Rockne Sticks Up For Football In Strong Way

Says the Game Is Not Over-Commercialized, and That Only a Few Colleges Make Any Money Out of it.

Buffalo, Dec. 19. — Knute Rockne, Notre Dame football mentor, spoke here this week at the annual football dinner of Canisius College, Loyola University of Chicago, it will be remembered, recently announced that it would discontinue inter-collegiate football on the ground that the game is over-commercialized. Mr. Rockne apparently had this fact in mind, for he entered into a vigorous defense of football.

"Football is not over-commercialized," he said, and with emphasis. "Football," he explained, "supports all minor sports in most colleges. Because football doesn't take in sufficient receipts at many colleges, these institutions have been forced to abandon their other athletic activities."

"I say football isn't commercialized enough because there are only about 25 out of 1,000 colleges making any real money out of it. Two colleges in the last three weeks have had to give up the sport."

Mr. Rockne said he does not believe in charity football games, that there are enough rich men and corporations in America to take care of necessary charities without asking college boys to go out after a hard season, and play for charity. He referred to the recent Notre Dame stars vs. the Giants of New York game, and said it was a game between a trained team of ex-college players and a squad that was not trained or in condition.

The All-America Football Board is composed of Knute Rockne, Glenn A. Warner, T. A. D. Jones, W. A. Alexander and Christy Walsh. These men know football supremely well. The other day they held a meeting and named 11 players for the mythical All-America football team.

Here is the team:
Ends, Foster of Ohio State and Dalrymple of Tulane; tackles, Sing-ton of Alabama and Hela of Washington State; guards, Beckett of California and Linahan of Yale; center, Ticknor of Harvard; quarter-back, Carrido of Notre Dame; half-backs, Brill of Notre Dame and Plunkett of Southern California; fullback, Russell of Northwestern.

That's all. No second choice. No honorable mention. Carideo was the unanimous choice of the board, and without debate. No other position was filled without some discussion. Metzger of Notre Dame came within an ace of being one of the guards. Many other players were discussed by the board, and it was a hard matter to make a choice in some cases.

Knute Rockne has gone to Mayo Brothers, Rochester, Minn., to undergo medical examination and treatment. His old ailment is coming back on him. Somebody asked him if he was going to quit coaching. "Yes," he said, "when I quit living."

Loyola University of Chicago, with more than 6,000 students, has abolished inter-collegiate football. The game is over-emphasized, the university authorities declare, and until further notice will be played only among the classes at the university. Loyola is conducted by the Jesuit Fathers.

Robert J. Clark of Syracuse, N. Y., class of 1932 at Niagara University, has been elected Captain of the Niagara football team for next year. He is quarterback on the team, and a superb player. Frank J. Dowling, 32, of Waterbury, Conn., was picked as manager of the 1931 squad, and while the official schedule for next fall has not been officially released, due to one open date, games have been arranged with St. Bonaventure, Colgate, Cornell, Providence, Alfred, St. Lawrence, and St. John's of Brooklyn.

Two Pontifical Masses Will Be Celebrated by Bishop O'Hern, One at Midnight To Be Broadcasted

Two solemn Pontifical Masses will be celebrated in St. Patrick's Cathedral on Christmas Day by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, one at midnight and the other at 10:30. There will be special music at both Masses, and the Bishop will speak at both. The Rev. Charles F. Shay, rector of the Cathedral, will preach the sermon at the midnight Mass, and the Rev. Benedict Ehmman at the 10:30. Priests at the Cathedral will assist Bishop O'Hern at both Masses. The Cathedral men and boys' choir will sing the midnight Mass and the sanctuary choir, composed of students of St. Andrew's Seminary, under the direction of Rev. Benedict Ehmman, Father Shay will preach on the gospel of the day. The entire service will be broadcasted over WHAM, together with the processional, "Adeste Fideles" and "Holy God," at the close of the service.

All students of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's seminaries will take part in the 10:30 Pontifical Mass. The boys' choir will sing, and Bishop O'Hern will give his apostolic blessing to the people at the conclusion of the service.

Other Masses at the Cathedral will be at 6 o'clock, 7:30, 8:30 and 9:30, and Father Shay will speak at all of them.

Vespers will be celebrated at 3:30 in the afternoon, and there will be an especially beautiful musical program for this service.

The Cathedral crib will be located in Lady Chapel, and this will be open at all times for persons who wish to go there and pray.

French Society Honors Claudel, Ambassador Her

Says Colonies Are Essential to France, and That the Atlantic Ocean Joins America to France.

New York, Dec. 19. — Paul L. Claudel, French Ambassador to Washington, was the guest of honor recently at the Ritz-Carlton at

annual luncheon of the French Institute in the United States. He urged that Americans attend the French Colonial Exposition in Spring and poked fun at French writers who attempted to interpret this country after a brief visit. Her colonies, he declared, were essential to the welfare of France and formed a larger part of France than America realized. "American," he said, "should learn that Paris is not all of France. The real France takes in many latitudes and climates, from the snowy foothills of the Alps to the blazing Sudan in tropics, and her products are varied as her scenery."

Much of the French colonial life being in the tropics, he went on, France was peculiarly indebted to American medicine and hygiene to fight against yellow fever, "a great menace to the white race of the tropics." He declared that "Atlantic joins rather than divides the United States and France."

John G. Agar, who presided, declared that the mutual love between France and America "will make a safe and sure way for democracy but for the future of civilization Louis Wile, another speaker, paid a tribute to the Ambassador and the institute.

3,000 Men Fed On Saturday At New York Church

New York, Dec. 19.—Last Saturday morning more than 3,000 men were in the breadline outside Church of St. Francis of Assisi, Church of St. Francis of Assisi, eagerly received rolls, cakes and coffee prepared in a regular army kitchen in a vacant lot opposite West-Thirtieth Street police station. Forty women in the line were taken out of the cold to a cigar store 142 West Thirty-first Street served with food and coffee. The line was more than twice usual size, due to a change in price by which one meal instead of two daily will be served, and five-cent pieces distributed. The charge was occasioned by the complaints of business men in the neighborhood. "I daily meal will be served at noon," a recent survey of the jobless in New York city shows that more than 20 per cent of them are in need of food and fuel. The Church of St. Francis of Assisi feeds more than 3,000 every day, and on such days the number is over 4,000.

New Bishop For Anglo-Egyptian Sudan Territory

Vatican City, Dec. 19.—The Rt. Reverend Hector Francis Bini, religion (Francis Xavier) has been named Vicar Apostolic of Khartoum in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, by decree of the Sacred Congregation of Propaganda Fide. His Lordship is a member of the Congregation of Sons of the Sacred Heart of Veroli.

Bishop-elect Bini was born in Archdiocese of Bologna, Italy, completed his ecclesiastical studies in Rome, receiving the doctorate in philosophy and theology. He served as a missionary in Bah-el-Ghazal, the Sudan from 1920 to 1922, when he was recalled on account of health. He has held the offices of Procurator General, Assistant to the General, and Vicar General of the Congregation.

The Vicariate Apostolic of Khartoum covers 1,844,515 square miles in which vast area there are 5,700,000 inhabitants of whom 1,096 are Catholics of the Latin rite.
