


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Chiefs Join The Church

The Rev. Vincent Connor, Pastoral Father, will discuss "The Missionary Spirit in the Catholic Church" when he is heard as guest speaker during the Cathedral Hour over WHAM at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon, November 2.

Father Shay, pastor of the Cathedral, will continue his series of talks on "The Ten Commandments," with a detailed treatment of the eighth, "Thou Shalt Not Bear False Witness Against Thy Neighbor."

The Thursday morning Cathedral program during WHAM's "Kindly Thought" period at 8:45 o'clock will include music by the Children's Choir, a reading from the "Imitation of Christ" and a short talk on "Jealousy" by Father Shay.

Georges O'Hara's musical defiance to Soviet Russia's anti-religious campaign, "The Foot Bath Said 'There is No God,'" will be presented by the Paulist Choir under the direction of Father Finn, during the Cathedral Hour at 6 o'clock Sunday night, November 2d. The program comes through WGR, Buffalo. The Rev. John McCarey, S.J., will discuss "Taxation" as the sixth and last of a series of talks.

Excerpts from the scores of two noted operas will be played by the Rochester Civic Orchestra during the weekly Stromberg-Carlson presentation at 10 o'clock Monday night, November 2d. Guy Fraser, Harrison conducts the concert at WHAM for distribution over the NBC-WJZ network.

The first, an aria from Meyerbeer's greatest work, "Les Huguenots," will introduce Jessica Requa Cole as vocal soloist. The second is the overture to "Le Roi d'Ys," the libretto of which was based upon the legendary founding of the ancient Armorican city of Ys.

Graduates of parochial schools will remember with pleasure the Sir Arthur Sullivan composition, "Off in the Stilly Night," to be sung by a male chorus during the Security Trust Program over WHAM at 8:30 o'clock, Tuesday night, November 4th. Geraldine Rhodes Traver is heard as contralto soloist with the chorus.

A demonstration of all stringed instruments will be given by the Rochester Civic Orchestra during the concert over WHAM at 2:30 and 3:15 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon, November 4th. The broadcasts include a double-bass solo based on "Russian Airs," a violin solo in the gypsy manner and the "William Tell" overture.

WHAM now broadcasts several programs designed especially for children. "Joely Bill and Jane" is a delightful sketch that may be heard at 7:45 o'clock each week day morning; the "Maltine Story Program" presents dramatizations of well-known children's stories on Mondays at 5:00 o'clock, and the "Children's Hour" on Thursday afternoon at 5:00 includes stories by "Uncle Dudley" and musical numbers by talented children.


