Vigorous Objection To Birth Control Bill Is Made by Catholics

Spokesmen Tell U. S. Senatorial Committee That Bill Is Diabolical and Damnable, Immoral and Inimical to Family Life-Congressman Mrs. Mary T. Norton Challenges Claims Made.

THE AMERICAN FEDERATION OF LABOR HAS REPRESENTATIVE OPPOSED TO BILL

Washington, Feb. 20. — The most determined kind of these churches will preach a ser-opposition to Senator Gillett's bill legalizing the dissemination of mon on some particular phase of birth control information by physicians, hospitals and clinics was made here last Saturday by representatives of various organizations, mostly Catholic, in a hearing held by the U. S. Senate Judiciary Sub-Committee. The bill was denounced as "diabolical and damnable," and as being inimical to family life, and Congress man Mrs. Mary T. Norton of New Jersey, a Catholic, challenged the claims of the proposers and advocates of the bill. The American Federation of Labor had a representative present in opposition to the bill.

Diabolical and Dammable

The bill itself was characterized as "diabolical and damnable" by Red-mond F. Kernan, Jr., of the International Federation of Catholic Alumni, and by William F. Montavon, assistant executive secretary of the Na-tional Catholic Welfare Council as most subversive and impractical, many of the arguments in behalf of which he said were based on "pure

Representatives Mary T Norton of New Jersey, and John W. McCor-mack of Massachusetts also opposed the bill in a vigorous way.


