Louvain University Wins Fight to Abolish "Fury" Inscription

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with those who have opposed the inscription and, more particularly, with Msgr. Ladeuze, rector of Louvain University.

After the war an appeal to the people of the United States to give money for the erection of the new library met with a quick and enthusiastic response, and the Academy of Fine Arts and the Institute of France chose Mr. Warren as the architect.

Rector Opposed It

Msgr. Ladeuze protested that the wording of the inscription was in bad Latin, "barbarous and unworthy of appearing on the new library," and that it would promote racial hatred.

Mr. Warren replied that he would not abandon what he had promised the Cardinal "for the sake of pleasing a small number of people."

"I have not to follow the trend of politics," he said. "As an artist I have been called upon to write in stone a page of the history of the war of 1914 and it cannot be changed in 1928."

On June 22 an attempt by Msgr. Ladeuze to forestall Mr. Whitney Warren by having a balustrade built without an inscription was balked when the architect appeared on the scene and, unable to halt the work-

Baskets of Food for Needy Families, Tag Day for Used Clothing, and Toys, Too, Will Be Collected.

In accordance with an established custom, Nazareth College has begun its preparations to aid the charity work of Rochester. Miss Anne Egan, the president of the Undergraduate Association, and Miss Helen Ginter, the prefect of the Students' Spiritual Council, have decided upon a more extensive program for this year, because of the unemployment situation.

The college will provide Christmas baskets, attractively trimmed, as well as substantially filled, for 20 needy families recommended by the Catholic Charities.

As an added feature Thursday, "Tag Day," this may prove so successful that it will be looked upon as a tradition of Nazareth College. The idea to be carried out Thursday is that every girl will bring some articles of partly worn clothing or toys and in return receive a tag for her efforts in behalf of charity. The goal is 100 per cent distribution of tags. The articles thus collected will be sent to charitable institutions or needy families.

The Sophomore class has announced its intention of collecting toys. Miss Margaret Enright, president of the class, has sent out a plea to every one interested in making the poor, little kiddies of this city happy on Christmas day, to respond by bringing toys.

The Christmas baskets, clothing, and toys will be distributed by the students of the college on Tuesday and Wednesday preceding Christmas.

We All Like Biscuits

Give a man a hot flaky biscuit and he's your friend for life. Give him two or three and... well, here are two recipes for these delicacies that fit right into the winter menu.

Pin Wheel Biscuits

2 cups special cake flour, sifted
4 teaspoons baking powder
2 1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons butter or other shortening
2 1/2 cup milk
4 tablespoons butter, creamed
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/2 cup pecan meats, chopped

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually until soft dough is formed. Roll 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured board. Spread with creamed butter; sprinkle with brown sugar and nuts. Roll as for jelly roll and cut in 1 inch pieces. Place in greased muffin pans cut-sides up. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 30 minutes. Makes 12 biscuits.

Buttermilk Biscuits

2 cups special cake flour, sifted
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter or other shortening
1/2 cup buttermilk or sour milk
1/2 pound pimento cheese
4 tablespoons butter

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, soda, and salt, and sift again. Cut in 2 tablespoons shortening. Add buttermilk gradually until soft dough is formed. Roll 1/4 inch thick on slightly floured board. Cut with floured biscuit cutter. Place in greased pan. Add cheese and 4 tablespoons butter and pour mixture over biscuits. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes. Makes eighteen 1 1/4 inch biscuits.

Kris Kringle Salads

The following salads are good at any time, but fit particularly into the Christmas dinner menu. As they are composed of alkaline-reaction foods they tend to balance the main dishes of the meal. Try one of them this Christmas.

Molded Fruit Salad

1 package lemon flavored gelatine
1 pint boiling water
6 slices canned pineapple, diced and drained
2 tart apples, pared and diced
2 bananas, sliced
Crisp lettuce

Dissolve gelatine in boiling water. Pour small amount into mold. Chill until firm. Add fruits. When remaining gelatine is slightly thickened, pour over fruits. Chill until firm. Unmold on lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 8.

Beauty Salad

1 package raspberry flavored gelatine
1 pint boiling water
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 bananas, sliced
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup walnut meats, finely cut
Crisp lettuce

Dissolve gelatine in boiling water. Add salt. Turn into individual molds, filling them 3/4 full. Chill. Sprinkle bananas with lemon juice. When gelatine is firm, arrange a layer of bananas on gelatine. Sprinkle with nuts. Add another layer of gelatine. Chill. When firm, fill mold with remaining gelatine. Chill until firm. Unmold lettuce. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 8.

Holiday Luncheon Dish

1 box sardines
1 lemon
1 bunch radishes
Parsley or watercress

Remove cover neatly and entirely from a box of sardines. Place on a platter, and surround with wreath of parsley or cress. Cut radishes in the shape of flowers, and arrange in the parsley. Cut lemons in halves, crosswise, and then cut in deep points. Arrange at ends and sides of platter, in the parsley. Serve very cold.

Rt. Rev. Msgr. William F. Barry, Famous English Writer, Theologian And Lecturer, Dies at Advanced Age

Author of Several Novels, He Is Credited with Having Created English Catholic Novel—Lectured in America in 1893

London, Dec. 19.—The Right Rev. Msgr. William Francis Barry, scholar, theologian and biographer, died in Oxford Monday at the age of 81. Although he was active in discharging the duties of his parishes, Msgr. Barry was able to achieve a distinguished position as the chief quarterly writer of his generation. Since 1876 the Dublin Review was seldom without an article by him. Between 1889 and 1900 he contributed to every number of the quarterly.

The Edinburgh and Nineteenth Century quarterly were also open to him. He may in addition be said to have created the English Catholic novel. His greatest influence was wielded through such philosophical biographers as those he wrote of Newman and Raman.

Msgr. Barry served as rector of St. Peter's in Leamington from 1908 to 1928 and was the Canon of Birmingham. He was born in London in 1849 and educated in Oscott College, near Birmingham, and at the English College and the Gregorian University in Rome. He also studied under Cardinals Franzelin and Tarquini and the famous Perrone. He was present during the Vatican Council and the taking of Rome in 1870.

After returning to England from Rome he became Professor of Philosophy at the Birmingham Theolog-

ical College and subsequently taught in other English colleges. In 1893 he came to the United States and delivered a number of lectures. He made a number of lecture tours in various parts of England. He was a student of the language and literature of five tongues.

Among his published works were "The New Antigone," "Arden Mas siter" and "The Two Standards," all romantic novels; also "Memories and Opinions" and "The Catholic Revival."
