CAKE AND CANDY
Coffee, besides its many virtues as a beverage, makes delightful flavoring for desserts and confections, particularly when there is no other ingredient to relieve the richness of the dish. Here are two inexpensive recipes that are worth a trial.

Coffee Fruit Cake
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup light brown sugar
1 egg
1 1/2 cup coffee
1 1/4 cup milk
1 1/2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 pound raisins
1/2 pound citron
1/2 pound fine-cut-in-strips
Cream shortening, add sugar, egg yolks, coffee and milk. Sift together flour and baking powder and add slowly. Add fruit, which has been slightly floured, and fold in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in greased loaf pan from one hour to one hour and a quarter.

Mocha Fudge
1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
1/2 cup milk (preferably part cream)
1 heaping tablespoon cocoa
4 tablespoons strong brewed coffee
Butter size of a walnut
pinch of salt
Scant teaspoon vanilla
Melt cocoa, add milk and coffee and sugar. Stir until sugar is thoroughly dissolved, place over heat and boil until it forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from heat, add butter and salt, beat strongly until it cools. Then add vanilla and beat briskly until it starts to set solid, then pour into buttered pan or plate to set cold before cutting it into squares. English walnuts may be added if desired.

Halloween Night Oats
1 loaf graham bread
1-3 lb. butter
1 1/2 cups broken Riquefort cheese
1 tablespoon chopped chives; or 1 teaspoon onion juice
2 tablespoons evaporated milk
Cream butter, add cheese, pimento, chives and evaporated milk and work up a smooth spread on bread, garnish with capers and pimento strips, and cut in fancy shapes. Serve garnished with sprig of parsley or watercress, or on a lettuce leaf.

TWO NUTTY DISHES
It is surprising how many delightful dishes may be made with nuts as one of the ingredients. Walnuts are particularly delicious, not only in cakes and muffins, given in croquettes, dressings, salads and whips. Here are two unusual recipes which you should try.

Walnut Meat Substitute
Mix 1 cup cooked rice, 1 cup toasted bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, 2 teaspoons sage, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 1/2 cups ground walnuts, 2 eggs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon celery seed, and 1 teaspoon onion juice until well blended. Shape like sausages, brown well in frying pan or in a hot oven. Garnish with bacon rolls and lemon and serve hot with a rich sauce.

Walnut and Salmon Salad
Rinse cooked or canned salmon and separate into large flakes to make one-fourth cup. Cut walnuts

Next Speaker,
Catholic Hour**

Gifted Paulist Father Will Deliver Series of Eight Talks, Beginning Sunday, —A New Soloist.

The Rev. James M. Gillis, C.S.P., of New York City, editor of the Catholic World, will be the next speaker in the Catholic Hour, over the nation-wide hook-up. His first address will be given on Sunday, and this will be the first of a series of eight talks to be given by him.

Father Gillis has been heard in Rochester on several occasions, always with appreciation and always by a large audience. His talks are interesting, helpful, inspirational, and he will be welcomed cordially by Radio audiences all over America. Rev. John A. McCloskey, S.J., of Detroit University, who has been the speaker in the Catholic Hour each Sunday since September 28th, will conclude his series on November 2d, with an address on the Divinity of Christ. Father McCloskey's addresses have everywhere been received with great favor, those of Father Gillis in the Catholic Hour report. His marvelous English and speaking ability have made him a most popular speaker in the Catholic Hour, and he has been heard as a soloist in the Catholic Hour for the first time on Sunday, November 2d, when he chanted the hymn "Dies Irae" in Gregorian style. He will sing in the Catholic Hour at frequent intervals during the next two months.
