

## The O'Mahony, Irish Clan Head,

Lineal Descendant of Chieftain Who Helped Drive Danes Out of Ireland—A Columbus Civic Center Unique Character.

Grange, County Wicklow, Ireland, Nov. 7.—The O'Mahony is dead. He was a lineal descendant of the original O'Machony chieftain who married the daughter of Brian Boron here of Clontari, who drove the Danes out of freland many centuries ago. All his life he lived up to the traditions of his clan. He passed away at his castle here last Friday.

Friend of Parnell Born in 1850, The O'Mahony wa prominent figure in pre-war pollics in Ireland and was for many vears a close friend of Charles Stew rt Parnell and John Redmond.
