

Bishop O'Shea And Companions Safe in Kanchow

Red Army Flees From Vicinity of Chinese City It Has Menaced For Months—Two More Priests Captured.

Shanghai, Nov. 21.—The Rt. Rev. John A. O'Shea, C.M., D.D., Vicar Apostolic of Kanchow, Kiangsi, China, and the eight missionary priests who are with him in Kanchow, are safe for the time being, at least. The Communist army, which has surrounded and besieged Kanchow for many weeks, has gone far away, and the occupants of the city are free from the dread of plunder and slaughter.

Two More Priests Captured.—The prevalence of banditry in North China following the cessation of civil war hostilities was indicated by the seizure of two Catholic priests, Father Mazzoli and Father Pilla, in the Kulupa district of Shenai Province.

Two Protestant missionaries are captives in the vicinity of Kanchow. The Rev. Bert N. Nelson of Minneapolis, a Lutheran missionary, and Kristofer Tvedt, a Norwegian who was engaged in Lutheran work.

Word has been received here that Bishop O'Shea, after the retreat of the Communist army, declined to be evacuated to Sinyang, in accordance with plans previously made and which Nationalist troops were endeavoring to carry out.

Tinkham Demands That Bp. Cannon Be Prosecuted

Washington, Nov. 21.—A fresh demand for the prosecution of Bishop James Cannon Jr. on charges of violating the federal corrupt practices act during the 1928 political campaign has been made upon Attorney General K. Mitchell by Representative George Holden Tinkham (Rep. Mass.).

Asserting that the attorney-general had taken "no action whatsoever" on his request a year ago for a department of justice inquiry into Bishop Cannon's activities, Mr. Tinkham in a letter to Mr. Mitchell "formally and officially" called upon him to place before a federal grand jury the facts brought out by the Senate lobby investigation committee last winter.

"Picture us on Rindkhong Hill. The old earth sways back and forth 50 seconds, one long minute. It is 3 o'clock in the morning. We are forward-passed out of sweet slumber and our beds to the opposite wall of the room.

"No sound issues from the room of my companion, other than the roar of a call to find out what has happened. He is under the bed. He has torn his way through the mosquito curtain. Out he comes at the sound of my voice and together we start the rounds to quiet the boys.

The fullback from Three Oaks, Mich., had as one of the greatest of Knute Rockne's football greats, was forced to withdraw from Notre Dame because he married and then started divorce proceedings.

Savoldi admitted his marriage, but he had never lived with his wife and that he would seek an annulment.
