**Carmelites Open
Novena of Grace
In Their Chapel**
The first Novena of Grace to be conducted at the Carmelite Monastery, 151 Saratoga Avenue, was started on Wednesday, this week, and will continue until March 12th, in the chapel of the Monastery, with the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, chaplain, in charge.
Novena pamphlets are available at the monastery. Novena prayers will be said after the 7 and 8 o'clock Masses and again in the afternoon at 4 and at 7:30 and 8 in the evening.
Speaking of this novena, which consists of certain prayers said for nine consecutive days, Father Mooney said:
"The first and main object, is the attainment and possession of God's grace of favor and all that it implies in the way of temporal and eternal favors."
"The novena was begun by St. Francis Xavier in the 16th Century. Through devotion to him, many temporal favors are granted, but above all many spiritual favors are received and souls by the thousands are brought again to the gentle Saviour. The humility of St. Francis Xavier, who formerly was a brilliant professor at the University of Paris, his heroic sacrifices in an unworshipful cause, his great generosity and zeal for the Kingdom of God, won for him an eternal crown in Heaven."

**Former Pastor
Wayland Church
Dies in Buffalo**

Rev. Conrad Kaelin, Aged Eighty-Six Years, Passes From Life Beloved By Many Friends, Lay and Clerical.
Wayland, March 6.—Word has been received here of the recent death in Buffalo of the Rev. Conrad Kaelin, aged 86 years, former pastor of St. Joseph's Church in this village. Father Kaelin was well-known by the older residents of the village, and is held in kindly memory by them. He had been retired from active work for the past 13 years because of the infirmities of age. He made his home with the Rev. John P. Pfleger, rector of St. Magdalene's Church, Buffalo, and heard confessions and said Mass as his health permitted.
Father Kaelin was born in Germany and came to this country in 1868, shortly after he had been ordained to the priesthood. Father Kaelin's first pastorate was at St. Mary's Church at East Eden. Later he was pastor of St. Joseph's Church in Wayland. When the division of the Diocese of Buffalo was made which put Wayland in the Rochester diocese, Father Kaelin was again made pastor of the church at East Eden, where he served until his retirement, because of advancing age and impaired health, took place thirteen years ago. Father Kaelin had also been pastor of Sacred Heart Church, Dennington Center; and of Good Shepherd Church, Pendleton.

Cardinal Says That Slump Aids Work of Religion
New Orleans, March 6.—His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, en route to San Antonio, Texas, was interviewed here early in the week, and was asked to give his views on the condition of religion in America.
"The American people are experiencing a return to religion following a period of carelessness and apathy marked by the prosperity of the 'land,'" he said. "Prosperity through a number of years has to some extent blotted a negligence of our people in respect to religion. But now they are returning when they find they are in need of something greater than the material in facing adversity and stress."
