Praises Father Bloomer

"Not would I allow this occasion to pass by without making special mention and paying due tribute to one who is in this sanctuary today but who has already been invested with his purple robes which he now wears so gracefully. You, by reason of this Knighthood, should represent the best type of citizenship in our country in your personal life, coupled with devotion to your families, your church and the wide social circle in which you live and move.

"You have been selected out of thousands of men, good and worthy men of our diocese, our State and our nation, for this signal honor and we bestow upon you in the name of Him who recently spoke to three people of the civilized world in that sublime message of peace, Christian charity and good will. May you live long to enjoy your Knighthood, and may your individual lives ever be shining examples of what a true Catholic layman is expected to be.

Papal Briefs Are Read

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. M. J. Nolan, Chancellor of the Diocese, read the Papal briefs, in Latin first, then in English, after which the four Monsignors were invested each separately, and with solemn ceremony, concluding with the kiss of peace by the Bishop. Then came the five Knights of St. Gregory, the Bishop planning the insignia of the order upon the breast of each, then giving each the kiss of peace. The solemn Pontifical Mass followed, with Bishop O'Brien officiating.

George Schmitt, Rev. John P. Belmont, Rev. Joseph E. Grady, Rev. Leo V. Smith, Rev. Frederick Wise, Rev. John A. Neary, Rev. O. Stuart Hogan, Rev. Edward H. Hartman, Rev. Francis Ludy, Rev. Harold Robbins, Rev. Philip McGeehan, Rev. John O'Belne, Rev. Raymond West, Rev. Raymond Wahl, Rev. Richard Burns, Rev. John Merlinger, Rev. Francis Vogt, Rev. John Callahan.

Passion Play For Two Sundays By Nazareth Col.

Will Be Given at Three O'clock on Afternoon of March 22 and Again on the Afternoon of March 29th

The American Passion Play, also known as "Veronica's Veil," will be given its second presentation in the Columbus Civic Center Auditorium at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon, March 22 and again at 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon, March 29th, under the auspices of Nazareth College, with a company of 80 players and an orchestra of 40 musicians.

The first presentation of this sacred drama was given last Sunday afternoon, and it was enacted with dignity, with ability, with unusual dramatic excellence, and with fire and fervor that stirred the very souls of the audience. All of the leading parts were interpreted by capable and talented players, and they filled their roles superbly.

Rev. S. J. Szupa, Born in Poland, Priest 26 Years

Pastor of St. Stanislaus Church was Active Worker in Auburn for Twenty Years—Zealous and Devoted Priest

Sunday will be a happy day for the Rev. Stanislaus J. Szupa, pastor of St. Stanislaus Church in this city, for on that day will be consummated his dream of years—the dedication of a new parochial school that will be the pride and joy of all his people, their children and their children's children.

Father Szupa was born in Poland, and when two weeks old was carried in his mother's arms from an immigrant camp of yearlings in America. His parents had little or no money, but his father was given work almost immediately, for help was scarce those days in the mines and foundries, and the Poles were good workers, strong and willing. The family made its home in West Virginia, then to Buffalo, where Stanislaus grew into boyhood and manhood and was educated. He came to St. Bernard's Seminary, shortly before completing his studies for the priesthood, and here he was ordained in St. Patrick's Cathedral in 1905. His preliminary studies had been made in the Detroit Polish Seminary, and in the Polish College at Rome, Italy.

In Auburn Twenty Years Immediately after his ordination Father Szupa was sent to Auburn where he organized St. Ignace's parish and served as its pastor for 20 years and six months. Here he was very happy. His parish was like a great big family, and all of the people grew around and into the heart of the pastor.

On January 1, 1926, Father Szupa came to Rochester to take charge of St. Stanislaus Church. Here he has labored faithfully and zealously ever since. He has the third largest parish school in the city, with Sister Irene of the Sisters of St. Joseph in charge, and a devoted co-worker in the Rev. Peter Jankowski. All societies of the church will be present in a body at the dedication of the school Sunday, and many priests of the Diocese will be in attendance. At 6 o'clock in the evening Father Szupa will entertain Bishop O'Brien and the visiting priests at dinner, rounding out a memorable day in a happy manner.
