Years ago "Joe" Courneen was one of the best-known amateur baseball players in Rochester. Star pitcher of the old Rochester Catholic League, he was sought out for professional service and played with the Fall River team, in the New England League, and with Baltimore, in the International League. He broke his shoulder sliding to a base, and this injury compelled him to leave the game for good.

He was appointed to the Rochester Police Force on January 16, 1910, but never lost his interest in baseball. He has been an umpire of college baseball games for the past 10 years, and for eight years umpired all games played by Cornell University. He was fair and square in this work, as in all things, and he has a world of friends in the city who will wish him well and hope for complete restoration of his health.
