Yugoslavs Will **Ask For Prayers** For Persecuted etter of Archbishop is Consid

ered a Protest Against Treatment of His Countrymen by the Fascists.

Belgrade, March 6.- A pastoral letter just issued by the Archbishop fo Zagreb, Dodov Bauer, urges all Catholics to attend services on St. Joseph's Day, March 19th, when there will be prayers for Catholic Yugoslavs "who are persecuted in various parts of the world." The letter is looked upon as a protest against the action of Italian Fascists, and it has caused much comment.

The Achilshop refers to the al-leved persecution of Croat and Slovene Catholics by Italy, asserting that the use of their mother tongue made impossible both in th church and in the schools. It quotes the recent encyclical of the Pope, in which attention is called to excesses of nationalism.

The Pope himself," says the pas-toral letter, "has tried to intervene in behalf of persecuted Slav Catho-lics in Haly, yet the heathen na tionalism of a blinded State's force declines to recognize grave breaches in religious or human law or make reparation for them.

For the delryman who has ten or welve cows and several horses the design of barn shown in the accom panying illustration is good. Here is a dairy stable which occupies about two-thirds of the first floor and a horse barn the balance. To conform with the health requirements of most states a concrete wall has been provided to separate the dairy cattle from the horses. The connection between the two stables is through a center door in this concrete partition wall. This opening is closed by a sliding door which is hung so that it nes eight and will keep the odors from the horse stable out of the cow stable, which is a state requirement of dairymen who are selling whole milk. This barn is 46 feet long and \$4 feet wide. The dairy stable provides space for 12 stations, all facing a center feed alley. Over this alley is a carrier track which leads from the allo and feed mixing room through the dairy stable to the norse stable. The floor is connected with the stable by a hay chute placed in the conter of the dairy stable. Frash air, plenty of water and sun-
