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
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St. Lucy's Church Will Open Sunday English Mission

Professor F. Eugene Bonn Will Receive Papal Honor At Solemn Service Nov. 23

Organist of St. Patrick's Cathedral Has Been Awarded High Pontifical Honor of "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice"—His Active Career.

Professor F. Eugene Bonn, for the past 42 years organist at St. Patrick's Cathedral, has just been awarded the high pontifical honor of "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice". This papal decoration will be conferred upon him by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, at a solemn Pontifical Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral at 10:30 o'clock on November 23d. Professor Bonn will occupy a special seat in the sanctuary during the service, and it is expected that many hundreds of his friends will be in attendance, to honor him by their presence and their prayers.

Special Music Nov. 23.

The Mass, Nov. 23, will be sung by students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's and by an augmented choir under the direction of one chosen to represent Professor Bonn.

Professor Bonn is recognized as one of the foremost organists and choir directors in the country. He is also an author of the first rank, and has written much church music. This will be the first time in the history of the Diocese of Rochester that an honor of this kind has been granted to a layman. The award was made by Pope Pius XI, in response to Bishop O'Hern's petition, according to notification received by the Bishop from Cardinal Pacelli, Vatican secretary of state.

The pontifical decoration was bestowed upon Professor Bonn for his unblemished character—in his personal life and in reward for his promotion of Church Music as laid down by the law of the church through the Holy See.

Honor is Highly Regarded.

The medal "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice" was instituted by Pope Leo XIII, July 17, 1888, in memory of his golden sacerdotal jubilee. This decoration was made a permanent distinction in 1898, and its object is to reward those who are especially deserving through services to the Church and its head.

The medal is of gold, silver or bronze, and consists of a circular, octagonal in form by "flange" design, fixed in the angles of the cross. The extremities of the cross are of a slightly pinnate form. In the center of the cross is a small medallion with an image of Leo XIII, and encircling the image are the words in Latin "Leo XIII. Summus Pontifex in the Tenth Year of His Pontificate."

On the reverse side are the papal emblems, in the center, and in the circle surrounding the emblems the motto "Pro Deo et Pontifice" is stamped. On each branch of the cross are inscriptions which with the fleur-de-lis form the coat of arms of the Papal family to which Pope Leo XIII belonged. The ribbon is purple with delicate lines of white and yellow on each border. The decoration is worn on the right side of the breast.

Native of Germany

Professor Bonn was born in the Province of Bavaria, Germany, 77 years ago, and came to this country when a young man, settling in Sandusky, Ohio, where he followed the profession of music teacher. In 1873 he returned to Germany and studied in the Conservatory at Munich for two years under Prof. Joseph R. Rheinberger. He then came back to America, and again in 1877 returned to Germany where he studied orchestration under Professor Schwartz at Munich. He returned to the United States the next year and accepted his present position at St. Patrick's Cathedral.

Notre Dame Nuns Diamond Jubilee Observed Sunday

Bishop O'Hern Pontificates and Many Sisters Attend Service in SS. Peter and Paul's Church Commemorating Jubilee.

The Sisters of Notre Dame celebrated in a fitting manner last Sunday their coming to SS. Peter & Paul's Church in this city. With the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., officiating, solemn pontifical Mass was celebrated in the church at 10:30 o'clock. More than 150 Sisters of Notre Dame were present at the service, including the Rev. Mother Mary Medulpha, provincial superior of the order, from Baltimore. Bishop O'Hern spoke at the Mass and paid eloquent tribute to the Sisters of Notre Dame and to their work in the Diocese of Rochester.

Plans for the celebration were made by the Rev. Dr. Paul Goffi, rector of SS. Peter & Paul's Church. A procession from the school to the church preceded the Mass. This was headed by the Knights of St. John, with altar boys, Sisters, clergy and the Bishop in line. Officers of the Mass, headed by Bishop O'Hern, were Assistant Priest, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. William M. Hart, V.G.; deacon, Rev. F. William Stauder; sub-deacon, Rev. George J. Schmitt; deacons of honor, Rev. John F. Boppel and Rev. Joseph H. Goffi.

Bishop Praised Sisters

Bishop O'Hern spoke appreciatively of the Sisters and their work. He said in part:

"It was on October 15, 1855, that a handful of the Sisters of Notre Dame started the work of teaching in SS. Peter and Paul's parish, after taking up their residence in the humble convent in King Street. The school registrar of the first year tells us that there were 100 girls and 80 small boys, all told, who made up the school and were taught by the Sisters. Today, this same school of SS. Peter and Paul registers 641 pupils, with a faculty of 14 teachers and a supervising principal, and Holy Family parish registers nearly a thousand."

"During all these years the high standard of school has been a well-known fact in educational circles, and the splendid work of the Sisters of Notre Dame has been fully appreciated by Bishop, priests, and people. Today we are glad to welcome the Reverend Mother Superior of this great community of the School Sisters of Notre Dame to our Jubilee celebration, as also so many others from the various schools in our city. We wish them to know that their efforts in the Diocese of Rochester are a joy to the Bishop and priests who serve, and that their unselfish services have commanded the admiration, the love and esteem of priests and people."

Teaching in Seven Schools

The Sisters of Notre Dame are teaching in the following schools in the Diocese of Rochester: St. Boniface, Holy Family, Holy Redeemer, St. Joseph, St. Michael's, SS. Peter and Paul, in Rochester, and in the Church of the Holy Ghost, Coldwater. They have approximately 4,000 children under their care in the Diocese, and their work in behalf of these children, as well as in behalf of the children of many other generations, has been of incalculable good.

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
