**Rev. Francis J. Naughten,
Pastor of Hornell Church,
Dies Suddenly in His Home**

**Pastor of St. Ann's Church, Widely Known and Beloved,
Succumbs to Heart Attack—His Funeral
Held On Wednesday.**

Hornell, Nov. 24.—The Rev. Francis J. Naughten, L.L.D., M.R., V.F., rector of St. Ann's Church here for the past 30 years, was stricken suddenly with a heart attack in his rectory here Saturday night and died before medical aid could reach him. He was 71 years old. He had not been ill, but appeared to be in excellent health. He was one of the best known priests in the Diocese of Rochester. His funeral was held in St. Ann's Church Wednesday morning, and was attended by a great congregation of parishioners, friends and fellow townsmen.

That it is one of the largest and most prosperous in the Diocese. Under a splendid parish school here, with more than 400 pupils attending it, and every phase of parish work, social, educational and spiritual, has been developed and built up under his leadership.

A Good Business Man
Father Naughten was an excellent business man, prudent, energetic and progressive. He had a leading part in building the federation building here. He was the founder and organizer of the Royal Development Company, which was commonly known as "Father Naughten's Mine." Within the past ten days a testimonial dinner was tendered Father Naughten at Hotel Sherwood in honor of the successful completion of that enterprise.

Beloved by All People
Father Naughten was beloved by all people in the community, irrespective of religious beliefs. He had a loving and kindly way, was broad in his sympathies and his friendships, helpful and charitable in all worthy undertakings, and had a fine sense of pride in civic affairs in the city where he served humanity and God so well for so many happy years. He was one of the founders of the Hornell Children's Home, and was a trustee of St. James' Hospital.

To both of these institutions he gave a great deal of time and thought, and was always a helpful friend to them.

Crossed Ocean Fourteen Times
Father Naughten loved to travel. He had crossed the Atlantic ocean 14 times, and had been received by the Pope on several occasions. He was well posted on European affairs, and had great interest in all things that pertained to the growth and development of the Catholic Church.

Cardinal Charost's Career—
Cardinal Charost was born in Le Mans on Nov. 14, 1860. He was educated at the Seminary at Le Mans, then at the French Seminary in Rome and was graduated from the University of Angers as a Doctor in Theology, Doctor in Canon Law and a Bachelor of Arts.

Ordained priest in 1882, Father Charost was made titular Bishop of Miletopolis in 1912, while stationed at Le Mans as a parish priest. When Lille was raised to the rank of a bishopric by the Holy See in November, 1917, he was installed as the first bishop.

It is well known of charity and organization of relief among the refugees in Northern France during the war was recognized by the Vatican, and in June, 1920, he was promoted to be archbishop and transferred to Rennes.

He was nominated as Cardinal and received the red hat from the hands of Pope Benedict XV in December, 1922. The Pope, wishing to emphasize the new Cardinals' "war service," made him titular Cardinal Priest of the Church of Santa Maria della Vittoria in Rome (Holy Mary of Victory).

Cardinal Mistrangelo Dies—
Cardinal Alfonso Maria Mistrangelo, Archbishop of Florence, died at 10:18 o'clock last Friday night of gastric poisoning. The Cardinal underwent an operation earlier in the day.

Cardinal Mistrangelo, Archbishop of the historic city of Dante's birth, was one of the most venerated figures in the Sacred College of the Catholic Church.

Born in Savona, Province of Genoa on April 26, 1852, he entered the Order of Teaching Brothers, who dedicate their lives to teaching, when only 18 years old.

He distinguished himself early as a teacher and above all as a disciplinarian. While still very young he was promoted to the rectorship of the order's college at Ovada. At the same time he established for himself the reputation as a preacher which was to follow him well into advanced age. In fact, he delivered a notable series of sermons at the College of Pinalbergo when he was still a minor orders. Upon being raised to the priesthood, he evinced remarkable gifts as an organizer, particularly of religious ceremonies designed to have wide popular appeal.

His Death a Great Shock
Father Naughten's death came as a great shock not only to his own people, but to all people of this community. He had not been ill at all, and apparently had been in the best of health. He was looking forward to his happy expectancy to the arrival of the official papers naming him a Monsignor of the Church, and to the ceremonies of the investiture that would follow. His death will be deeply and sincerely mourned by the entire community, and most of all by the people whom he served so faithfully and devotedly for the past 30 years, their friends, their enemies, and their neighbors with God.

His funeral was held in St. Ann's Church from Sunday afternoon until the hour of the funeral at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. Members of the Fourth Degree Assembly, Knights of Columbus, formed an honor guard by the bier day and night, and it is estimated that more than 10,000 people came to the church to pray for Father Naughten and take a last look at the pastor who had served them and the friend they loved.

The office of the dead was chanted Tuesday evening by many priests, and the church was filled to overflowing. Long before the hour of the funeral Wednesday morning, the spacious church was filled to overflowing, all classes of people being represented, including city and county officials. The Hornell Ministerial Association, in special meeting, paid beautiful tribute to his life, his work and his character, and the whole city was in mourning for a good citizen and an upright man.

Bishop O'Hern Officiates
More than 150 priests were present from several dioceses. Bishop O'Hern celebrated the funeral mass, assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart, V.G., an archbishop; Rev. Joseph S. Cameron of Rochester, dean; Rev. Francis A. Clancy, D.D., the Buffalo diocese, subdeacon; Rev. John J. Lee of Elmira, and Rev. James Griffin, L.L.D. of Corning, deacons of honor; Rev. William F. Bergan of St. Andrew's Seminary, Rochester, first master of ceremonies; Rev. Samuel J. Haughton of Auburn; and Rev. Philip Goldy of Churchville acolytes; Rev. Leo V. Smith of Rochester, book bearer; Rev. James M. O'Brien of Clifton Springs, candle bearer; Rev. Charles P. Riefer of Perkinsville, thurifer; Rev. Joseph Esser of Trumansburg, mitre bearer; John Brill of Hornell, a student at St. Bernard's Seminary, granulee bearer.

Tribute to His Life
Bishop O'Hern preached the funeral sermon. He spoke of Father Naughten's long years of service as a priest, of his fidelity to his Church and his God, and of the fine influence of his priestly character. He told of his intense interest in all civic affairs, of his love for Hornell and its people, and of his zeal to help in all good movements for the city and its people. He paid fine tribute to his work as a priest, and spoke sympathetically of his devotion to all his people, and of his interest in their welfare. He asked all to pray frequently for the repose of the soul of their good pastor and

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
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
