St. Mary's Will Have New School

Auburn, Jan. 30.—An announcement that will bring pleasure to all friends of St. Mary's parish was made Sunday by the pastor, the Very Rev. Dean J. McGrath, who stated that he has in mind plans for the erection of a new parochial school. The old school is getting too small for the increasing number of pupils and in view of all conveniences of modern school buildings, he said. The members of the congregation were asked to contribute to the new school fund in addition to their subscriptions for other branches of the church activities.

It is not planned to build right away, but to spread the subscriptions to the school fund over four years until the amount required is available.

St. Mary's School is in charge of the sisters of St. Joseph, and there are about 45 children attending the school regularly.

ELMIRA

Charles T. Rice Dies of Injuries

Elmira, Jan. 30.—Charles T. "Titan" Rice, aged 47 years, an engineer on the D. & W. railroad, and for 23 years in the employ of the road, died Monday morning in the Elmhurst City Hospital from injuries received Sunday morning, when he was knocked from the running board of his cab by the rear car of a string of cars on a siding. He suffered a fractured skull and severe injuries to his back.

Mr. Rice was engaged on a west-bound freight, and he had left his cab to make repairs to the valve lubricating system while his train was in motion. He was returning to his cab when injured. His firstman, W. H. McConnell, saw the accident, stopped the train and sent Mr. Rice to the Elmhurst Hospital. He died without regaining consciousness.

Mr. Rice was a well known and highly respected citizen of Elmira, and he had a great many friends, all of whom will mourn his death. He is survived by his wife, and by five brothers, Lawrence of Chicago, John of Rochester, Frank, Joseph and Thomas of Elmira; a sister, Mrs. Rose Johnson of Elmira, and an aunt, Mrs. Bridget Rice of Elmira. The funeral will be held in St. Patrick's Church Friday morning, and it was attended by a large number of relatives and friends, and by many railroad associates.

Trip to Dublin, 1932, Described, By Father Shay

Cathedral Rector Tells of Plans For Pilgrimage of Rochester Catholics to the Eucharistic Congress.

The Rev. Charles F. Shay, rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral, will sponsor a pilgrimage of Catholics from Rochester and vicinity to Dublin, Ireland, in June, 1932, to the 31st International Eucharistic Congress. On Sunday Father Shay announced the details of the pilgrimage.

The pilgrimage will sail from New York on July 13, or from Boston on the 14th, and will anchor in Kingsboro harbor on June 22. Because the Dublin hotels will not be able to care for all of the hundreds of thousands of pilgrims who will flock to the city for the Congress, the Rochester pilgrims will live on board their ship, which will remain at anchor in the harbor until June 26th. Breakfast will be served on the ship every morning, and luncheon and dinner tickets provided. Transportation to and from the Congress will be arranged for all who wish to remain in Ireland, or make stops in Europe. The ship will reach New York on the return trip on July 5th.

Pilgrims from all parts of the world are being arranged by the Congress, and it is expected that half a million or more pilgrims will visit Dublin during the time of the Congress. Father Shay is arranging for the Rochester pilgrimage with the approval of Bishop O'Brien, and he has received requests for information. All such requests should be made by letter, as telephone inquiries are unworkable, and it is difficult for Father Shay to give personal interviews to all inquirers. It is expected that several hundred Rochester pilgrims will make the trip with Father Shay's pilgrimage.

Dundee, Jan. 30.—James Clary, aged 70 years, and for 41 years engaged in the hardware business here, died suddenly of heart disease while on a hunting trip Saturday afternoon with his sons-in-law, William Murphy of Syracuse and Freeman Brummagin of Buffalo, and his grandson, Bobby Brummagin. They went to Crystal Springs, and hunted for some time. Mr. Clary collapsed while they were leaving the woods, and died almost instantly.

Mr. Clary was a member of St. Murphy and Mr. Brummagin and their wives Saturday afternoon and was preparing for a happy reunion with other members of his family including his son and daughter-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. Francis J. Clary of Corning, who were expected to arrive in Dundee early Saturday evening.

Mr. Clary had been engaged in the hardware business for a long time in Dundee and was widely known in this section of the State. He was a former member of the Dundee Board of Education and of the Village Board of Trustees, and was a man of excellent character, highly respected and well thought of by his friends. 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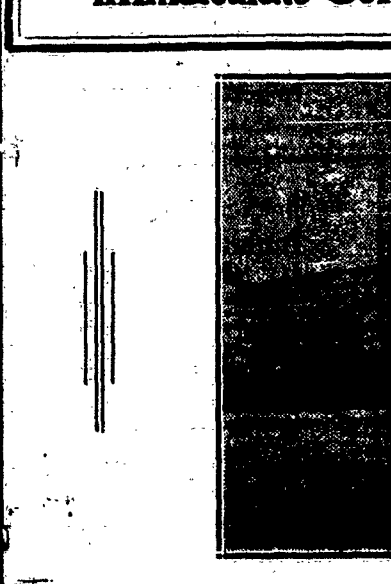
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CALEDONIA
