Example of Colonial Type of Home That Has Many Pleasing Features

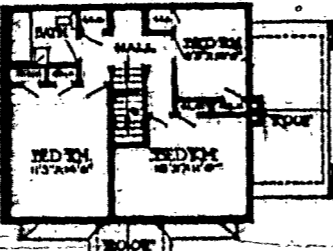

The true colonial balance is retained in this house, there being two windows on either side of the entrance with three windows on the second floor in perfect alignment.

The living room at the right of the hall extends the depth of the house

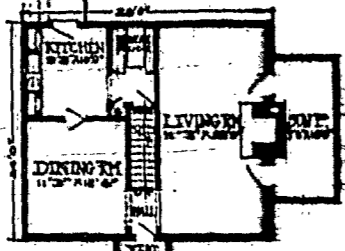


Second Floor Plan.

and is 28 feet by 11 feet 3 inches. Connected with this through french doors on both sides of an open fireplace is the sun porch, which is 7 feet 6 inches by 16 feet deep. To the left of the entrance hall is the dining room the same width as the living room and 12 feet 6 inches deep. At the back is the kitchen, 9 feet 3 inches by 10 feet with a breakfast room adjoining.

Colonial stairs run out of the entrance hall to the second floor. There are three bedrooms, two at the front and one at the back and a bathroom all opening off the hall.

The house is built of frame set on a concrete foundation with a basement of the same dimensions as the house proper. An attractive feature of the house is the entry way, which is enclosed. The platform and steps of brick lead to it. For prospective home builders who want to get the greatest amount of space for their money, this design is good.

Entrance Tests For Notre Dame Are Announced

Students With Poor Records In High Schools Are Not Wanted—Average of 77 Required For Graduation.

South Bend, Ind., March 13.—Holding that it is impracticable for a student to enter college if his high school work has not been above the average, authorities of Notre Dame have announced that the university would accept students only from the upper and middle sections of high school classes and would reject the lower third entirely.

The faculty also announced that after entering the university, students must maintain a general average of 77 per cent to graduate. Preparations are being made for a survey of other institutions to ascertain if this requirement is too severe or not rigid enough.

The dean of a college may permit a student to remain if his work can be made up to the standard. If the student fails in one-third of his class hours, he is placed on probation. If he fails in two-thirds he is dropped.

There are no special regulations for students who go out for athletics in any form. They must maintain their grades the same as other students. Athletes are considered just a cross-section of the general student body as to scholastic standing.

Louisiana Senator Retires And Receives High Commendation From Senator Copeland of New York

High Statesmanship, Kindliness and Splendid Qualities of Senator Ransdell Made Him Honored and Beloved in Senate.

Washington, March 13.—In striking contrast with the manner of the recent retirement of Senator J. Thomas Hefflin of Alabama from the U. S. Senate, is that of Senator Ransdell of Louisiana, for many years in the Senate, and one of the few Catholic members in the upper house. Senator Ransdell had just completed an address in behalf of the National Institute of Health, in the closing days of the Senate, when his colleague, Senator Royal S. Copeland of New York arose and paid him this tribute:

example of conduct for our other units in our country.

"I have seen my welcome in the eyes of the friendly people of Texas, and have felt the very affection of their hearts and souls as I looked upon them, as they welcome me to your great State. The address, after all, lay the foundation of law and order here in this mighty empire State.

"I was pleased by the thought that those patriots who established San Antonio were not animated by any motive nor desire for conquest or worldly gain, but solely simply to serve humanity.

"You also, in your resolution of invitation refer to my work among the poor. I am an overcomer, Mr. Senator, that I should have in the Senate chamber refer to what is leader to my heart. I have tried in our great cosmopolitan city to work to alleviate the conditions that must necessarily exist.

Born Humble and Poor

"I was born very humble, and I may say, of poor people. I have never forgotten it, and I shall never forget it, and when I realized that I was in a position where I might serve the poor, the suffering, those in need, that I might make them conscious of our common father, even now I feel that there was an obligation to do so. There is a great obligation and a great reward, Mr. Senator, that you have referred to my work for the poor.

"These blue bonnets blossoming around Austin, these beautiful decorations in honor of me—when I look upon them I feel from what I have experienced from the people of Texas that you have your own valuation of this State flower in the legislative halls of Texas.

"This work of legislation might be likened to a flower, not only those flowers which is the parent, the most beautiful of all flowers, the flower of charity, the flower which indicates we love our fellow-man.

Love of Fellow Man

"We should have love for our fellow-man, like unto God's, a fellow-man who is a child of God, a fellow-man who is before His God just as we are.

"I think myself, at times, that there is a lack of mercy, kindness and consideration toward our brothers. We should love our fellow-men, and the Master told us to do so.

"In the great crisis facing the world at this time, in the economic depression, there is a tremendous responsibility on those who are called to meet to frame the laws of a nation or of a State.

"The problems of our country can be solved not by legislation alone for the legislation wants to be the expression of the best opinions, the expert opinions, of human opinions, that can be found.

"If a member of this body, I would be overwhelmed with a sense of responsibility lest I should fail to express in the things I do the best opinions of my people.

Welcomed in State

"When I was privileged to come amongst you, no sooner had I crossed the border into Texas, than I was made to feel that I was welcome. However, I am not here altogether because of this great State's Senate preparing a resolution asking me to come here, much as I enjoy to be here, not because of the urging of the Archbishop of San Antonio, or even of the distinguished bishops there and other places. It was because of the womanhood of Texas.

Benediction on State

"And that document had the added dignity to it of bearing the signature of the Governor of the State of

Texas, the seal of Texas, also the seal of the Republic. I wish you would say, "May God's blessings come upon this great Commonwealth of Texas, may they rest upon the Legislature, may they rest to higher greater than any of their predecessors in our country. May you be an inspiration in moral power, and your heart burn with charity for mankind, for the benefit of not only your own State, but for the benefit of the United States of America."

There was a solemn and significant silence as Cardinal Hayes ceased speaking. The feeling of fervor and of emotion felt by the Cardinal seemed to have found a mirror place in every heart. Then, suddenly, there was a storm of applause and cheer, and Texas gave the Cardinal a free tribute into the majesty of its soul.

Welcomed in San Antonio

Before going to Austin, Cardinal Hayes had taken part in the 100th anniversary of the founding of San Antonio by missionary priests, and he had blessed the Spanish Governor's palace, recently bought by the city and restored to its original condition. Bishops and archbishops were present from several Southern States for this celebration, and Cardinal Hayes was everywhere treated with great respect and greeted with great enthusiasm. Several receptions were held in his honor.

Two tablets were unveiled at the site of ancient mission, and a permanent display of the arrival of the Spanish Governor and his party 100 years ago, carrying official papers transferring ownership of the land to San Antonio to the Franciscan Fathers, founders of the city and of the ancient missions. Cardinal Hayes spoke from the same platform the Governor Tom Herring of Texas, in the address "We are proud of you throughout the South."

W. of G. Banquet

On Thursday evening, March 12, San Antonio Association, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, held a banquet in the Plaza Hotel in honor of Cardinal Hayes. Governor Tom H. Sterling, Lieutenant Governor Edgar J. Will, Speaker of the House Frank J. Meador, the commanding officer of Eighth Corps Area and all military and aviation posts were among the guests present.

Cardinal Hayes, the 100th anniversary of the founding of San Antonio, among the distinguished guests who reviewed a parade of the Marine and Twenty-third Infantry.

The bi-centennial celebration lasted for several days, and it was rich in historic, patriotic and civic events.
