### Rev. W. D. Muckle Is Named Pastor Of A Cathedral

Brother of Rochester Priests and Former Student at St. Bernard's Appointed Toronto Pastor.

The Rev. William D. Muckle, son of Thomas Muckle of Stanley, N. Y., and brother of the Rev. John F. Muckle, pastor of St. Thomas Church, Summerville, and of the Rev. Charles E. Muckle of Avon, and of Sister Mary Charles, principal of St. Thomas School, Rochester, has been appointed rector of St. Michael's Cathedral, Toronto, Canada, and will take up his work there on Sunday.

The services in this Cathedral are broadcasted every Sunday morning, and many people in this Diocese will undoubtedly hear Father Muckle preach his first sermon in St. Michael's on Sunday.

Father Muckle studied philosophy in St. Bernard's Seminary and then attended St. Augustine's Seminary in Toronto, where he studied theology. He was ordained on December 27, 1917, in the Toronto cathedral, which he now will head as rector.

Assigned by Archbishop Neil McNeil of Toronto to parish work, he afterward was sent to Rome to take a course in canon law and Italian. After completing his studies in the Canadian College in Rome, and receiving the degree of doctor of canon law, Father Muckle returned to Toronto to become pastor of St. Augustine's Seminary, a position which he held until his appointment to the cathedral rectorship.

### Items of Interest From WHAM

The Rochester Civic Orchestra will journey to New York City to present the Stromberg-Carlson Program at 10 o'clock Monday night, February 9th. The trip to New York will be made in order that the group may appear at the annual dinner of the Society of the Genesee at the Hotel Commodore and the nation-wide broadcast will consequently go on the air from the NBC studios instead of from those of WHAM. George Eastman, guest of honor at the dinner, will be honored with his favorite composition, Wagner's "Album Leaf", with Alexander Leventon as violin soloist. William Fay will announce the program, with Guy Fraser Harrison, conducting.

The Nocturne and Sohera from the familiar Mendelssohn work, "Midsummer Night's Dream", will be played by the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra under Eugene Goossens' conducting during the concert to be heard on the "BC-WIZ" network from WHAM at 3:15 o'clock Friday afternoon, February 13th. Max Landow will be featured as piano soloist.

Grigg's Peer Gynt suite will be played by the one hundred-piece student orchestra of the Eastman School of Music of Rochester during the NBC broadcast from WHAM at 4 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, February 11th. The movements included are "Morning", "Aase's Death", "Aase's Dance", and "In the Hall of the Mountain King". The concert will open with Beethoven's overture "Leonore", No. 3.

### Many Priests Present at Funeral of Father Edelman In St. Patrick's Cathedral

Chaplain of St. Mary's Orphan Asylum Dies After Short Illness—Bishop O'Hern Celebrant of Solemn Funeral Mass.

The Rev. Adolph Edelman, Chaplain of St. Mary's Orphan Asylum, died Friday in St. Mary's Hospital after a short illness. He was buried on Monday morning from St. Patrick's Cathedral, where the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., celebrated a solemn high requiem Mass. A large number of priests attended the funeral, and many relatives and friends. Interment was made in the plot reserved for priests in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.
