


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St. Ann's Home Residents Were Well Entertained

Lady of Good Counsel School Dedicated By Archbishop Hanna, Who Praises Pastor and People

Archbishop Pays Tribute to Bishop McQuaid, Champion of Catholic Education, and Commends the Sisters For Their Work

The newly completed parochial school of Our Lady of Good Counsel Church, on Brooks Avenue, was dedicated Sunday night by the Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, D.D., Archbishop of San Francisco. A capacity congregation was present at the service, and a number of priests, and Archbishop Hanna paid eloquent tribute to the pastor of the church, the Rev. Edward T. Meagher, to the Sisters of St. Francis who are in charge of the school, and to the people of the parish.

Bishop O'Hern had two confirmation services in other parts of the Diocese Sunday, and was unable to be present at the dedication. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. William McHarty, V.G., and several other priests were in attendance and the solemn and beautiful service brought happiness to the large congregation in attendance.

Archbishop Hanna Talks
Archbishop Hanna spoke with deep appreciation of the splendid work done in the new parish of Our Lady of Good Counsel by Father Meagher, and praised the new school. "You have a fine pastor," he said to the people, "and you have a wonderful people," he said to Father Meagher, "to be able to accomplish so much in such a short time.

"It is good to be here, and to look into your faces," said Archbishop Hanna, "and to see the work you have in your beautiful new building. You and your pastor have sacrificed and labored that there may arise here a temple unto wisdom and knowledge unto the highest things of the ideal life to which the children of your neighborhood may come for instruction.

Child Hope of Future
"The child is, after all, the most important thing in the world, the joy of the home, the pride and the only hope of tomorrow. And it is important not only because he reflects God's image, but important because in him and through him is the hope of coming generations.

"It is good for us tonight to go back fifty years to recall Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid, the most striking figure of his time, who stood out for education of Catholic children in Catholic schools. He championed our cause. And his ideals have reached happy fulfillment through four generations in the loyal action of these consecrated women who have given of their intelligence, wisdom, and power to instruct your children."

Father Meagher spoke happily to the people. He told of the facilities of the school, praised the cooperation given him by the people of the parish.

High Honors For Prof. Bonn Here on Sunday

Organist at Cathedral Will Receive Prized Papal Decoration from the Hands of Bishop O'Hern

Professor F. Eugene Bonn, organist at St. Patrick's Cathedral for 42 years, will be highly honored at the 10:30 o'clock Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral Sunday morning, when he will receive from the hands of the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, the papal decoration, "Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice."

Mr. Bonn will occupy a special place in the sanctuary for the service, and for the first time in many years will not have an active part in the musical portion of the service. The Cathedral boys' and men's choir will be directed by Mr. Bonn's two sons for the occasion. Francis Bonn will be the choirmaster and John Paul Bonn will preside at the organ. Students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's seminaries, at both of which Mr. Bonn was professor of music for many years, will sing parts of the Mass under the direction of the Rev. John M. Peiser, professor of music at St. Bernard's Seminary.

Members of the Cathedral Choir are arranging a reception for Mr. Bonn at the Cathedral Hall in Plymouth Avenue North next Tuesday. There will be a special musical program and friends of Mr. Bonn will have an opportunity to extend congratulations.

Einstein's Religious Views Utter Nonsense, Says Dr. Fulton Sheen

said that the religious teaching of children was a remedial measure in this situation.

"You place beside the flag the Cross of Christ," he said. "The flag is only human and may of itself, God forbid, so the way of all things human, it needs the Cross of Christ beside it. The Cross will be its teacher, protector and defense, especially in times of crisis."

Jewish Education Speaks
Dr. Walter M. Howlett of the department of religious education of the Greater New York Federation of Churches, Miss Olive Jones, president of the Jewish Teachers' Association, and I. David Cohen, president of the Jewish Education Council, also spoke at the luncheon. Mr. Cohen said that at the next meeting of the Jewish group he was going to propose that it have an advisory council representing the three denominations. He also invited representatives of the Catholic body to attend a good-will luncheon to be held in February.

Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle, founder, organizer and consulting director of the association, backed Mr. Cohen's proposals and said he hoped that the day would come when, "while we respect and love the principle of the separation of Church and State, which is at the foundation of our laws," a universal demand for "adequate religious instruction for the salvation of souls and the security of our flag throughout the length and breadth of our land" would come from all religious groups.

There were several other speeches, and many guests of honor. The breakfast was preceded by a communion service at St. Patrick's Cathedral at which Cardinal Hayes said Mass. A retreat was conducted for the teachers at the Cathedral during the three preceding evenings by the Rev. Dr. Sheen.
