The Rochester Civic Orchestra will play a Berlioz overture, a Bach Sonata, and a Bohemian Dance by Bizet when the Stromberg-Carlson Program is broadcast from WHAM by the NBC-WJZ network at 10 o'clock on Monday night, February 16th.
