Chest Campaign Starts Monday For \$150,000

Ten Teams Will Go Out for Relief Fund for Social and Jewish Welfare and Catholic Charities.

Next Monday 10 teams of 10 men each will go out to solicit donations totalling \$150,000, to provide additional relief funds for the Social Welfare League, the Jewish Welfare Council and the Rochester Catholic Charities. This special fund is made necessary by the increasing demands being made for help upon these agencies by individuals and families suffering from unemployment.

One hundred solicitors are being enrolled in 10 teams for the emergency campaign next week. These 10 team captains have been chosen: Matthew Ador, John P. Boviann, Herbert W. Brantley, Wendell J. Curtis, Louis S. Fookes, James E. Gleason, Thomas H. Green, Irving I. Hoyt, Harry S. Moody, Harold C. Townsend.

Unless the \$150,000 emergency sum is realized, the three family welfare philanthropies will be compelled to refer to families hitherto able to maintain independence but who, with the coming of winter months, must receive assistance.

Says Palestine Will Be a Home For Jewish Race

Premier MacDonald Tells British Parliament—No Change Is Contemplated—Will Help Jew and Arab Families.

London, Nov. 21.—David Lloyd George, Britain's war-time Prime Minister, attacked the government bitterly on Monday night for its change of policy towards Palestine, and demanded an accounting. Premier MacDonald, in his defense, gave assurance that Palestine will remain a national home for the Jews; that the mandate will be scrupulously carried out; that no change in policy is contemplated, and that any doubts to the contrary are due to misunderstanding. The government also promised a \$12,500,000 loan to settle 10,000 Arab and Jewish families on the land.

Lloyd George is sharp. Lloyd George made a very sharp attack on the present Government and said it had violated the spirit and letter of the mandate and dishonored Great Britain. He said the Government's recent "White Paper" was a practical repudiation of a mandate that was a pledge of honor to the Jewish people by some of the greatest nations of the earth, including the British Empire.

Dr. Drummond Shiels replied for the Government, and stated that the Government intends to stand by the mandate. He said 1,450 permits to new Jewish immigrants had just been issued, proving that immigration is not to be curtailed, as critics of the Government claim.

Dr. Shiels had contention was that in a land hot to the sun and arid, the success of all must depend on good racial feeling. He confessed that the proposal for a round-table conference had been rejected by the Arabs alone, but the British Government would welcome it, and suggested a "round table" to take action until after the most complete consultation with both sides.

Premier MacDonald said that a Jewish national home "could best be promoted by economic cooperation with the Arabs."

"Economic trouble will immediately start a religious conflagration," he said. "It has been apparent all through these labor developments and industrial developments."

"There is another fact that is very difficult for us to understand when we are dealing with the Arabs. It is that the whole of their life is a unity. Touch it at any point, and it is bound ultimately to come round to what is the foundation of all original life—namely, religious unity."

"The Government will not do it. We are now in consultation with the representatives of the Zionists and will also keep in similar touch with the Arabs. One mark of success in any sort of success will be to lay the mandate in its true aspect, can be carried out."

Premier MacDonald said that Palestine will remain a national home for the Jews, and that the Government will do its utmost to help accomplish this.

Undoubtedly the one thing which makes poultry profitable is the ability of the flock owner to produce eggs during those months in the fall and winter when egg prices are high. Off-season egg production cannot be obtained unless the flock is housed in a building which provides something like spring and early summer conditions when the thermometer outside tells us that it is winter.

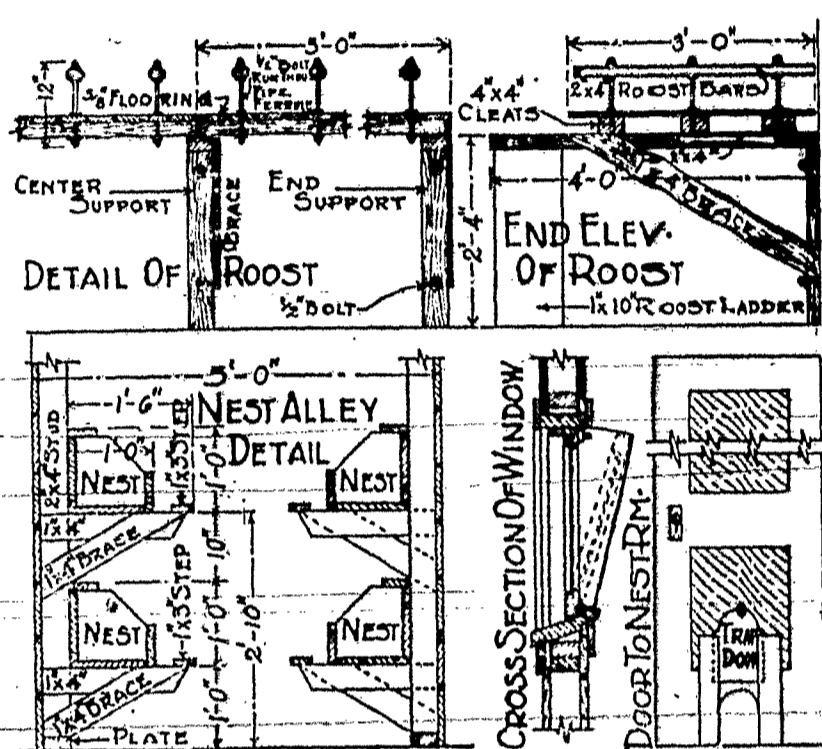
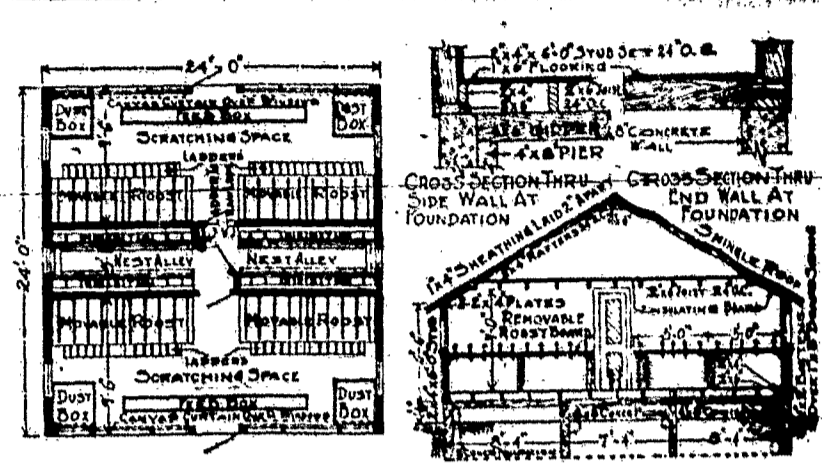
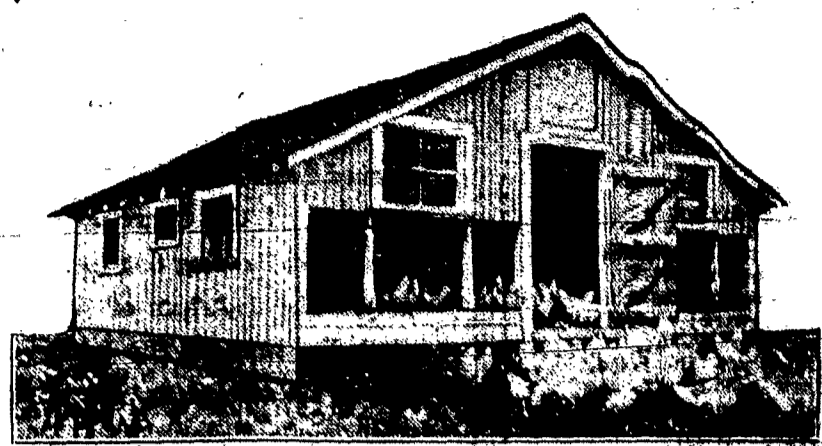
Pullets and young stock now are ranging outdoors. Eggs are being produced in great quantities and prices are low. Were it not for the fact that a large percentage of eggs produced in the spring go into cold storage, egg production would be unprofitable and that it is only those poultrymen who are able to produce a maximum number of eggs at the lowest possible cost who are able to make any sort of a showing at this time of the year.

Now is the time to begin to plan to build a good poultry house for the pullets which will begin to lay eggs next fall. There are a number of good types of poultry houses, one which is shown in the accompanying illustration. This is what is known as a two-gable house. It is provided with a concrete floor and foundation and is of frame construction. The house shown here is 24 feet by 21 feet square, which provides about 300 square feet of floor space, which is sufficient for a flock of about 100 White LeChenas or 80 to 90 layers of the heavier breeds. Cross sectional drawings showing how this building is constructed, and the materials used, are shown in connection with this article. It will be noted that the side walls are 6 feet 6 inches to the eave line. This is of a height sufficient for the placing of nests underneath the windows and permits the owner to move in all sections of the house without discomfort.

One feature of poultry house construction which is most emphasized by those architects who have made a study of it is tight construction. The modern poultry house is not only tight to the weather but is provided with insulation which keeps out the cold in winter and the heat in summer. This is accomplished by using insulating board on inside walls, allowing an air space between it and the outside walls. In this house insulating board is used for the ceiling, leaving the air space in the gabled section of the building.

This is not a difficult house to build. The architect's floor plans, cross sections of the side and end walls, etc., will show anyone who is familiar with building how it is constructed. Also reproduced are details of the nests, cross-sectional view of the window

which is designed so that it may be used as a ventilator and elevators and details of the roosts.

Baby chicks which have been hatched in late winter and early spring should have plenty of early and the proper ration so that they will develop into sturdy pullets ready to lay in the early fall. When that time comes a proper house should be ready for them.

Labor-Saving Units in Home Help Housewives

Labor-saving inventions are being developed and placed in the home so fast that the housewife should give serious study to the value of each before installing it, says the household research bureau, discussing how to economize on time, energy and patience in the average residence.

"Take a kitchen and store room census, first of all, and note how many practically new pieces of equipment are stored away now," says the bureau. "Business organizations analyze their methods and equipment, discarding all operations that involve unnecessary cost."

"Modern housewives should analyze their work in just the same way. One should consider what the actual saving in time, labor or money, or all three, will be before purchasing any new piece of equipment. Expensive devices used only a few minutes now and then generally cannot justify their cost. They do not indicate efficiency in buying."

On the other hand, certain items of equipment are so essential there is no question about the wisdom of adopting them," says the bureau. "A good vacuum cleaner quickly pays for itself by saving labor, time and floor coverings."

Man Fatally Shot At Side of Church Dies In Buffalo

Buffalo, Nov. 21.—Rev. Paul Baglio, pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church in Buffalo, reading his office in his rectory on Monday evening, heard three shots close by. He went out to investigate, and found John Arlin, aged 35, of Bradford, Pa., dying in an alley at the side of his church. Father Baglio called an ambulance, and the police. Arlin died 15 minutes after he was taken to a hospital. He was unable to talk, or to give any clue to his murderer.

Arlin had been shot three times. A bullet from a .38 caliber revolver had entered beneath Arlin's heart, a second bullet had pierced the head beneath the left ear, shattering the jaw bone, and the third had entered the left side of the neck. Identity was established through a bank book and papers in the victim's pocket.

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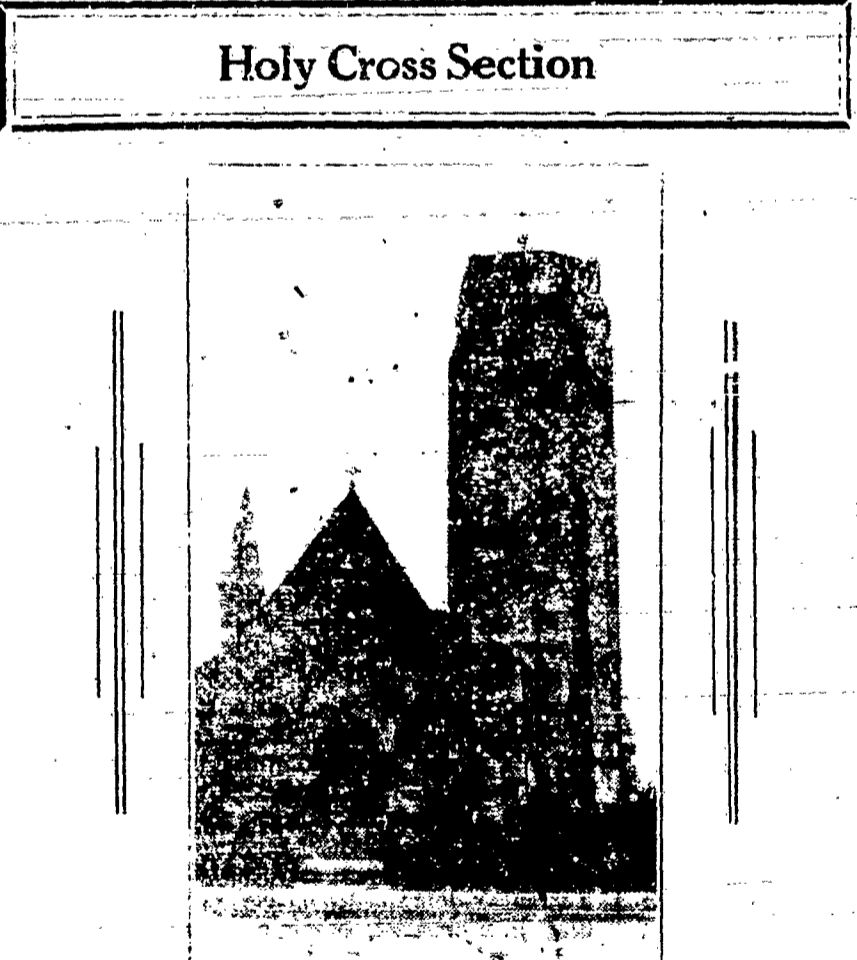

Preparedness is the only safe policy for America to pursue, the Rev. Dr. George F. Kettell, former National Chaplain of the American Legion, declared at the annual dinner of the American Legion Auxiliaries of Monroe County at the Powers Hotel on Tuesday evening this week.

"We don't want war, but we have sense enough to know there's going to be another one," Dr. Kettell said. "We want peace, but it must be peace with security and honor."

Dr. Kettell made a strong plea for the kind of preparedness that will prevent other nations from attacking us at any time.

Invitations For Marriage Issued

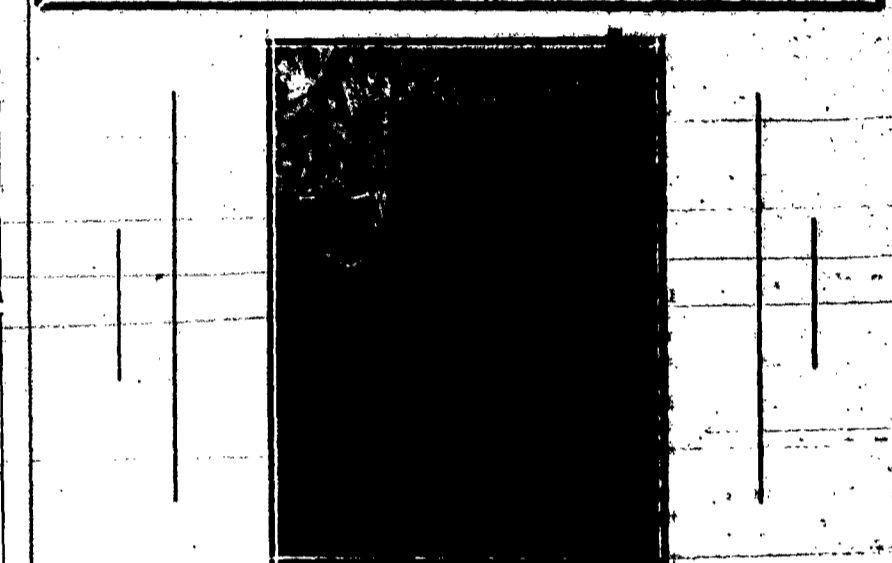
