over the grape-nuts and raisins. Let stand undisturbed at room temperature, until firm—about 10 minutes. Then chill.
- Puff-Ball Oranges**
1 egg white
1/2 cup powdered sugar
4 oranges
Peel small oranges, removing white membrane with outer skin. Beat egg white, slightly, using wire whisk; add sugar, gradually, and continue beating until meringue is stiff and will hold its shape. Thrust the center of each orange, frost them completely with the meringue, and suspend them, by the skewers, across a narrow pan, and bake carefully not to let them brown. Twist skewers gently to remove them. These oranges make a pretty dessert or supper dish.

- Savory Butter Sandwiches**
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons anchovy paste
2 teaspoons mustard
4 teaspoons Rognonot cheese
4 tablespoon butter
Put all ingredients into a bowl; beat until smooth and creamy; spread on crackers; cover each with another cracker, and use with cocktails or simple salads.

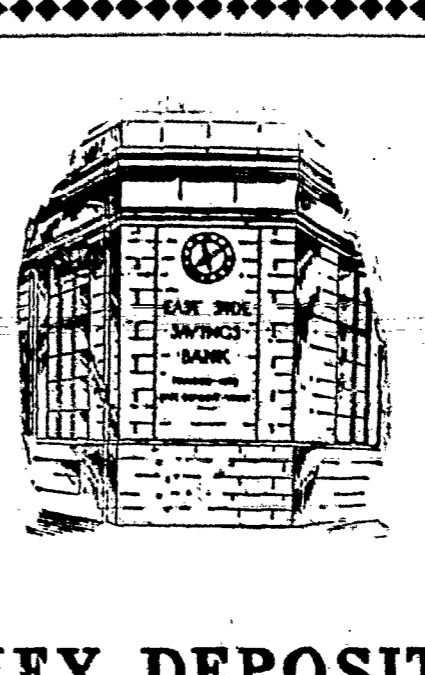
