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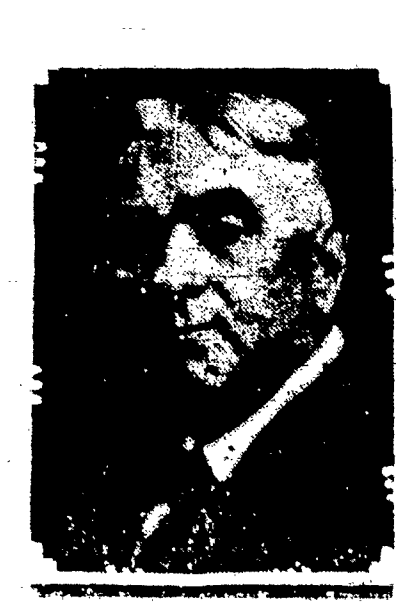
Chinese Bishop Given Welcome By His People

The five Monsignors are: Father Bloomer is the oldest priest in the Diocese of Rochester. He was born in Ireland on Oct. 22, 1841, and has been a priest for 62 years. He is a high-ranking member of the Knights of St. Gregory, St. Patrick's Church, Elmira. He is dean of the Immaculate Conception of the Diocese. The four other new Monsignors are members of the Diocesan Board of Consultors. All are well known pastors in the city, and like Father Bloomer, they have a world of friends who will be pleased with the honors conferred upon them and wish them many years of happiness wearing the purple. Father Brophy was born on December 16, 1859, in Rochester, has been a priest for 71 years, and rector of St. Boniface's Church for 21 years. Father Brophy was born in Shortsville, Oct. 10, 1877, was ordained 37 years ago, and has been pastor of St. Monica's for many years. Father Burns is a native of Buffalo, born April 4, 1873, ordained June 11, 1898, and has been pastor of the Sacred Heart Church for 19 years. Father Cameron, the youngest of the five, was born in Herford, Nov. 4, 1881, was ordained June 8, 1907, and has been pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church for eight years. All of the five pastors have done outstanding work for religion and God during the years they have labored as shepherds of human souls. (Continued from Page Seven) heaven that is very near like the warmth of the sun, of a heavenly light is really of the God of joy and love, of the Christ Who joined with joy to embrace even the cross. To some his unspoken message reached more deeply than to others, but to all came at least the impression that here was a man, who, without reserve and with a joy that was eagerness, gave himself in confidence and in trust for his fellowman. In the midst of those labors, Father O'Hern was partially incapacitated two years ago. He paid the penalty of his conservation. He paid it with gladness. During those two years he was not in the least discouraged by his own helplessness. He was just the other way. He was well and strong. Even when he was visibly almost helpless, still would he declare that "he would be around in a few days." Patient yet with no visible patience, he labored till he could labor no longer. One never thought of him as patient because he was always so cheerful; the Holy Spirit bespoke His own joy in him. A Beautiful Death. "The end was long in the coming. Three times Father O'Hern was prepared for death. His weakness increased. As late as Wednesday last he was fully conscious. Then on Friday the Lord Jesus Christ, Whom he loved so well, came and made him surely and forever His own. The joy of the angels of God shone round his death-bed. Rarely does a man on the threshold of death keep a clear mind. Mine was the honor to talk with him plainly of his own death, which he hoped for as late as last Wednesday. His joy was sure and explicit even at the end. With his own lips, and clearly, he told me so. Our Lord Jesus Christ had been so eager, though he said he would never anticipate God's will—that the messenger of God would come. "Need I say that this triumph of life over death is both a joy and an honor to us of his community? I feel it is such to all of you—to all

Pope Observes Christmas Eve With Cardinals

Vatican City, Dec. 26.—Pope Pius celebrated Christmas Eve in the midst of the Cardinals' resident in Rome. He was accompanied by the Dean of the Sacred College, Cardinal Pignatelli di Belmonte, the wearers of the Purple gathered in the Consistory Hall, where the Pontiff received them. Cardinal Pignatelli di Belmonte made a short address congratulating the Pope on the completion of another year of achievement, and on being, despite his heavy daily work, in good health. In his reply the Pope thanked the dean for his good wishes expressed on behalf of all the Cardinals. According to long custom, the Pope bodily reviewed the year's ecclesiastical developments. He expressed regret that Christmas greetings could not have been conveyed by the venerable Cardinal Vanutelli, former dean of the Sacred College, who died this year at the age of 92. Finally the Pope imparted the apostolic benediction. Then he said farewell to each Cardinal with the hope that he might see him again at the same time next year. Afterward he retired early in preparation for Mass on Christmas morning.

25,000 Ag To Get Paid After January

New Pension Law Operative First of Next Year Nearly Half Applied From New York. New York, Dec. 26.—Old-age pension law, the measure of pensioned people 75 years of age, became operative on Jan. 1, 1931. On that date the State will start paying monthly \$25.00 of its pensioners. A little less than half of the pensioners are from this city. Rural pensioners will receive an average of \$21 a month, while New York City aged are a higher cost of living will receive an average of \$23 monthly. The state, however, in individual cases will range from \$10 to \$45 in the rural sections and state cities. All alien applications received were rejected. Those of citizens who had been in New York for less than 10 years will be paid. Although the security committee reports that there would be \$1,000,000 of the state social welfare anticipated for 1930 applications. The state will bear half of the cost of the pensions, and the other half will be borne by the state. Next year, it is estimated, an appropriation of \$4,000,000 will be urged for this work.
